The document contains analyses of post-secondary student enrollments in Minnesota during the 1967-1968 academic year, the origin of students in Minnesota higher education institutions by counties of residence, and the migration of students to and from Minnesota for higher education. The data, compiled from institutional enrollment reports submitted to the Minnesota Higher Education Coordinating Commission by colleges and universities in the state, revealed that post-secondary enrollments in Minnesota in the fall of 1967 totaled 148,898 students, of whom 89% attended colleges and universities and 11% attended trade or vocational schools. Public institutions enrolled 74% of the post-secondary students, and men comprised 60% or more of the full-time enrollment at most institutions. The residence of students tended to reflect the population pattern of the state: the majority, or 82% of all full-time students were residents of Minnesota, 47% of whom came from the 7-county Twin Cities metropolitan area. The in-migration and out-migration of students seemed to offset one another: less than one fifth of all students came from other states, but the number of Minnesota residents who left the state for higher education was even smaller. The report also contains 48 tables and 5 illustrative figures. (WM)

PREFACE

This is the third in a series of planning reports on Minnesota post-secondary education to be presented by the Minnesota Higher Education Coordinating Commission. The first of the planning reports, which was published in March with the title, *A Philosophy for Minnesota Higher Education*, contains the basic policy recommended by the Commission for the State, including (1) a general view of higher education and its place in Minnesota, (2) the fundamental principles which should guide the continuing development of higher education, and (3) the goals toward which Minnesota higher education should be aimed.

The second in the series of planning reports, *Population and Student Enrollments in Minnesota Higher Education*, was published in September. It presents past population and enrollment trends and the projection of post-secondary enrollments through the year 2000. This third report contains analyses of post-secondary student enrollments in Minnesota during the 1967-68 year, the origin of students in Minnesota institutions by counties of residence, and the migration of students to and from Minnesota for higher education. Additional reports, which, together with the first three, will provide the bases for comprehensive planning recommendations, will be published within the next few months.

A summary has been provided at the beginning of this report for the convenience of the reader who wishes a brief overview of enrollment, origin and migration of students. The reader who is interested in more than a general overview is urged to read the complete text. More detailed data are presented in the appendixes.

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SUMMARY

Post-secondary enrollments in Minnesota totaled 148,898 in Fall 1967.

Total post-secondary enrollments in Minnesota in the fall of 1967 included 134,643 college and university students and 14,255 vocational students.

Almost 90 per cent of post-secondary enrollments were in colleges and universities.

Eleven per cent of the students regularly enrolled in post-secondary institutions attended vocational or trade schools. Included in this number were 8,748 students in area vocational-technical schools and 5,507 in private trade schools. Included in the college enrollment were 46,090 students enrolled in the University of Minnesota, 30,466 in state colleges, 25,878 in private four-year colleges and universities, 12,090 in state junior colleges, 1,348 in private professional schools, and 1,234 in private junior colleges.

Over 90 per cent of regularly enrolled college students attended full-time.

Among regularly enrolled students in Minnesota colleges and universities 92 per cent attended full-time and eight per cent attended part-time. An additional 17,537 persons were enrolled as extension students.

Full-time college equivalent enrollment was 20 per cent less than the headcount enrollment.

In terms of full-time equivalents based on 15 credit hours per full-time student, college and university enrollments were 107,646, or 26,997 less than the total college and university headcount enrollment of 134,643.

The full-time equivalent enrollment in private institutions was 28,081, or 379 less than the headcount enrollment of 28,460. The full-time equivalent enrollment in public institutions was 79,565, or 26,618 less than the headcount enrollment of 106,183. While full-time equivalent enrollment was only 1.3 per cent less than the total headcount enrollment in private institutions, it was 25 per cent less than the total headcount enrollment in public institutions.

Eighty-nine per cent of the college students were undergraduates.

Of the full-time students enrolled in Minnesota colleges and universities, 89 per cent were undergraduates. Two-thirds of the undergraduates were in the lower division (freshmen and sophomores) and one-third were juniors and seniors. Ten per cent of the full-time college students were enrolled in post-baccalaureate programs and one per cent were unclassified.

Enrollment in public institutions was almost three times greater than the enrollment in private institutions.

Public institutions enrolled 74 per cent of the post-secondary students, exclusive of extension students, while private institutions enrolled 26 per cent. Among full-time students, public institutions enrolled 73 per cent of the undergraduates, 76 per cent of lower division students, 68 per cent of upper division students, and 88 per cent of post-baccalaureate students.

Men outnumbered women three to two.

While men comprised 60 per cent and women 40 per cent of the full-time enrollment, the ratio of men to women varied considerably among types of institutions, ranging from a high of 66 per cent men and 34 per cent women in the state junior colleges to a low of 52 per cent and 48 per cent, respectively, in the private senior colleges.

The largest summer enrollments were in public institutions.

Eighty-four per cent of the 31,708 students enrolled in the first summer session attended public institutions. The percentage was even larger during the second summer session when 93 per cent of the 21,399 students enrolled attended public institutions.

Enrollment decreased eight per cent from Fall 1967 to Spring 1968.

Total college and university enrollment at the beginning of the spring 1968 term was 123,945, a decrease of 10,698 from the total of 134,643 at the beginning of the fall 1967 term. The greatest proportionate enrollment decrease from fall to spring, nine per cent, occurred in public institutions, while the decrease in private institutions was only three per cent.

Minnesota residents comprised over four-fifths of the students in Minnesota colleges.

The great majority, 82 per cent, of all full-time students in Minnesota colleges and universities were residents of the state. The proportion of Minnesota residents was particularly high in public institutions where 89 per cent of the total full-time enrollment and 94 per cent of the full-time undergraduates were Minnesota residents.

The residence of students tended to reflect the population pattern of the state.

Although relatively large numbers of students from each of the 87 counties of the state attended Minnesota

colleges, the distribution of students among counties was uneven. The number of students who came from the seven-county Twin Cities metropolitan area approached one-half, 47 per cent, of the total full-time undergraduate Minnesota resident enrollment.

The in-migration and out-migration of students tended to offset one another.

Although less than one-fifth of all students in Minne-

sota colleges and universities were residents of other states, the number of Minnesota residents who left the state for higher education was even smaller. The number of out-of-state students in Minnesota colleges and universities exceeded the number of Minnesota residents in out-of-state institutions by about 2,500 students, or less than two per cent of the Minnesota total enrollment.

I. INTRODUCTION

Effective planning for the future requires understanding of what exists at present. This report reflects an attempt on the part of the Minnesota Higher Education Coordinating Commission to achieve better understanding of what presently exists in one important aspect of Minnesota post-secondary education. It provides an assessment of who and how many are being educated in Minnesota post-secondary institutions and from where they come.

During the 1967-68 academic year the Commission periodically collected enrollment data from institutions of higher education in Minnesota. An attempt has been made to include all post-secondary institutions in the state. Reports of resultant data are relevant to such questions as: (1) how many students are educated in each institution and in each type of institution? (2) how many students are enrolled at each level of higher education? (3) what portion of the students are men and what portion are women? (4) how many students are enrolled full-time and how many are enrolled part-time? (5) what are the enrollments of colleges and universities in terms of full-time equivalents? (6) how do enrollments fluctuate during the academic year? (7) from which counties and areas in Minnesota do most students come? and (8) how many non-residents are enrolled in Minnesota?

Whenever possible, comparable data have been included for all types of post-secondary institutions in

the state. These include private vocational and trade schools, area vocational-technical schools, private junior colleges, state junior colleges, private senior colleges, state colleges and the University of Minnesota. Because only summary data were available for the private trade schools and the area vocational schools, the students who were enrolled in these two types of institutions have not been included in any of the above-mentioned reporting except that dealing with enrollment by type of institution.

Data relating to enrollments during the 1967-68 academic year were compiled from institutional enrollment reports submitted to the Commission by the colleges and universities. Additional enrollment data were obtained from the Higher Education General Information Survey administered by the Commission in conjunction with the United States Office of Education. Information regarding the origin of Minnesota undergraduate students was derived from the County of Residence Survey conducted by the Commission.

The Minnesota Higher Education Coordinating Commission is grateful to the many persons in the institutions and systems of Minnesota post-secondary education who made this study possible. Their cooperation in completing reports has provided the Commission staff with necessary data. Their expenditure of time and energies is greatly appreciated.

II. 1967-68 ENROLLMENT

Minnesota continues to rank high among the states in terms of the number of post-secondary students which it educates. During the fall of 1967, only 14 states had more students enrolled in higher education than were enrolled in Minnesota institutions. The relationship between the number of students in Minnesota and the total number of students in the United States is almost identical to the relationship between the Minnesota population and the United States population. Students enrolled in Minnesota colleges and universities comprised 1.75 per cent of all students enrolled throughout the United States and its territories, while Minnesota residents comprised 1.79 per cent of the population of the United States.

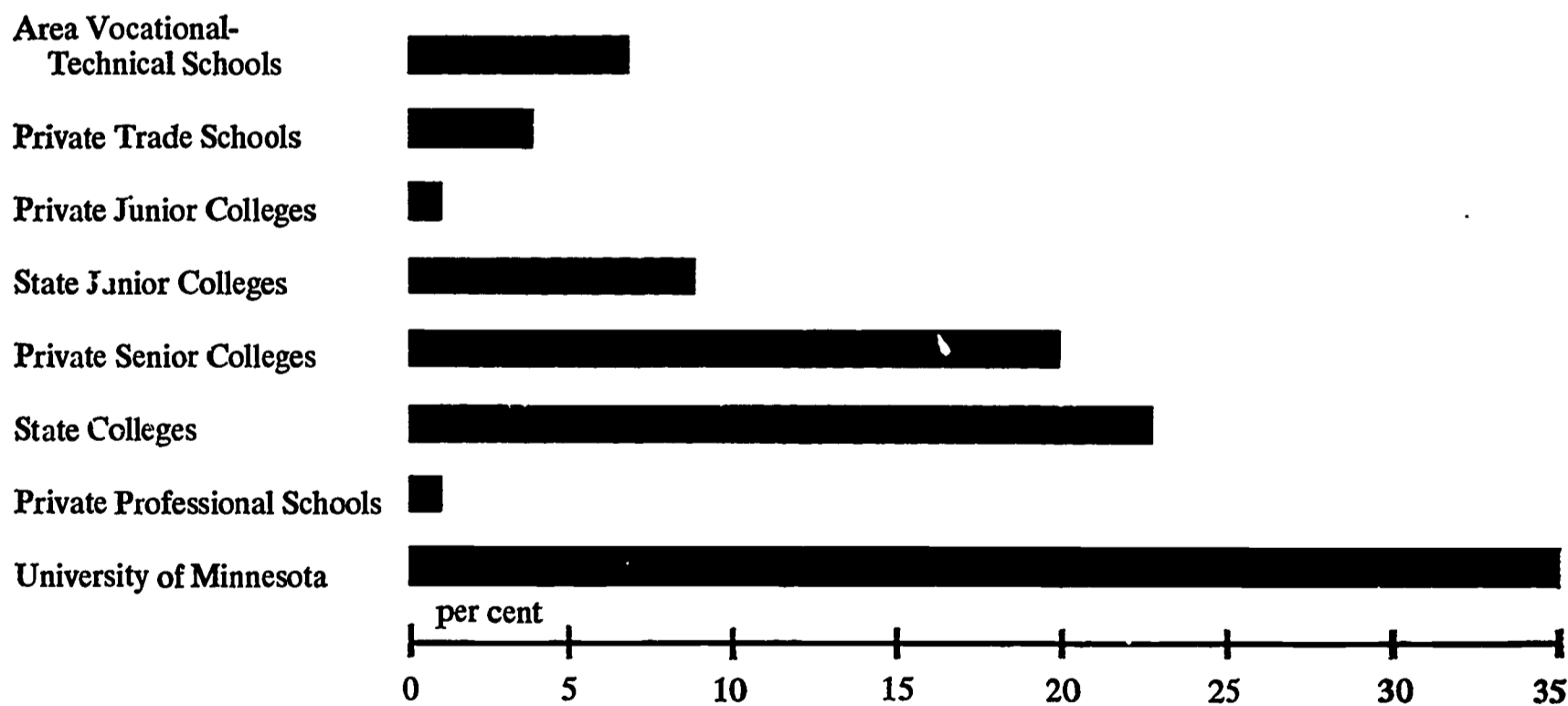
Students enrolled in post-secondary institutions in Minnesota during the fall of 1967 totaled 148,898. Of this number, 117,106 were regularly enrolled college and university students, and 17,537 were college and university extension students. Another 5,507 students attended private vocational and trade schools while 8,748 attended public area vocational-technical schools.

When compared with the four Midwest states which it borders, Minnesota had the second largest enrollment in colleges and universities with 134,643 including extension students. Among these states, Wisconsin colleges and universities enrolled the greatest number of students, 156,553. Total enrollments in Iowa were 99,072 while enrollments in North Dakota and South Dakota were 26,501 and 27,483 respectively.

Enrollment by type of institution.

Seventy-four per cent of the post-secondary enrollment in the fall of 1967, exclusive of extension students, was in public institutions. The largest number of students, 46,090, were enrolled at the four campuses of the University of Minnesota; of these, 39,754 were enrolled at the Minneapolis-St. Paul campus. State colleges, including the new Southwest State College which admitted only freshmen in the fall, enrolled 30,466 students. The sixteen state junior colleges, which included two new institutions this year, enrolled 12,090. An additional 8,748 students were enrolled in area vocational-technical schools in the fall.

The largest numbers of students enrolled in private institutions during the fall of 1967 were in senior colleges. The 23 private four-year colleges and universities enrolled 25,878 students. Minnesota's private trade schools enrolled 5,507 students, while an additional 1,348 students and another 1,234 students were enrolled by private professional schools and private junior colleges respectively.

The largest percentage of post-secondary students, 35 per cent, attended the University of Minnesota. State colleges enrolled 23 per cent and private senior colleges enrolled 20 per cent. Together the three types of colleges and universities enrolled 78 per cent of the post-secondary enrollment, excluding extension students. A comparison of the percentages of the post-secondary enrollments during the fall of 1967 at each

type of institution appears in Figure II:01. More detailed information about enrollments in each of the 26 area vocational-technical schools and the 63 colleges and universities is presented in the tables of Appendix B.

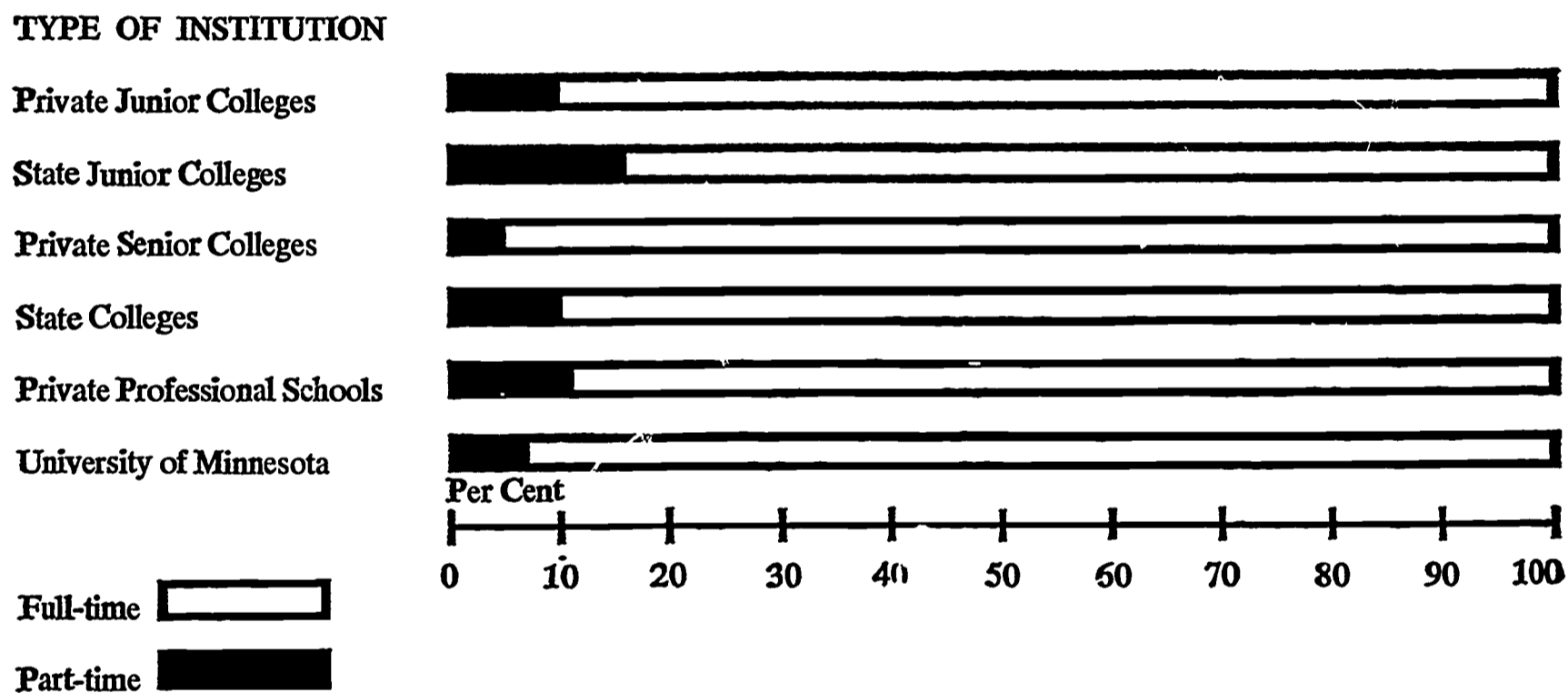
Full-time and part-time enrollment.

Full-time students comprised 92 per cent of the fall enrollment in Minnesota's colleges and universities. Only eight per cent of the enrollment, excluding extension students, was part-time. However, the percentage of part-time students enrolled in public institutions was double the percentage enrolled in private institutions. Part-time students comprised 10 per cent of the enrollment in public colleges as compared with five per cent in private colleges.

State junior colleges reported the highest percentage of part-time students. During the fall of 1967, sixteen per cent of the enrollment in state junior colleges was part-time; while the next largest percentage of part-time students, 11 per cent, was found in private professional schools. Private junior colleges and state colleges each reported that part-time students comprised about 10 per cent of the enrollment at those institutions. The University of Minnesota reported that seven per cent of its enrollment, excluding extension students, was part-time. The smallest percentage of part-time students, five per cent, was reported by private senior colleges.

A comparison of the percentages of full-time and part-time students in the various types of institutions appears in Figure II:02.

Full-time equivalent enrollment.

Since all students do not carry a full load of course work, full-time equivalent enrollment statistics may present a more complete picture of the enrollments in colleges and universities than does an enumeration of total students. Full-time equivalent enrollment (FTE) is calculated by dividing a selected number of credit hours considered to be a normal academic load for a full-time student into the total number of credit hours generated by an institution. Both 12 and 15 credit hours are sometimes considered to be a normal load and both appear in Table B:08 of Appendix B. Because most full-time students tend to carry more than 12 credit hours, 15 more nearly reflects a normal student load and is used in the analysis which follows. Extension students are included.

In the fall of 1967, the full-time equivalent enrollment in Minnesota institutions of higher education was 108,551 compared with a total headcount enrollment of 134,643. The full-time equivalent enrollment in private institutions was 28,081 compared with 28,460 students enrolled. In public institutions the full-time equivalent enrollment was 80,470 compared with 106,183 students. These figures reflect the fact that private institutions enrolled a higher percentage of full-time students than did public institutions.

Full-time equivalent enrollments nearly equaled total enrollments in each of the three types of private institutions during the fall of 1967. Included were the private junior colleges with a full-time equivalent enrollment of 1,173 compared with 1,234 students and the private senior colleges with 25,689 FTE and 25,878

students. In addition, the full-time equivalent enrollment of private professional schools was 1,219 compared with 1,348 students.

The differences between full-time equivalent enrollments and total students were greater for the state junior colleges, the state colleges and the University

of Minnesota. The full-time equivalent enrollment in state junior colleges was 11,159 compared with 12,090 students and the figures for state colleges were 29,408 and 32,889 respectively. The same figures for the University of Minnesota were 39,903 and 61,204. A comparison of full-time equivalent enrollment and total enrollment appears in Table II:01.

The lower full-time equivalent enrollments in state colleges and the University of Minnesota may be accounted for, in part, by the inclusion of extension students who were enrolled in those institutions. The inclusion of graduate enrollments also affected the relationship for the state colleges and particularly for the University, since graduate students usually are expected to carry fewer courses than are undergraduate students. Any judgments about an institution that are based upon full-time equivalent enrollments must take into account the percentages of students at various levels, the kinds of programs in which students are enrolled, and total enrollment data, including the proportion of part-time students.

Enrollment by level.

Freshmen and sophomores totaled 64,834 and comprised 60 per cent of the full-time enrollment in Minnesota's colleges and universities during the fall of 1967. Less than half of that number, 28,809 students, were enrolled as juniors and seniors. They comprised 27 per cent of the full-time students. An additional 12 per cent of the full-time students were enrolled in post-baccalaureate programs, while one per cent of the full-time students were enrolled in other programs.

The proportion of lower division students (freshmen and sophomores) was greater in public institutions than it was in private institutions. On the other hand, the proportion of upper division students (juniors and seniors) was greater in private institutions than in public institutions. Among students enrolled full-time in private institutions, 57 per cent were in the lower division, 37 per cent were in the upper division, five per cent were in post-baccalaureate programs, and one per cent were enrolled in other programs. Sixty-two per cent of the full-time students enrolled in public institutions were in the lower division, while 24 per cent were in the upper division. Students enrolled in post-baccalaureate programs comprised 14 per cent of the full-time enrollment in public institutions, while students enrolled in other programs accounted for only .5 per cent of the full-time enrollment.

Almost all of the full-time students enrolled in junior colleges, both private and public, were classified as freshmen or sophomores. Only two per cent of the full-time enrollment in private junior colleges and less than one per cent in public junior colleges were not so classified. The percentage of the total full-time enrollment in each type of institution at various levels appears in Table II:02.

Full-time students were enrolled at every level in the private senior colleges, the state colleges, and the University of Minnesota. Lower division students comprised 50 per cent of the full-time students in the University of Minnesota, 58 per cent in private senior colleges, and 65 per cent in the state colleges. The percentages of full-time students enrolled in upper division in each of these types of institutions were considerably smaller: 23 per cent in the University of Minnesota, 33 per cent in the state colleges, and 40 per cent in private senior colleges. Post-baccalaureate students comprised a much larger percentage at the University of Minnesota, 26 per cent, than they did elsewhere. One per cent of the full-time students in state colleges were in post-baccalaureate programs and

less than one per cent were enrolled at that level in the private senior colleges.

The greatest proportion of the full-time students enrolled in private professional schools, 93 per cent, were at the post-baccalaureate level. The remaining seven per cent were enrolled in the upper division.

Junior college enrollments, both public and private, constituted 17 per cent of the full-time students enrolled in lower division in Minnesota. Approximately 22 per cent of the full-time students in lower division were enrolled in private senior colleges, while 28 per cent were enrolled in state colleges and 33 per cent in the University of Minnesota. The percentage of the total full-time enrollment at each level, by type of institution, appears in Table II:03.

The University of Minnesota and private senior colleges each enrolled 34 per cent of the full-time upper division students in Minnesota. The state colleges

ranked third with 31 per cent of the full-time upper division enrollment and the private professional schools followed with less than .5 per cent.

The largest percentage of full-time post-baccalaureate students, 87 per cent, attended the University of Minnesota. An additional nine per cent of the post-baccalaureate students were enrolled in private professional schools. State colleges enrolled about three per cent of the full-time post-baccalaureate students, while private senior colleges enrolled slightly more than one per cent.

Because the definition of full-time post-baccalaureate student varies greatly among institutions, the distribution of post-baccalaureate students among the institutions in Minnesota can also be examined in terms of the

full-time equivalent post-baccalaureate students in each institution. Since the course load of post-baccalaureate students is usually less than the 15 credit hours which are designated as the normal undergraduate course load, post-baccalaureate full-time equivalent enrollment is here reported in terms of 12 credit hours. In the table which follows, post-baccalaureate full-time equivalent enrollments are reported for each type of institution along with the percentage of the total Minnesota post-baccalaureate F.T.E. enrollment at each type of institution. Also reported in Table II:04 are the total post-baccalaureate enrollments, including both full-time and part-time students, at each type of institution.

In this context, the largest percentage of full-time equivalent post-baccalaureate students, 73 per cent, attended the University of Minnesota. An additional 14 per cent of the post-baccalaureate students were enrolled in private professional schools. State colleges enrolled about 11 per cent of the post-baccalaureate students, while private senior colleges enrolled slightly more than two per cent.

Enrollment by sex.

Male students outnumbered female students three to two during the fall of 1967. Men comprised 60 per cent of the students enrolled full-time in Minnesota colleges and universities while women comprised 40 per cent. The ratio of men to women was higher among students enrolled in public institutions than among those enrolled in private institutions. Only 38 per cent of the full-time students in public institutions were

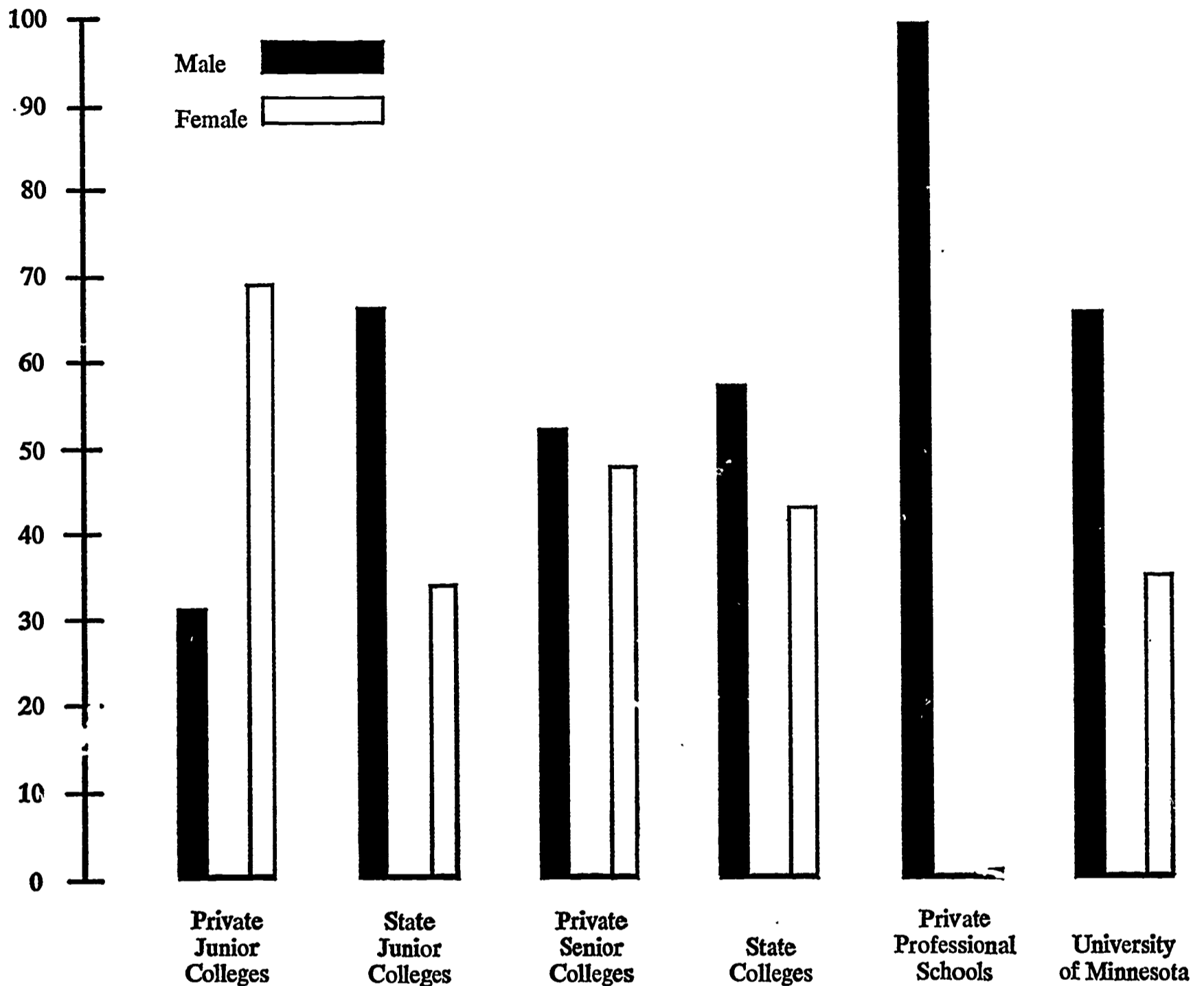
women as compared with 47 per cent in private institutions.

As might be expected, the fewest women were enrolled in private professional schools. Less than one per cent of the students enrolled by the four seminaries and the private law school were women. On the other hand, the highest percentage of women, 69 per cent, was found among the private junior colleges.

The percentages of men and women among full-time students enrolled in state junior colleges were 66 and 34 respectively. The same percentages among full-time students at the University of Minnesota were 65 and 35. The ratio of male to female students was lower among the state colleges where 57 per cent of the full-time students were men and 43 per cent were women. The lowest ratio of men to women, 51 to 49, was reported by the private senior colleges.

A comparison of the percentages of men and women in various types of institutions appears in Figure II:03.

Enrollment patterns by terms

Enrollments in institutions of higher education tend to fluctuate throughout the academic year. Various factors including numbers of students who drop out, transfers between institutions, changes in course offerings, and the once traditional nine-month academic year all affect the numbers of students that enroll in colleges and universities during different terms of the year. Although it has been customary to study enrollments every fall, this report represents an initial attempt to study comprehensive enrollment data collected periodically during an entire academic year in order that a more complete analysis of enrollment patterns in Minnesota might be made. The academic year used for purposes of this study began in Summer 1967 and concluded with Spring 1968. Particular

attention is given to two aspects of enrollment reporting which heretofore received little emphasis: (1) summer session enrollments and (2) changes in enrollments between fall and spring terms.

During the summer of 1967, Minnesota colleges and universities enrolled 31,708 students in the first session of summer school and 21,399 students in the second session. Of the students attending the first session, the University of Minnesota enrolled 14,579, or 46 per cent. State colleges enrolled 11,541 students, or 36 per cent, while private senior colleges enrolled 4,761, or 15 per cent of the students who enrolled in the first summer session. State junior colleges and private junior colleges enrolled 553 and 274 students respectively. Together they enrolled less than three per cent of the students attending the first summer session.

Enrollments dropped in each type of institution during the second summer session. Private senior colleges enrolled 1,552 students during the second session while none of the private or state junior colleges held second sessions. Decreases from first to second summer sessions were less at the state colleges and the University

of Minnesota. State college enrollment dropped to 8,960 in the second session, while the University enrollment decreased to 10,887. A summary of the students enrolled in the first and second summer sessions in the various types of institutions appears in Table II:05.

Information about changes in enrollments during the regular terms of the academic year also contributes to a better understanding of enrollment patterns. Because both the semester and quarter systems are currently used by institutions of higher education in Minnesota, a meaningful comparison of changes in enrollments can only be made between fall and spring terms. Although data about enrollments during winter term appear in Appendix B for those institutions on the quarter system, they are useful only for studying enrollment patterns within an institution or group of institutions which use the quarter system. Because of these factors, winter term enrollment data provide only a partial picture of total enrollments during the

winter months.

In the course of the 1967-68 academic year, total enrollment, including extension students, decreased by eight per cent from 134,643 in the fall to 123,945 in the spring. A large percentage decrease from fall to spring, 11 per cent, occurred in the public junior colleges. The University of Minnesota ranked second in percentage decrease with 10, followed by the state colleges with eight per cent. Private professional school enrollment decreased by seven per cent while private senior college enrollment dropped three per cent. Enrollments in private junior colleges decreased by only two per cent. See Table II:06.

III. ORIGIN AND MIGRATION OF STUDENTS

Minnesota residents comprised 82 per cent of the full-time students enrolled in colleges and universities in Minnesota during the fall of 1967. The proportion of full-time students in public institutions who were Minnesota residents, 89 per cent, was greater than the proportion in private institutions, 65 per cent. When only undergraduate students were compared, the difference in the proportion of Minnesota residents enrolled in public and private institutions was even larger. Ninety-four per cent of the full-time undergraduates enrolled in public institutions were from Minnesota while 65 per cent of the full-time undergraduates in private institutions were Minnesota residents.

The 1967 data indicate little change since 1963, the most recent year when information was available for all the states. At that time, the proportion of Minnesota residents enrolled in public institutions in Minnesota, 89 per cent, was higher than the proportions of home state students in each of the four states which it borders. Minnesota also had a higher percentage of resident students among undergraduates in public institutions, 94 per cent, than did any of the four border states. Wisconsin ranked second in both instances with 84 per cent and 87 per cent respectively. When enrollments in private institutions were compared among the five states, Minnesota ranked fourth with 60 per cent both in terms of the proportion of total enrollment comprised of home state students and in terms of the proportion of undergraduate enrollment comprised of home state students. North Dakota ranked first in both comparisons among the private institutions in the five states.

Counties and areas of origin

While many undergraduate students were enrolled in Minnesota colleges and universities from each of the 87 counties during the fall of 1967, the largest number of students, 22,511, or 27 per cent of the total undergraduates, were from Hennepin County. Ramsey County contributed the second largest number of undergraduates, 10,484, or 13 per cent of the total. The next largest number of students were from St. Louis county which contributed about eight per cent of the undergraduates in Minnesota. The remaining 84 counties in the state each contributed 2.5 per cent or less of the total undergraduates. Together these 84 counties contributed 52 per cent of the Minnesota residents enrolled as undergraduates. Table C:07 presents post-secondary enrollments and numbers of high school graduates by county.

Fourteen Minnesota counties had more than 1,000 residents enrolled as undergraduates in Minnesota colleges and universities in the fall. In addition to the three counties already mentioned, these include: Dakota, Stearns, Anoka, Olmsted, Blue Earth, Clay, Mower, Otter Tail, Washington, Itasca, and Winona. Together the 14 counties provided 67 per cent of the Minnesota residents enrolled as undergraduates compared with 33 per cent from the remaining 73 counties. Table III:01 presents data concerning the 14 counties which sent 1,000 or more undergraduates to Minnesota institutions of higher education in 1967.

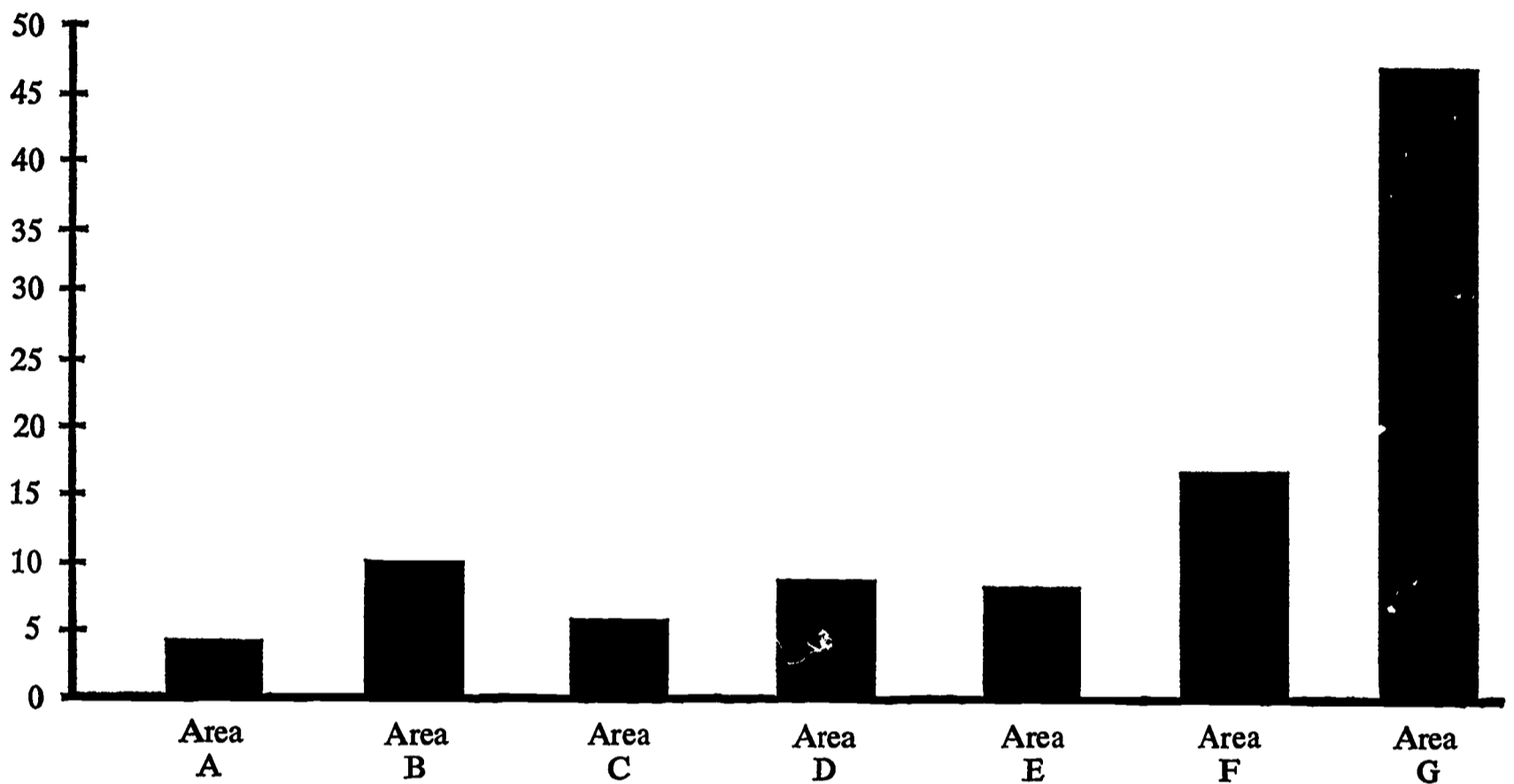
The 87 Minnesota counties have been divided into seven major planning areas which are suggested for use by state and other public agencies for planning

various phases of development. Figure A:01 in Appendix A shows the seven-area system which has been identified by the State Planning Agency. The percent-

age of undergraduates who were residents from each of the Minnesota planning areas appears in Figure III:01. Students from Area G, the Minneapolis-St. Paul metropolitan area, totaled 38,892, or 47 per cent of the total. The next largest number of undergraduates, 13,521 or 16 per cent, came from Area F in south-

eastern Minnesota. Ten per cent of the undergraduates who were Minnesota residents came from Area B in the northeastern part of the state. The four remaining areas together provided 27 per cent of the total undergraduate enrollment from Minnesota.

Since 1960 the number of undergraduates attending Minnesota colleges and universities from each of the planning areas has grown. The total increase from 1960 to 1967 was 36,155 students. Not all planning areas have contributed equally to the increase, however. Undergraduates from Planning Area G increased by 17,927 during the period from 1960 to 1967 and contributed almost 50 per cent of the total increase. Dur-

ing the same period, the number of undergraduates from Area F increased by 5,796 and accounted for 16 per cent of the total gain. Increases in the remaining planning areas were eight per cent or less and together accounted for 34 per cent of the total increase. Additional information concerning increases in undergraduates from 1960 to 1967 in each of the planning areas appears in Table III:02.

Migration of students.

Only 18 per cent of the full-time students enrolled during the fall of 1967 in Minnesota colleges and universities were not residents of Minnesota. In 1963, the most recent year when data relevant to the migration of students among all states and territories were available, 19 per cent of the students in Minnesota colleges and universities were not Minnesota residents. An equally small percentage of the Minnesota residents who attended college that year, 16 per cent, were enrolled in institutions of higher education in other states. Although students who do not attend college in their home state have comprised a relatively small percentage of college enrollments in the past, the movement of these students among the states, especially those states in close proximity to Minnesota, could affect the number of students to be educated in Minnesota.

During the fall of 1963, 12,592 Minnesota residents attended out-of-state colleges. This number included 8,430 students who attended college in the twelve states of the Midwest region, of which 5,524 attended college in a border state. Students coming from all other states to attend college in Minnesota during the same year totaled 15,103. Of this number, 9,756 students, including 5,974 residents of border states, were from the Midwest region. The difference between the number

of students leaving Minnesota to attend college and the number of students coming to Minnesota to attend college was very small among the border states. The differences increased somewhat with respect to the Midwest region and the United States.

Of the 15,103 students coming from other states to attend college in Minnesota, 57 per cent attended private institutions. The percentage of the students coming to Minnesota from the Midwest region who enrolled in private institutions was 63 per cent. The percentage among students coming to Minnesota private institutions from the four bordering states was 61 per cent.

The tendency of those Minnesota residents who attended college out-of-state to enroll in private institutions seemed to increase as the distance between Minnesota and the state in which they attended college widened. Forty-two per cent of the 5,524 students attending college in border states were enrolled in private institutions. The percentage increased to 54 among Minnesota residents attending college in the Midwest region and to 56 among Minnesota residents attending college in all states and territories other than Minnesota. Additional information about the migration of students among bordering states, the Midwest region, and the United States appears in Table III:03.

During the fall of 1963, out-migration and in-migration of students tended to equal one another among the border states, particularly for undergraduate students since the number of undergraduates coming to Minnesota was only 47 greater than the number going to border states. At the first professional and graduate levels, the numbers of students coming to Minnesota from border states were somewhat larger than the numbers of Minnesota residents leaving the state for advanced education.

The same situation did not exist with regard to the differences registered by students migrating to or from Minnesota within the Midwest region. Although the total difference, 1,326, was greater for the Midwest

region than it was for the bordering states, the greatest difference, 1,146, appeared at the undergraduate level.

The only instance in which the out-migration of Minnesota students exceeded the in-migration of students of a similar level occurred among first professional students when Minnesota was considered in relation to the United States. The number of Minnesota residents at the first professional level who attended colleges throughout the United States was 815 as compared with 738 students coming to Minnesota from elsewhere. More complete data on the in-migration and out-migration of students at various levels among the border states, the Midwest region and the United States appears in Table III:04.

Public institutions in Minnesota enrolled 3,426 students from the four border states during the fall of 1967. Among the bordering states, Iowa contributed the greatest number of students, 1,505, to Minnesota's public colleges and universities. The largest number of Iowa students attended Mankato State College. The second largest in-migration of students, 874, came from Wisconsin and enrolled for the most part, at the Minneapolis-St. Paul campus of the University of Minnesota and at Winona State College. Most of the 770 students coming from North Dakota to Minnesota public institutions attended Moorhead State College, while most of the students coming from South Dakota enrolled in the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis-St. Paul campus.

State colleges enrolled 59 per cent of the students who migrated to Minnesota public institutions from the

four bordering states. Thirty-one per cent of these students attended the University of Minnesota and nine per cent were enrolled in public junior colleges. Of the 2,027 students who attended state colleges from border states, 957 were enrolled at Mankato State College and 582 were enrolled at Moorhead State College. In-migration to the University of Minnesota primarily affected the Minneapolis-St. Paul campus where 1,053 of the 1,086 students coming to the University from bordering states were enrolled. The only public junior college with a sizable in-migration was Rochester State Junior College with 202 students from bordering states.

Summary data which show the numbers of students from the bordering states who attended public institutions in Minnesota appear in Table III:05.

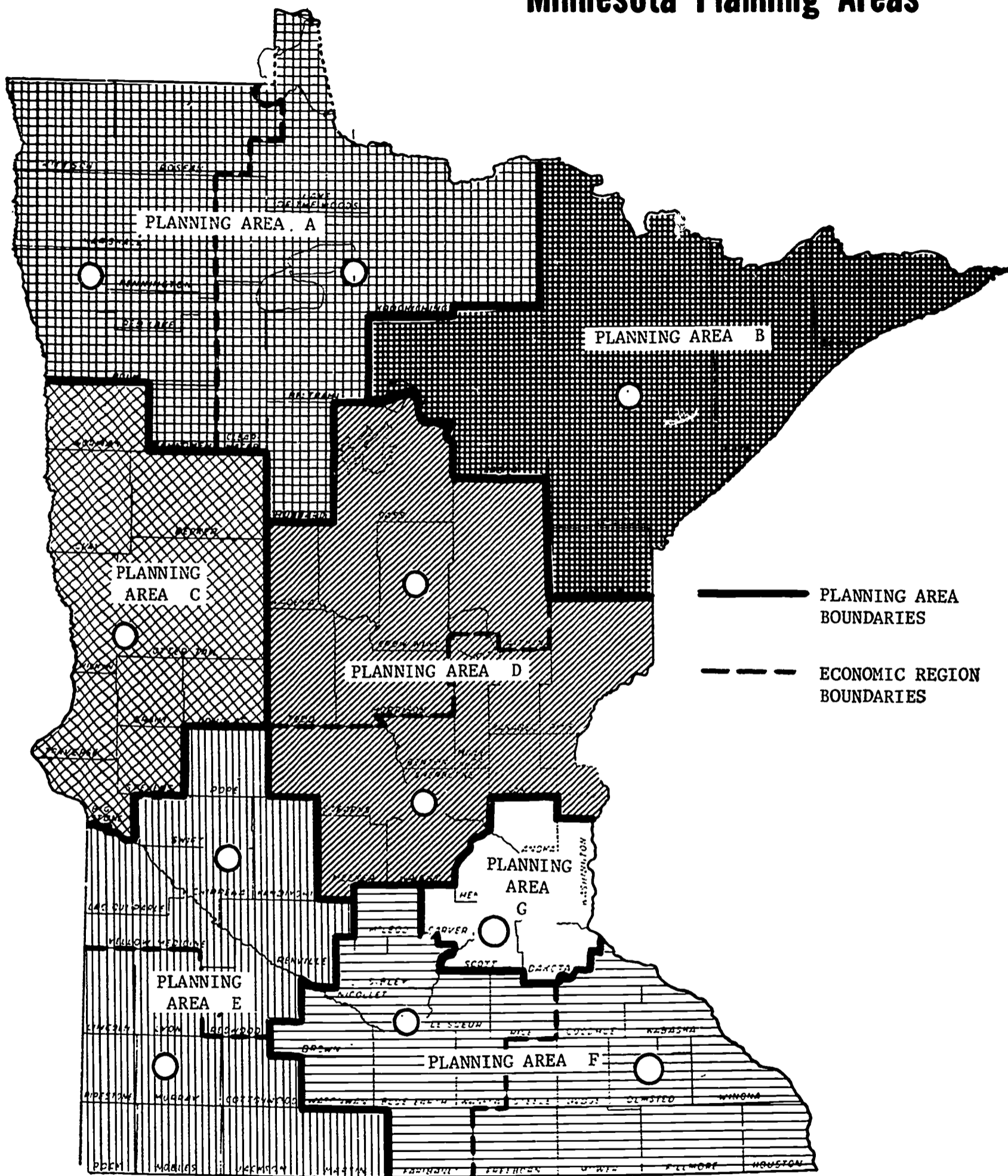
