Did you know?

☐ The top three causes
of 1994 farm-related
injuries in Iowa were
animals (22 percent of
all injuries), machinery
(19 percent), and slips
and falls (13 percent).
However, the severity of
these injuries differs.
Only 11 percent of the
injuries caused by
animals resulted in
hospitalization while 19
percent of slips/falls and
24 percent of injuries
involving machinery led
to hospital treatment.

☐ Acute chemical injury

number one killer on
