Did you know?

- ☐ The top three causes of 1998 farm-related injuries in Iowa were machinery (26 percent of all injuries), animals (20 percent), and tractors (12 percent). However, the severity of these injuries differs. Only 11 percent of injuries caused by animals resulted in hospitalization while 15 percent of injuries involving machinery and 27 percent of injuries involving tractors lead to treatment.
- ☐ Acute chemical injury accounted for one percent of the total reported agricultural injuries in 1998.
- ☐ Tractors remain the number one killer of lowa farmers with 14 deaths reported. Other types of machinery caused nine deaths.
- ☐ Youth age 19 and younger made up 17 percent of the total number of farm-related injuries. Fifty-six percent of the 293 injuries to youth were work-related. Five children under age 14 died as a result of farm-related injuries.
