This ERIC curriculum package is intended to help people use the ERIC database, and may be used in a workshop setting under the guidance of a trainer or independently by individuals who want to learn about the ERIC system and how they can search the database and use its contents and services. The package consists of the following parts: (1) a self-instructional guide with four learning modules; (2) a set of transparencies for each module; (3) appendices (a list of ERIC Network Components, an ERIC Reproduction Release form, a list of ERIC Publication Types, an EDRS Document Order form, a list of Internet Access Points to ERIC, Evaluation Quiz Answer Keys); and (4) a set of Quick Search Cards, with step-by-step instructions for searching ERIC on Dialog OnDisc and SilverPlatter. The four modules are entitled "Introduction to ERIC," "How Documents Are Selected," "How to Search ERIC," and "How to Access ERIC Print Materials and Other Services." Each module contains a performance objective, a list of required materials, an instructional strategy, and an evaluation statement. There are also short questions to help trainees focus on pertinent information, exercises to help trainees develop the skills identified in the module, and a summary evaluation quiz. Also included are the following supplemental materials: ERIC Ready References--Search Aids, Document Delivery, What Kinds of Documents Are in the ERIC Database (RIE), Journals Currently Covered by "Current Index to Journals in Education," and ERIC at a Glance; Product Summary: ERIC on CD-ROM; and "All about ERIC," a 38-page publication providing a detailed overview of ERIC. USE OF THE CURRICULUM PACKAGE

This ERIC curriculum package, specifically designed for ERIC users and ERIC trainers, may be used in a workshop setting under the guidance of a trainer or independently by individuals who want to learn about the ERIC system and how they can search the database and use its products and services. The complete package consists of these parts:

- This self-instructional guide with four learning modules
- A set of transparencies for each module
- Relevant ERIC publications, such as brochures and ready references
- A set of QuickSearch Cards, with step-by-step instructions for searching ERIC on Dialog OnDisc and SilverPlatter

Each module in the package contains a performance objective, a list of required materials (most of which are enclosed), an instructional strategy, and an evaluation statement. Within each module is information relevant to the objective, short questions to help trainees focus on pertinent information, exercises to help trainees develop the skills identified in the objective, and a summary evaluation quiz with a corresponding answer key in Appendix F: Trainees should successfully complete one module before proceeding to the next.

The guide offers an introduction to the ERIC system, including the purpose of ERIC, types of materials in its database, selection criteria, major publications and products, and user services. It explains how and why individuals use ERIC and offers strategies for searching ERIC and accessing products and services. This guide, along with the materials contained in the package, provides professionals and first-time users with the information they need to get the most out of the ERIC database and system.

Of additional benefit to users of this package is the video "ERIC: In Action," which presents an overview of ERIC as a primary source of educational information. This 15-minute video covers four major topics: basic structure, major benefits, key index features, and options for locating materials. Although the video is not included in this package, it is available for purchase through ACCESS ERIC and the ERIC Clearinghouse on Information and Technology. See Appendix A for addresses.

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INTRODUCTION TO ERIC

WHAT IS ERIC?

- An educational information system
- An information system supported by the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Educational Research and Improvement
- A system that consists of the ERIC Program Office (OERI), ACCESS ERIC, the ERIC Document Reproduction Service (EDRS), the ERIC Processing and Reference Facility, Oryx Press, 16 subject-oriented clearinghouses, and additional adjunct clearinghouses.

The ERIC System (Transparency #1.1)

The Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) is a national information system designed to provide users with ready access to an extensive body of education-related literature. Established in 1966, ERIC is supported by the U.S. Department of Education, Office of Educational Research and Improvement (OERI). The ERIC system consists of the ERIC Program Office (OERI), ACCESS ERIC, the ERIC Document Reproduction Service (EDRS), the ERIC Processing and Reference Facility, Oryx Press, 16 subject-oriented clearinghouses, and additional adjunct clearinghouses. (*Transparencies #1.2 to #1.5*, Ready Reference #19, and Appendix A)

The ERIC database, the world's largest and most comprehensive source of education information, contains more than 800,000 abstracts of documents and journal articles on all aspects of education. You can access the ERIC database online via commercial vendors and public networks, on Compact Disc, Read Only Memory (CD-ROM), or through the printed abstract journals, Resources in Education and Current Index to Journals in Education. Updates to the database are made monthly, except for the CD-ROM, which is updated quarterly. (Transparency #1.6)

ERIC collections can be found in hundreds of institutions and agencies throughout the world, and ERIC searches can be conducted at many locations, including the ERIC clearinghouses, university libraries, state libraries, and many large public libraries. You can find the location of microfiche collections near you by calling ACCESS ERIC at (800) LET-ERIC.

Purpose of ERIC (Transparency #1.7)

The main purpose of ERIC is to identify, collect, and disseminate "fugitive" documents—documents that are not readily available from commercial sources. ERIC does this by building and maintaining a database of appropriate educational materials including journal literature and making the materials available in microfiche and/or paper copy and through library collections and interlibrary loan. ERIC also produces major publications and provides a variety of user products and services to help the education community—researchers, teachers, administrators, school boards, students, and parents—keep informed about current education-related issues.

Materials in the Database (Transparency #1.8)

Educational materials found in ERIC include curricula, research reports, state-of-the-art papers, literature reviews, bibliographies, teaching guides, practice applications, and program evaluations, as well as education-related journal articles. ERIC covers all areas of education-elementary and early childhood education; higher education; information technology; community colleges; educational management; counseling and student services; disabilities and gifted education; languages and linguistics; social studies/social science education; teaching and teacher education; assessment and evaluation; reading, English, and communication skills; rural education and small schools; urban education; science, mathematics, and environmental education; and adult, career, and vocational education. What is not found in ERIC are nonprint audiovisual materials, large numbers of dissertations, and comprehensive statistics. (See Ready References #16 and #17.)

Database Development (Transparency #1.5)

The primary function of an ERIC clearinghouse is to contribute to the development and maintenance of the ERIC database. This requires a comprehensive program to identify and acquire high quality educational materials in sufficient quantity to ensure continuous development of the database. Documents are acquired from organizations that regularly submit their publications for inclusion in ERIC, through clearinghouse requests, and through individual submissions of research reports, conference papers, and other education-related work.

Acceptance of submitted documents is not automatic. As documents are acquired, they are screened by subject specialists using established criteria, such as contribution to the literature; relevance; innovativeness; timeliness; effectiveness of presentation; authority of the author, source, or sponsor; responsiveness to current priorities; and applicability to a broad audience. Because ERIC seeks to provide a total information system, including document availability, reproducibility standards are of prime importance as well. Through the screening process, the documents of highest quality and greatest worth are selected for entry into the database and then cataloged, indexed, and abstracted by clearinghouse staff in preparation for announcement in Resources in Education (RIE) and on the computer tapes. Database development also includes the acquisition, selection, and processing of journal articles for Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE).

ERIC invites all of its users to consider submitting education-related works for inclusion in the database. Knowing the selection criteria can guide users in submitting documents suitable for ERIC.

WHAT ARE SOME FACTS ABOUT OUTREACH AND DISSEMINATION SERVICES?

Outreach and Dissemination Services

ERIC services include database searching, document delivery, reference, referral, and partner networking.

Database Searching (<u>Transparency #1.10, Product Summary; ERIC on CD-ROM</u>)

ERIC offers individuals the opportunity to conduct their own searches of the database, with or without assistance, or to contract with a search service to have one conducted for them. Access to the ERIC database is provided at most university libraries, state departments of education, state libraries, teacher centers, and through the Internet.

The ERIC database can be searched by computer or by using the printed indexes—Resources in Education (RIE), which contains document literature, and Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE), which contains the journal literature. Computer searches are particularly appealing because they are fast, comprehensive, and have the capability to pick up any term or phrase in the title or abstract, which may be important if you are looking for new terms/ideas that may not have been indexed. However, computer searches may be expensive and may retrieve irrelevant material.

Individuals who wish to conduct their own computer searches may do so using CD-ROM at many university, state, and public libraries. Those who have their own computers and modems can access ERIC through many public and commercial networks, including the Internet, CompuServe, America Online, and America Tomorrow. Manual searches are particularly effective for looking up new materials on a single topic as they may lead to unexpected discover es that would not appear in a computer search.

ERIC Publications and User Products (*Transparency #1.11*)

Each year, the various ERIC clearinghouses identify critical issues within their scope areas and select topics for major publications. Authorities in the field are commissioned to write the manuscripts, which include information analysis papers, compilations, or practitioner-oriented monographs. These publications are designed to provide information on high priority topics to meet the needs of a variety of audiences—researchers, practitioners, policymakers, the press, and the general public.

In addition to the major publications, each clearing-house produces products—minibibliographies, packaged searches, and other publications that review, synthesize, and analyze existing literature. ERIC Digests, two-page research syntheses, are among the ERIC system's most popular offerings. ERIC Digests provide information on research findings and practice applications, frequently in a question/answer format; overviews of emerging topics; updates of areas; and synopses of review and synthesis papers. (Transparency #1.12)

Many clearinghouses also produce an information brochure about their products and services, an acquisition brochure, and a publications list. Some clearinghouses produce newsletters or information bulletins that include news of the ERIC system, summaries of major publications, and information about services and products.

ERIC produces numerous products designed to help users access and use the information in the ERIC database. (*Transparency #1.13* and Ready Reference #13.) These include the following:

Abstract journals. ERIC produces two monthly abstract journals that are the print version of the database. Resources in Education (RIE), which announces current education-related documents, can be obtained from the U.S. Government Printing Office (GPO) (202-783-3238). Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE), which announces education-

- Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors. The complete list of index terms used by the ERIC system, with crossreferences and rotated and hierarchical displays, is available from Oryx Press. This publication is very helpful in developing a database search strategy.
- Directory of ERIC Information Service Providers.
 This directory lists the address, telephone number, and ERIC collection status for more than 1,000 organizations that offer ERIC access to users. It is available from ACCESS ERIC.
- ERIC Users' Interchange. This free newsletter, published twice a year, provides technical information on database searching, recent ERIC database developments, and other user aids to libraries, education media centers, and other places the ERIC database is searched. Subscriptions are offered by ACCESS ERIC.
- ERIC Identifier Authority List. This list of searchable key words not found in the Thesaurus is available from the ERIC Facility. It includes geographic locations, proper names, program names, and terms not represented by descriptors.
- ERIC database tapes. Institutions interested in computer tapes of the ERIC database for programming their own search interface may purchase them from the ERIC Facility.

- All about ERIC. This handy reference booklet provides detailed descriptions of each component in the ERIC system and its products and services, along with information on how to access them.

- Parent-teacher brochures. These free publications synthesize and summarize significant findings of recent educational research on topics of interest to parents and educators.

- Essays, position papers
- Resource guides

Identify Documents Suitable for ERIC

Resources in Education (RIE) and Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE) constitute the ERIC database. Obtaining comprehensive information in each clearinghouse's scope area is a prime function of ERIC.

Individuals may voluntarily submit documents that they believe suitable to a clearinghouse's scope of work. ERIC partners and other organizations, agencies, state departments of education, professional associations, and university departments or school systems can also submit documents.

The types of documents sought for the ERIC database include the following (see Ready Reference #2):

- Research reports
- Program descriptions and evaluations
- Annotated bibliographies
- Curriculum guides
- Conference papers
- Conference proceedings
- Instructional materials
- Lesson plans and teaching guides
- Essays, position papers
- Resource guides

Determine If the Document Meets the Established Criteria for Selection (Transparency #2 1)

Because ERIC is a selective database, subject specialists assess the appropriateness of documents for entry into RIE. The two primary criteria considered when assessing the appropriateness of a document are the needs of ERIC's wide audiences and whether the document fits the subject areas covered by the appropriate clearinghouse. Consider the following list of selection criteria as you decide whether to submit a document to ERIC.

• Suitability to the clearinghouse's scope of work

There are 16 ERIC clearinghouses, each focusing on a specific area of education. A list of these clearinghouses appears in Appendix A.

Documents submitted to a clearinghouse that are outside its scope, but of suitable quality, will be transferred to the appropriate clearinghouse. Documents deemed unsuitable will not be processed or transferred to other clearinghouses.

• Contribution to knowledge; significance

Documents should be based on well-designed experiments or orderly collections of data. Research reports, for example, are examined in terms of stated objectives; hypotheses tested; and methodology, conclusions, and recommendations.

Relevance

Relevance is defined as the extent to which the document deals with issues that are current and of contemporary interest to the educational community.

- Innovativeness or new application of knowledge
 This criterion refers to applicability of knowledge or methods to new areas or new problems.
- Effectiveness of presentation; thoroughness of reporting

Documents are rejected if they are poorly written, misuse the technical devices of their presentations, fail to provide sufficient infor-



mation to judge or follow up on the adequacy of their work, or offer conclusions that are not supported by data.

• Responsiveness to current priorities

Educational priorities are established by the governments and institutions responsible for the conduct of education. Priorities may be established at the national, regional, state, local, or professional level. Documents dealing with high priority issues are given special consideration.

Timeliness

The document should be current in terms of the work being done in the area with which it is concerned.

- Authority of author, source, or sponsor
- Applicability to a broad audience
- Sensitivity to minority, ethnic, and gender concerns
- Balance on controversial issues
- Reproducibility
- Legibility

Because ERIC seeks to provide a total information system, including document availability as well as announcement and abstracting, reproducibility standards for RIE documents are of prime importance. If a document does not meet legibility and reproducibility standards, the processing staff will request a better copy before determining that the document must be rejected.

WHAT ARE SOME ADVANTAGES TO SUBMITTING DOCUMENTS TO ERIC?

- Free publicity
- Wide dissemination
- Quick retrievability

<u>Submit Suitable Documents to an ERIC Clear-inghouse</u> (*Transparency #2.2*)

There are several advantages to submitting materials to ERIC. These include free publicity, wide dissemination, quick retrievability via online database search services, and the fact that ERIC documents never go out of print. ERIC sends a complimentary microfiche to each contributor when the document is announced in RIE.

Individuals who wish to submit documents to ERIC must follow these steps:

- 1. Identify the appropriate clearinghouse based on the relevance of the document to the clearinghouse's given educational area or scope.
- 2. Prepare one legible copy of the document. Documents should be easy to read with clear, dark type on white or light background. They may be typeset, typewritten, photocopied, or otherwise duplicated. Standard 8-1/2" x 11" paper is preferred. Very small type, light dotmatrix type, and dark colored paper do not reproduce well.
- 3. Complete a Reproduction Release Form. (A copy of this form appears in Appendix B.) The Reproduction Release Form gives ERIC permission to reproduce and disseminate the document, but does not preclude the author selling the publication or having it published elsewhere.
- 4. Mail the document and completed Reproduction Release Form to the appropriate ERIC clearing-house, to the attention of the Acquisitions Coordinator. If you are unsure which clearing-house is appropriate, mail the document and form to the ERIC Processing and Reference Facility.

Select the Type of ERIC Search to Conduct (Transparency #3.1)

If you choose to have a professional searcher conduct your search, be sure you have a clear idea of what you want from the search. Typically, the searcher will ask questions to clarify the topic and determine any limitations on it. Some searchers will request a list of key words or descriptors to help them develop the search strategy. Others will just ask what is desired and develop the strategy from their own notes. Either way, it is important that the person making the request knows exactly what he or she wants as an outcome. Of the individuals who wish to conduct their own searches, some may access ERIC and other databases through their home or office computers.

(See the QuickSearch Cards included in this package. These cards contain step-by-step instructions for searching ERIC on Dialog OnDisc ERIC and SilverPlatter.)

Internet. For those who have full Internet service, connection for a search can be made to the university computer systems providing Internet access to ERIC resources—Harvard University, Auburn University, the University of Saskatchewan, State University System of Florida, and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Directions for connecting to each of the universities to search ERIC via the Internet are provided in Appendix E.

Online searches. This option requires time, expertise, equipment—a modem as well as computer, the corresponding telecommunications software, and a contract with one of the database vendors.

Manual searches. A manual search can be done at any library or center that subscribes to RIE and CIJE. To search ERIC manually requires the following steps:



1. Obtain monthly and cumulative issues of RIE and CIJE.

- 2. Look in the index under the descriptors identified for the search.
- 3. Read the titles (and abstracts) to find subject-relevant information.

CD-ROM searches. CD-ROM searches can be done at most university libraries. The library offering this search service will have directions on the information retrieval system for searching the ERIC database. Most university libraries have this technology.

<u>Choose Appropriate Descriptors</u> (<u>Transparency</u> #3.2)

Whether you are searching ERIC directly or having someone else search it for you, any search of the ERIC database requires identification of ERIC descriptors (subject index terms). The following steps describe how to choose appropriate descriptors for a given ERIC search.

- 1. <u>Describe the topic you wish to investigate</u> and summarize your description in sentence and paragraph form. Underline words and phrases that identify the key aspects of the topic.
- 2. Identify the subtopics of the information you wish to investigate—educational level, type of material desired, teaching method, and so forth. These subtopics will help to limit the search. For example, for the topic "computer-assisted instruction" (CAI) you could limit the search by looking only at CAI in postsecondary institutions, CAI implementation strategies, or CAI in science. The list of subtopics should specify the scope and limitations of the search.
- 3. Translate your topic and subtopics into ERIC descriptors (subject index terms). To do this consult the Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors.

The Rotated Descriptor Display in the back of the Thesaurus may also be helpful. Also, read the introduction to the Thesaurus which contains information helpful to searches (e.g., ERIC indexing rules), and useful parts of the descriptor entry, such as the scope note and related and narrower terms.

The *Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors* is the key to using the controlled vocabulary of the ERIC database. It contains over 8,000 subject descriptors and cross-references to all fields of education. These descriptors are used to index every document or journal article in the database.

- 4. Locate the descriptors you have identified in the Alphabetical Descriptor Display (the main part of the Thesaurus). Following is a sample entry for the topic "social studies." Note the information provided in this display for the descriptor.
 - Read the Scope Notes (SN) for information on how ERIC uses the terms. A Scope Note (SN) is a brief statement of the intended usage of a descriptor. It may be used to clarify an ambiguous term or to restrict the usage of a term. Special indexing notes are often included. (See the description next to SN in the sample entry.)
 - Note the Used For (UF) reference, which generally refers to terms synonymous with the main term but <u>not</u> used by ERIC. [For the sample entry, UF term is "social studies units" (1966 1980).]
 - If the term you selected seems too broad, see if there is a Narrower Term (NT) that will fit. Always use the most specific, or narrowest, term that seems appropriate.
 - If your search retrieves too few records, try again using a Broader Term (BT). Think of synonyms or related terms. You may choose to combine several of the Related Terms (RT) with your original term to



create a larger set; use the Boolean operator OR to connect similar descriptors.

5. Make a final list of the descriptors most likely to have been used in the indexing process to represent your topic.

Exercise: Select a topic to investigate. List any subtopics relevant to the search you desire.

Use the Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors to identify the descriptors you would use in conducting your search.

Find and record the ADD DATE, POST-ING NOTE, SN, UF, NT, BT, and RT for the descriptor you select.

Determine any refinements or ways to limit or expand the search.

Follow Proven Search Strategies

Search Using Subject Terms (Descriptors) with ANDs and ORs.

Although the software used to search ERIC will depend on which system is used, all searching is based on Boolean logic: the computer creates sets of information based on the way you tell it to combine subject terms.

For example, to find out how computer networks can be used to improve high school students' writing, you could use the Thesaurus to find these subject descriptors: "computer networks," "high school students," and "writing skills."

If you want to find records that are indexed under all of these concepts, you would use the AND command to tell the computer to find the intersection of these three subsets.

If more information on this topic is needed, use the Thesaurus to locate additional relevant descriptors and add them to your concept sets by using the OR operator. When the OR command is used, documents and articles indexed with either descriptor are searched and combined in a set.



WHAT OTHER WAYS CAN YOU SEARCH ERIC?

- By author

Search by Title, Author, Specific Journal, or Audience (*Transparencies #3.4 and #3.5*)

To locate journal articles or other publications on a particular education topic, searching by descriptors (subject terms) is usually the best approach. There are other ways to search ERIC, such as by title, author, or specific journals.

If you cannot locate instructions for searching ERIC by title, author, or the approaches listed here, ask a librarian for help or call an ERIC clearinghouse. (Note that the details of how you search ERIC will vary depending on the software system, so, whenever possible, it is best to get instructions from someone who knows the system you are using.)

Search by Identifiers

Identifiers are searchable key words not found in the *Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors*. They are often proper names or concepts not yet represented by approved descriptors. Identifiers are used to index geographic locations, personal names, test or program names, specific legislation, and so forth. Examples include: Curry Test of Critical Thinking, Gallaudet College DC, Japan United States Textbook Study Project, and Piaget (Jean).

Search by Publication Type (also called Document Type)

In addition to being indexed according to descriptors and identifiers, ERIC documents are categorized by their form of publication. You may want to specify document types in your search strategy to locate particular kind of document, such as teaching guides, research/technical reports, tests/evaluation instruments, or books.

A complete list of ERIC publication/document types appears in the *Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors*. (See Appendix C for this information.)

Limit Search by Year of Publication

A search can be limited by the publication dates of documents and articles. For example, you may know before running your search that you want materials only from the last 5 or 10 years. The year of publication can be included as a limiting



factor in your original search strategy, or it can be used to modify a search if you find more abstracts than you need.

Conduct Free-Text Searching

Free-text searching enables you to search for unique words and phrases found in titles or abstracts. This approach is useful if you do not know the best descriptor to use, or know that there is no indexing term for a concept. For example, you could search the phrase "Head Start" to locate information on that topic. (The results of this search would show you that "Project Head Start" is searchable as an identifier.)

Exercise: Conduct a manual or CD-ROM computer search for the topic of "cultural influences" and modify with "classroom communication."

Obtain Copies of Documents and Journal Articles (Transparencies #4.1 and #4.2)

The materials described in the ERIC database have either an "ED" or an "EJ" number.

Those identified with "ED" followed by six digits are documents. You can get the full text of most EDs by going to a library or other site with an ERIC microfiche collection. Over 1,000 libraries throughout the world subscribe to this collection. To locate the ERIC collection in your area, call any ERIC component. Most libraries or facilities having microfiche collections will have other ERIC services such as microfiche reproduction and searching.

Microfiche and paper copies of most ED items may be ordered from ERIC Document Reproduction Services (EDRS) in Alexandria, VA; phone (800) 443-ERIC. (Or, you may use the order form that is included in Appendix D.) Orders may also be placed directly with the producer (if one is listed in the "Availability" field of the ERIC database record). Many ERIC information service providers also have a reproduction service.

Items identified with "EJ" followed by six digits are articles from education journals. You can get many of these journals at research or university libraries or by requesting them through interlibrary loan. Reprints are also available from several article reproduction services, including—

- Institute for Scientific Information (ISI) (800) 523-1850



Search Steps

Develop search strategy

Know exactly what you are looking for. Be as specific as possible. Use the Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors or the ERIC Identifier Authority List to select terms that describe your topic. Separate your topic into concepts such as vocational education, adult literacy, secondary education; translate those concepts into ERIC descriptors; limit as necessary. Sometimes, condensing your search question into a single written sentence helps to clarify the topic and simplify the strategy.

Begin your search

Log on to the system and begin a new

search.

Enter search terms

Separately type the terms selected for each concept using the OR operator. When all concepts are selected, use the AND operator to combine them.

Limit your search

Limit the output by year, by document type, by major descriptor, or by foreign language.

Display results

To ensure that the materials that you have retrieved are relevant, look at some of the citations.

Print or download results Select citations that are relevant and either download the results to a diskette or print them.

Using the ERIC Thesaurus on Dialog Ondisc ERIC

All documents and journal articles in the ERIC database are assigned standardized terms from the *Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors* to assist in locating relevant material. Searching by descriptor allows you to conduct a more precise search. In addition to descriptors, ERIC also uses identifiers to index materials. Identifiers are key words not found in the thesaurus. They are often proper names or concepts not yet represented by approved descriptors. Identifiers are used to index geographic locations, personal names, test or program names, legislation, and so forth. They are listed in the *ERIC Identifier Authority List* (IAL). If you do not have a print copy of the thesaurus or IAL, and are searching ERIC on CD-ROM, you can easily locate appropriate terms.

A list of terms appears that includes the word or phrase you typed, the number of records containing that term, and the number of related terms. Any term with related terms and/or a large number of postings will be a descriptor or an identifier. Press F10 when you have selected all relevant terms.

An additional option is to select Major ERIC subject headings. When you type a term, the number of records in which it appears as a major descriptor or identifier will be given. If the term is not a descriptor, the number will be zero.

Major subject headings will identify only those records in which your topic is the major focus of the document or journal article. You will retrieve fewer citations but they will be more precise.

Minor ERIC subject headings

Terms that are not usually majored include the mandatory educational level descriptors such as ELEMENTARY EDUCATION, SECONDARY EDUCATION, or ADULT EDUCATION; terms that identify document types or parts of the document such as CURRICULUM GUIDES, TABLES (DATA), or QUESTIONNAIRES; or the term FOREIGN COUNTRIES, which is used to designate material that is about or from a country outside of the United States. These will be majored only if they are the primary focus of the document.



If you don't know the terms you want to select, choose F9. (You can also press ESC and a menu command will appear. Select T for Thesaurus.) You will be asked to type a word or phrase and a list of terms will appear. Select from that list.

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


Searching ERIC on SilverPlatter

FIND: Type the terms you want to search. If you are using ERIC descriptors or identifiers, separate words in a phrase with a hyphen, e.g., vocational-education. If you are searching a single word descriptor, you can put a hyphen at the end, e.g., adults-, or add a field label, e.g., disabilities in dem. You will retrieve those documents or journal articles indexed with that descriptor. Adding dem limits the search to those items indexed with a major descriptor.

Enter all possible terms for a single concept, separating them with the Boolean operator OR, e.g., career-education OR career-awareness OR career-guidance.

When all terms have been entered, combine the concepts with the Boolean operator AND, e.g., #5 AND secondary-education, or #5 AND #8.

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





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The Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) is a federally funded, nationwide information network designed to provide you with ready access to education literature.

At the heart of ERIC is the largest education database in the world—containing more than 800,000 records of journal articles, research reports, curriculum and teaching guides, conference papers, and books. Each year approximately 30,000 new records are added. The ERIC database is available in many formats at hundreds of locations.

ERIC presents education information in a format convenient to users. More than 20 years ago, ERIC became the first commercial online database. In 1986 the ERIC database became available for searching on CD-ROM (compact disk, read-only memory).

Now ERIC is at the forefront of efforts to make education information available through computer networks. ERIC is available to thousands of teachers, administrators, parents, students, and others through electronic networks, including the Internet, CompuServe, America Online, America Tomorrow, and GTE Educational Network Services. Network users can read and download information on the latest education trends and issues. On some systems, users can direct education-related questions to AskERIC and get a response from an education specialist within 48 hours.

ERIC also offers customized assistance through a network of subject-specific education clearinghouses that provide toll-free reference and referral, and free or low-cost publications on important education topics.

The **ERIC** system, managed by the U.S. Department of Education's Office of Educational Research and Improvement (OERI), consists of 16 clearinghouses, a number of adjunct clearinghouses, and additional support components.

The ERIC Clearinghouses collect, abstract, and index education materials for the ERIC database; respond to requests for information in their subject areas; and produce special publications on current research, programs, and practices.

The ERIC Document Reproduction Service (EDRS) produces and sells microfiche and paper copies of documents announced in the ERIC database.

The ERIC Processing and Reference Facility is the technical hub of the ERIC system that produces and maintains the database and systemwide support products.

ACCESS ERIC coordinates ERIC's outreach, dissemination, and marketing activities; develops systemwide ERIC publications; and provides general reference and referral services.

This publication will help you understand how you can use the resources available from ERIC to meet your needs.



ERIC is the largest education resource in the world and serves the information needs of a wide spectrum of users, allowing:

Teachers—to obtain the latest information on preservice and inservice training; learn about new classroom techniques and materials; and discover resources for personal and professional development.

Administrators/School Boards—to identify new and significant education developments, learn new management tools and practices, and assist local and state agencies in planning education programs.

Students—to gain access to the latest information for preparing term papers, theses, and dissertations; obtain information on career development; and build a personalized, low-cost education library.

Parents/General Public—to learn about new developments in education, gain information on the role of parents and the public in child development and school improvement, learn about adult continuing education, and keep abreast of new legislation on education.


Researchers/Professors—to keep up to date on research and practice, avoid duplication of research efforts, and obtain full-text research reports.

Librarians/Information Specialists—to compile bibliographies and summaries on specific education topics, search the ERIC database for answers to queries, and locate and order documents.

Professional Organizations—to keep members abreast of trends and issues in specific areas of education, and obtain current information for association publications and position statements on education issues.

Civil Servants—to conduct research in education-related areas; verify research results; stay informed of international, national, regional, state, and local issues; and develop legislation and policy.

Journalists—to gather background information, provide resources for articles and programming, and monitor trends and issues in education.







Whether you need a little information or a lot ERIC is an excellent resource for research summaries on current, high-interest topics; references to recent journal articles; complete research reports, books, or curriculum guides; or extensive bibliographies.

Reference and Referral Services

ERIC offers free reference and referral services to the public through its network of clearinghouses, ACCESS ERIC, and electronic AskERIC question-answering services. Staff are available to provide ERIC publications, answer questions about ERIC, locate hard-to-find documents, and refer you to other appropriate information sources. It is best to call an ERIC Clearinghouse if you have a subject-specific question. Toll-free phone numbers for the clearinghouses are listed in Part 2. You can call ACCESS ERIC (1-800-LET-ERIC) for help in using the ERIC system or for the latest information on electronic AskERIC services.

Publications Produced by ERIC

The ERIC system produces more than 250 special publications each year. These publications provide you with the latest research and practice information on current, high-interest topics.

Clearinghouses produce free and low-cost publications, including brochures, newsletters, pamphlets, monograph series, and bibliographies. ERIC Digests, which are two-page research syntheses, are among the ERIC

system's most popular offerings. There are currently more than 1,000 Digests, and approximately 100 new titles are produced each year. For information on clearinghouse publications, turn to the list of ERIC Clearinghouses starting on page 17 and contact those that cover your subject.

The ERIC Database

The ERIC database contains more than 800,000 bibliographic records of research reports, conference papers, teaching guides, books, and journal articles. Figure 1 shows a typical ERIC document resume.

If a publication has an ERIC Document (ED) number, you can probably find a copy at any one of the more than 900 libraries that maintain an ERIC microfiche collection, or you can purchase a microfiche or paper copy from the ERIC Document Reproduction Service (1–800–443–ERIC). For publications that are not available from ERIC, the abstract will include information on where you can get a copy.

More than 800 education-related journals are covered in ERIC. Figure 2 shows a typical ERIC journal article (EJ) resume.

Copies of journal articles can be obtained from library periodical collections; through interlibrary loan; from the journal publisher; or from article reprint services such as University Microfilms International (UMI), 1–800–521–0600, or Institute for Scientific Information (ISI), 1–800–523–1850. 

Personal Computers

Commercial Services

If you have a personal computer with a modem, you can use it to access ERIC information. Commercial networks such as America Online, CompuServe, and GTE Educational Network Services all feature "AskERIC" information on current topics in education. Many of these services offer all or part of the ERIC database, which can be searched using key words, titles, authors, or other approaches.

A personal computer and modem can also be used to search ERIC and many other databases for a fee by signing up with commercial online database vendors such as Bibliographic Retrieval Services (BRS) or DIALOG Information Services. (See commercial vendor addresses and phone numbers on page 34.)

Libraries and Information Centers

ERIC is available at most university libraries, many public libraries, and other professional libraries and education resource centers—more than 1,000 of which are designated as ERIC information service providers. Most of these locations also have a substantial ERIC microfiche collection and microfiche reader/printers for making copies of ERIC documents.

ERIC Clearinghouses

All of the ERIC Clearinghouses have toll-free numbers and information specialists to help you. Even if you have access to ERIC on your personal computer or at a convenient library, you may want to contact the clearinghouse that covers your education topic. Clearinghouses offer free and inexpensive publications and tips on how to search the ERIC database, and can often refer you to other sources of information. The ERIC database has bibliographic information and abstracts on two types of materials: ERIC documents (with ED numbers) and journal articles (with EJ numbers).

With the expansion of computer access to information, there has been increasing interest in full-text electronic access to ERIC documents and articles, which would allow you to print or download the complete text of the ones you want. The ERIC system is exploring ways to make more of the database available in full text and has made the popular ERIC Digests available through the ERIC Digests Online File. You can get complete copies of ERIC Digests from many electronic sources, including most CD-ROM versions of ERIC, the online vendors, and several Internet hosts.

Until electronic full text becomes available for other ERIC database references, here's how you get copies:

ERIC Documents

Most publications with ED numbers can be found at any library that has the ERIC microfiche collection.* At these locations you can read the publications and make copies for a nominal per-page charge on a microfiche reader/printer. To locate the microfiche collection nearest you, call ACCESS ERIC at 1–800–LET–ERIC.

You can also purchase microfiche or paper copies of most ERIC documents from the ERIC Document Reproduction Service (EDRS), which accepts orders by toll-free phone call, fax, mail, or online (through DIALOG, BRS, and OCLC). For more information or to order documents, contact:

Wherever you choose to run a computer search of the ERIC database, the result of the search wili be an annotated bibliography of journal (EJ) and document (ED) literature on your topic. There are a few important tips to keep in mind to ensure that your search meets your needs.

Find the best way to access the ERIC database

You can now use ERIC from your personal computer, at university libraries, at many public and professional libraries, and through contacting the ERIC Clearinghouses. Before you decide where to search ERIC, ask these questions:

- How much will it cost?
 You may have free or inexpensive access to ERIC. If not, you may have to pay for connect time on some computer systems or order a search through a search service.
- How much of the ERIC database is available?
 Some services provide access to the entire ERIC database, which goes back to 1966; others may allow you to search only the last 5 or 10 years of ERIC. If this is important to you, find out how much of ERIC is available before choosing a search system.
- How long will it take?
 Turnaround time can vary from a few minutes, if you have direct access to ERIC on a personal computer, to several days or longer if you have to order a search that someone else will run for you.
- How much flexibility does the search system offer?
 Many different software systems are used to search ERIC. Some menu-driven search

systems make it easy for a first-time user, but may limit opportunities to make changes to the search question. If you try searching ERIC and feel you cannot locate exactly what you are looking for, ask your librarian for help or call an ERIC Clearinghouse.

Use the Thesaurus of E7:1C Descriptors

Every one of the more than 800,000 articles and documents in the ERIC database has been given subject indexing terms called *descriptors*. Before you run an ERIC search, it is important to take a few minutes to find the ERIC descriptors that best capture your topic.

For example, articles and documents about the development of children's social skills would be indexed under the descriptor *interpersonal competence*. The ERIC descriptor for children at risk is *at risk persons*. When you search for information about high school students, you can use the descriptor *high school students* but would miss a lot of material if you did not also use the descriptor *secondary education*.

Locations that offer ERIC searches should have reference copies of the *Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors*, and some search systems allow access to the *Thesaurus* while running your search.

If you cannot locate a copy of the Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors, call the ERIC Clearinghouse that covers your subject and ask for help with the search strategy. (See the toll-free numbers in Part 2.)




Know your ANDs and ORS


Although the software used to search ERIC will depend on which system is used, all searching is based on Boolean logic: the computer creates sets of information based on the way you tell it to combine subject terms.

For example, to find out how computer networks and e-mail can be used to improve high school students' writing, you could use the *Thesaurus* to find these subject descriptors: computer networks, high school students, and writing skills.

If you want to find records that are indexed under **all** of these concepts, you would use the AND command to tell the computer to find the intersection of these three subsets.



If **more** information on this topic is needed, use the *Thesaurus* to locate additional relevant descriptors and add them to your concept sets by using the OR operator. When the OR command is used, documents and articles indexed with **either** descriptor are searched and combined in a set.






Plan Your Search Strategy

To plan your ERIC search, follow these steps:

- 1. write the topic in your own words;
- 2. divide the search into major concepts; and
- 3. use the *Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors* to locate the subject descriptors for each concept of the topic.

Here's an example of how a search topic/question can be turned into an ERIC search strategy:

Additional Search Tips

To locate journal articles or other publications on a particular education topic, searching by descriptors (subject terms) is usually the best approach. There are other ways to search ERIC, for example, by title, author, specific journals, and even target audience (i.e., whether the publication was intended for teachers, students, parents, etc.).

If you cannot locate instructions for searching ERIC by title, target audience, or the approaches listed below, ask a librarian for help or call an ERIC Clearinghouse. (Note that the details of how you search ERIC will vary depending on the software system, so whenever possible it is best to get instructions from someone who knows the system you are using.)

Here are some other ways to search ERIC:

Identifiers

Identifiers are searchable key words not found in the *Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors*. They are often proper names or concepts not yet represented by approved descriptors. Identifiers are used to index geographic locations, personal names, test or program names, specific legislation, and so forth. Examples include: Curry Test of Critical Thinking, Gallaudet College DC, Japan United States Textbook Study Project, and Piaget (Jean).

Publication Types (also called Document Types)

In addition to being indexed according to descriptors and identifiers, ERIC documents are categorized by their form of publication. You may want to specify document types in your search strategy to locate a particular kind of document, such as: teaching guides, research/technical reports, tests/evaluation instruments, and books.

A complete list of ERIC publication/document types appears in the *Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors*.

Year of Publication

A search can be limited by the publication dates of documents and articles. For example, you may know before running your search that you only want materials from the last 5 or 10 years. The year of publication can be included as a limiting factor in your original search strategy, or it can be used to modify a search if you find more abstracts than you need.

Free-Text Searching

Free-text searching enables you to search for unique words and phrases found in titles or abstracts. This approach is useful if you do not know the best descriptor to use, or know that there is no indexing term for a concept. For example, you could search the phrase "Head Start" to locate information on that topic. (The results of this search would show you that "Project Head Start" is searchable as an identifier.)









Consider sharing your own work with others by submitting it to ERIC. If you have recently authored a research report, program description or evaluation, literature review, teaching guide, conference paper, or other education-related work, you can make it permanently available and accessible to others through ERIC.

Organizations that wish to sell copies of their original documents can have this availability (together with address and price information) announced in the bibliographic record. Studies have shown that availability from ERIC does not reduce sales from the original source, since purchasers prefer an original copy over one reproduced from microfiche. After the document is sold out at the original source, it will still be available through the ERIC Document Reproduction Service (EDRS), if permission to reproduce has been granted to ERIC.

Acceptance of submitted documents is not automatic; all documents submitted to ERIC are evaluated by subject experts according to the following criteria: contribution to knowledge, significance, relevance, newness, innovativeness, effectiveness of presentation, thoroughness of reporting, relation to current priorities, timeliness, authority of source, intended audience, and comprehensiveness.

To submit your publication, send ERIC one legible (laser printer quality) copy of your report, speech, paper, or other document to be considered, and a completed Reproduction

Release Form (see Appendix, page 35). The Reproduction Release Form grants ERIC permission to reproduce and disseminate the document, but does not preclude your selling the publication or having it published elsewhere.

You may send your publication to the clearinghouse that covers your topic. (See list of ERIC Clearinghouses in Part 2.) If you are uncertain which clearinghouse is appropriate or if you have questions about submitting your work, contact:

Libraries and resource centers can make ERIC available on even a modest budget. The ERIC database is available in print, online, and on CD-ROM. Full-text copies of ERIC documents can be ordered either on microfiche or paper.

Computer Searching CD-ROM

In 1986 ERIC became the first major bibliographic database marketed on CD-ROM, and this product has been extremely popular ever since. CD-ROM (compact disk, read-only memory) technology allows vast quantities of data to be stored on compact disks, which are searchable at self-contained personal computer stations. To access the ERIC database on CD-ROM, you need to have a personal computer, a CD-ROM system, and a subscription to one of the CD-ROM vendors.

ERIC CD-ROM products are updated quarterly and sold on a set-fee subscription basis. which makes them a cost-effective option for libraries that offer open access. Advances in networking technology allow multiple users to access a single CD-ROM database simultaneously; ask any vendor about a multiuse license.

Five vendors currently produce ERIC on CD-ROM for both IBM and Macintosh platforms. The systems are designed to be used with little instruction, yet they offer powerful search features. For a list of CD-ROM vendors' addresses and phone numbers, see page 34.

Online Access Through Commercial Services

Online access to ERIC is available through several commercial vendors. Most of these vendors offer sophisticated search capabilities, the ability to access the entire ERIC database (from 1966 to the latest month) at once. and access to a host of other databases that may interest users. One must be trained in the vendor's search language to make use of the most powerful search capabilities, therefore this type of searching is usually performed by librarians and other professionals. Costs include membership fee and charges based on the number of minutes connected to the service and the number of citations downloaded.

OCLC, or the Online Computer Library Center, is an online bibliographic utility used by thousands of libraries around the world. OCLC offers FirstSearch, an information service designed for direct use by library patrons. ERIC is one of many databases accessible through FirstSearch. Fees and access policies for this service are determined by the host library.

Commercial online vendors' addresses and phone numbers are listed on page 34.

Locally Mounted Systems

An increasing number of institutions, especially universities and state university systems, are mounting ERIC data on their mainframes for use by their clientele. The host insti-

tutions bear the cost of maintaining the database, select the search software, and determine their own access policies. In

some cases, the ERIC database is linked to the library's online public access



catalog (OPAC) and searched with the same interface. To buy the ERIC database tapes for programming and mounting, call the ERIC Processing and Reference Facility at 1–800–799–ERIC (or see the Facility's address and local phone number on page 22).

Print Indexes

Manual searching of ERIC can be provided by subscribing to the print indexes: Resources in Education (RIE) and Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE).

Resources in Education covers the educational document literature and contains five types of indexes: subject, author, institution, publication type, and Clearinghouse/ED number. RIE is printed monthly and is available by subscription from:

ERIC Microfiche

Approximately 95 percent of the documents announced in ERIC are available on microfiche from the ERIC Document Reproduction Service (EDRS). More than 900 organizations

subscribe to the complete ERIC microfiche collection, and others subscribe to partial or subject-specific collections.

Libraries and resource centers with substantial budgets will want to invest in the entire ERIC microfiche collection, but you can purchase specialized collections that suit your budget and your specific areas of interest. Subject-specific collections are available in each of the 16 areas covered by the ERIC Clearinghouses. For example, you can purchase a microfiche collection on elementary and early childhood education or on reading and communication skills. EDRS also sells special collections on current hot topics, including alternative assessment; restructuring schools; multicultural education; and black history, culture, and literature



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Adjunct Clearinghouses

Clearinghouses that are associated with and contribute to the ERIC system, and have narrower scopes than the 16 major ERIC Clearinghouses. Adjuncts often have funding from sources other than the Office of Educational Research and Improvement. Adjuncts are usually affiliated with one of the major clearinghouses and perform many of the same functions.

Boolean Logic

A system, named after the English mathematician George Boole, for symbolizing logical statements by using the operators AND, OR, and NOT. Boolean logic is often used in information retrieval to define the limits of a computer search. The Boolean operator AND finds records containing both terms, OR finds records containing either one or both terms, NOT finds records containing the first term but not the second.

CD-ROM

Acronym for "compact-disk, read-only-memory." These disks can hold up to 250,000 pages of text which can be searched and retrieved using microcomputers. The ERIC database is available in this format from several vendors.

Clearinghouses

Components of the ERIC system that are funded to collect, abstract, and index education materials for the ERIC database; respond to requests for information in their subject areas; and produce special publications on current research, programs, and practices.

Descriptors

Subject terms used to index and search for documents and journal articles in the ERIC database.

Digests

Two-page research syntheses or overviews of education topics.

ERIC Information Service Provider A library or other information center that provides individuals with access to the ERIC database and related resources. ERIC Information Service Providers do one or more of the following: provide online or CD-ROM access to the ERIC database; maintain sizeable collections of ERIC microfiche; and subscribe to and collect ERIC publications, including Resources in Education (RIE), Current Index to Journals in Education (CIJE), the Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors, and/or ERIC Clearinghouse publications.

ERIC Partners

Agencies and organizations with constituencies interested in education that have expressed a willingness to facilitate the exchange of information between ERIC and their constituents.

Identifiers

Searchable key words used to index documents and journal articles in the ERIC database. Identifiers are used to index geographic locations, personal names, test or program names, and other concepts not covered by descriptors.

Internet

The international computer network consisting of many smaller networks that are interconnected.


Online

An "online" function is performed with the user in direct contact with the computer, interacting in real time.

Online Vendors

Organizations that maintain databases and related software on their computer systems and sell online retrieval time to clients at multiple remote locations.

Each year, approximately 30,000 new records are added. Whether your assignment concerns the latest teaching methods, educational approaches, or research, start by searching ERIC.

ERIC is a great resource for education students, and a large percentage of the information requests to ERIC last year came from classroom teachers. Every week close to 300 teachers send questions to AskERIC's e-mail address. Electronic networks for teachers in Texas, New York, Massachusetts, Washington, Florida, and

Missouri feature ERIC on their menu systems, as do a number of regional and school district networks. If you're on a network, ERIC is likely to be



there now or soon. For teachers who don't yet have computer network access, ERIC is available in many large public libraries and at teacher resource centers.

Staff provide ERIC publications, answer questions about ERIC, help you locate hard-to-find documents, and refer you to other information sources. 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

Minibibliographies Short, often annotated lists of citations from the ERIC database.

Major Publications Comprehensive papers that review and synthesize research in a particular field, examine important trends and issues, or offer guidelines for practice that are based on research.

ADD DATE - date descriptor first used.

CIJE: 3,578 RIE: 5,347

POSTING NOTE - number of times descriptor used in CIJE and RIE.

SN Social studies consist of adaptations of knowledge from the social sciences for teaching purposes at the elementary and secondary levels of education

SN - SCOPE NOTE - brief statements of intended usage of descriptor. Useful when trying to decide among descriptors.

UF Social Studies Units (1966 1980)*

UF - USE FOR - these terms are synonyms that are not used by ERIC.

NT Civics

NT - NARROWER TERM - terms with more specific meanings than the descriptor. Use the narrowest term appropriate to your need.

BT Curriculum Social Sciences BT - BROADER TERM - terms whose meaning encompasses the descriptor, and more. Use if the first search retrieves too few citations.

A study examined the situation-specific program development strategies used in 47 different settings in the southwestern United States from January 1987 to January 1988. Specialized and elite interviews were administered to program developers to identify the approaches that are being used and to determine how they relate to the approaches described in the adult education literature. The responses given during the interviews indicated that most of the programs for actll learners were focused on problem solving and information giving and were normatively defined by the sponsoring agency, with the program developer acting as a solution giver and resource linker. The information gathered during the interviews indicated that what is being practiced in reality is not what is prescribed by any one approach in the literature. It was hypothesized that program developers who state that theories and formulas in the literature do not always apply in their situation may have factors and forces in their situation that may call for adjustments or modifications of the approaches advocated in the literature. The interviews conducted would seem to indicate that program development can be viewed as a process used to link various agent and client systems for the deliberately undertaken action of learning. 
