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
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ABSTRACT


In March 1978 there were 12 million persons of Spanish origin in the United States: about 7.2 million of Mexican origin, 1.8 million of Fuerto Rican origin, 700,000 of Cuban origin, 900,000 of Central or South American origin, and about 1.5 million of other Spanish origin. Of these, 85% resided in metropolitan areas. About 42% were under 18 years old, while only about 4% were 65 years old and over. Among those 25 to 29 years old, 57% had a high school education, as compared with only 30% of those 45 to 64 years old. About 21% of the families had incomes below the poverty level in . 1977; only 9.7% had incomes of \$25,000 or more. About 80% of the men were in the civilian labor force compared with 45% of the women. The median income for the men was \$7,797 while the median income of the women was \$3,669. Although both men and women of Spanish origin were about equally likely to be currently married in March 1978, the men were more likely than the women to have never been married, and the women were more likely than the men to be either widowed or divorced. This report presents advance data, collected in March 1978 by the Census Bureau, on the demographic, social and economic characteristics of persons of Spanish origin. Characteristics presented include age, sex, marital status, educational attainment, employment status, occupation, and income. Data on residence, income, and poverty status are shown for families of Spanish origin. (NQ).

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Persons of Spanish Origin in the United States: March 1978

This report presents advance data on the demographic, social, and economic characteristics of persons of Spanish origin in the United States. This statistical information on the Spanish origin population was collected in March 1978 by the Bureau of the Census as a supplement to its monthly Current Provilation Survey (CPS). Characteristics presented include age, sex, marital status, educational attainment, employment status, occupation, and income. Data on residence, income, and poverty status are shown for families of Spanish origin.

HIGHLIGHTS

- In March 1978, there were 12 million persons in the United States who reported that they were of Spanish origin. About 7.2 million were of Mexican origin, 1.8 million of Puerto Rican origin, 700,000 of Cuban origin, 900,000 of Central or South American origin, and about 1.5 million of other Spanish origin (figure 1, table 1).
- The Spanish origin population included a substantially larger proportion of young persons than did the population not of Spanish origin; about 42 percent of all persons of Spanish origin were under 18 years old, compared with only 29 percent of persons not of Spanish origin. Furthermore, only about 4 percent of persons of Spanish origin were 65 years old and over, as compared with 11 percent of persons not of Spanish origin (table 2).
- Although both men and women of Spanish origin were about equally likely to be currently married in March 1978, the men were more likely than the women to have never been married, and the women were more the likely than the men to be either widowed or divorced (table 3).
- Among the younger adults of Spanish origin, those 25 to 29 years old, 57 percent had completed at least a high school education, as compared with only 30 percent of Spanish origin adults 45 to 64 years old (figure 2, table 5).
- The proportion of persons of Spanish origin 16 years old and over in the labor force varied by sex. About 80 percent of Spanish origin men were in the civilian labor force compared with only 45 percent of Spanish origin women (figure 3, table 7).

- A relatively small proportion of employed men of Spanish origin were working in farm occupations (5 percent). However, about 58 percent of employed Spanish inen were bluecollar workers; another 24 percent were white-collar workers; and 13 percent were service workers. Of all employed women of Spanish origin, about one-half were white-collar workers, one-fourth blue-collar workers, and one-fifth service workers (table 6).
- Spanish origin men with income had lower median incomes in 1977 than men who were not of Spanish origin (\$7,797 and \$10,261, respectively). The median income of Spanish origin women with income in 1977 (\$3,669) was substantially lower than that for Spanish origin men (\$7,797), and somewhat lower than the median income of women not of Spanish origin (\$3,956) (table 8).
- Most families of Spanish origin live in metropolitan areas. In March 1978, 85 percent of all Spanish origin families resided in metropolitan areas, as compared with 65 percent of the families not of Spanish origin (table 4).
- A smaller proportion of Spanish origin families had high incomes in 1977 than families not of Spanish origin. Only 9.7 percent of Spanish origin families had incomes of \$25,000 or more compared with 23 percent of families not of Spanish origin (table 9).
- About 21 percent of Spanish origin families had incomes below the poverty level in 1977, as compared with about 9 percent of families not of Spanish origin (table 10).

Since the estimates in this report are based on a sample, they may differ somewhat from the figures that would have been obtained if a complete census had been taken. The chances are about 68 out of 100 that an estimate from the survey differs from a complete census figure by less than the standard error (a measure of the sampling variability that occurs because a sample rather than the whole of the population was surveyed). If a complete census instead of a sample survey had been taken in March 1978, the chances are about 68 out of 100 (one standard error) that the census would show the total number of persons of Spanish origin to be within the range of 11.7 to 12.4 million persons, and the chances are about 95 out of 100 (twice the standard error) that the census total would be between 11.4 and 12.7 million persons.

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Information in this report on persons of Spanish origin was obtained from responses to the following question:



Persons of Spanish origin were persons who reported themselves as Mexican-American, Chicano, Mexican, Mexicano, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish origin. Persons who reported themselves specifically as Mexican-American, Chicano, Mexican, or Mexicano were consolidated into the one category—Mexican. Tables in this report show data for some or all of the subcategories of persons of Spanish origin—Mexican, Puerto

Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, and other Spanish origin. A more inclusive report on the characteristics of these persons is forthcoming.

Rounding. The numbers in this report are in thousands and were rounded to the nearest thousand without being adjusted to group totals; hence, the sum of the parts may not equal the total shown. Also, because of rounding, the figures may differ slightly from table to table, and individual percentages may not always add to 100 percent.


Symbols.—A dash (—) represents zero or rounds to zero. The symbol "B" means that the base for the derived figure is less than 75,000.














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NOTE

In the past the Census Bureau has designated a head of household to serve as the central reference person for the collection and tabulation of data for individual members of the household (or family). However, recent social changes have resulted in a trend toward recognition of more equal status for all members of the household (or family), making the term "head" less relevant in the analysis of household and family data. As a result, the Bureau is currently developing new techniques of enumeration and data presentation which will eliminate the concept of "head." While much of the data in this report are based on the concept of "head," methodology for future Census Bureau reports will reflect a gradual movement away from this traditional practice.


