1. Introduction

The Republic of Yemen is located in the Middle East, bordering Saudi Arabia to the north, Oman to the northeast, the Gulf of Aden to the south and the Red Sea to the west with an area of 550,000 square kilometers and a population of approximately 21 million., according to 2004 census, The country is divided into 21 administrative units, called governorates.

Aden is a major port on the Red Sea and is the economic capital of the Republic of Yemen. The city is located at the tip of the Arabian Peninsula. Its position near the entrance to the Red Sea has made the city one of the busiest re-fueling stations in the world; servicing most of the ships that pass through the Suez Canal. Due to such proximity to the container port terminal, Aden was declared a free trade zone in May 22, 1991, and became the economic and commercial capital of Yemen. The city plays an important role in the economic life of Yemen as it contains a number of industries, most importantly is the oil refinery which started production in 1954. The refinery, the port complex and the new Aden Container Terminal (ACT) are the principal sources of employment in the Governorate.

However, despite such comparative advantages, the local authority is facing serious difficulties in the provision of quality and quantity basic services to both citizens and investors, attract investment to expand employment and services, and to define effective and sustained urban poverty reductions policies.

The main socioeconomic challenges that the city now confronts are: Worsening poverty, unemployment, lack of skill match, limited access to commercial credit facilities, complex regulatory procedures and massive real estate speculation. In terms of urban governance, Yemeni local governments were severely limited in addressing the problems their cities faced because of a highly centralized decision making process. However, due to the far-reaching Local Authorities Law enacted in February

Issue No.3 June 2009 2000, one of the most innovative decentralization efforts in the Middle East and North Africa region, decision-making is being transferred from the central level to popularly elected local councils charged with supervising the activities of the newly decentralized line ministries.

Information and data are important in making right decisions. However, at present only limited information and data are available for decision makers, particularly for business people who make decisions on investing their scarce capital. Therefore this study was carried out to collect and put together basic information and data required for economic decisions at district and governorate levels.

2.Objectives

The overall objective of the study is to make available information and data required for economic decisions in particular, information and data on the availability of resources and demand potentials for new businesses and development of existing businesses, at district and governorate levels.

The specific objectives of the study are:

- 1- To assess the resources available natural, agricultural and human present utilization and future scope for further exploitation.
- 2- To analyze the basic infrastructure facilities physical and organizational available.
- 3- To examine the present status of existing industries with a view to determine the scope for new industries, expansion and modernization and establishing backward and forward linkages.
- 4- To identify new industries having potential for development based on resources, demand and skills available in the area.
- 5- To assess the needs for various facilities and incentives for the development of industries in the area.

3- Methodology and sampling

The study is based on both secondary and primary sources of information. Secondary sources of information - published and unpublished documents - were basically used in collecting information and data for the purposes of preparing district A Journal of Administrative Sciences and Economics...... Issue No.3 June 2009 and governorate level profiles. Primary sources of information included structured/unstructured interviews and questionnaire.

For collecting data about small enterprises, four districts were selected. These were Seera, Al Maala, Al Mansoora and Al Shek Othman. Total of 100 small entrepreneurs were selected using systematic sampling procedure, and distributed equally between the selected districts. 25% of the sample was assigned for female owned enterprises.

4. Demographic and Socio-economic Profiles at Governorate and District Levels:

4.1 Geographical Location:

Aden governorate is bounded by Lahej governorate in the north and the west. In the east is Abyan governorate and in the south is the Aden Gulf. The governorate has an area of 344 square kilometer.


The governorate is administratively divided into eight districts, namely. Seera, Khormaksar, Al Maalla, Al Shek Othman, Al Mansoora, Dar-sad and Al Burayka. There are eight district level local councils, one in each district, and one governorate level local council.

4.2 Climate, Rainfall and Humidity:

Aden lies in the hot desert belt that is marked by high temperature, especially in summer. The average annual temperature in Aden is $29.2C^0$. In summer, the highest average temperature is $33.2C^0$ and in winter, the coolest average temperature is $24.8C^0$.


The average highest humidity is 90% and the average lowest humidity is 34%. The average annual rainfall is less than 0.50mm, which is very little.

4.3-Water Resources:

Pipe water is the main source for domestic and industrial users. Total quantity produced was 36,256,000 cubic meter, and total quantity consumed was 25,761,000 cubic meter. Total number of subscribers registered was 111,209 and total number of beneficiaries was 778,463 in the year 2004.

4.4 Population:

The 2004 census revealed the resident population of Aden governorate was 589,419. The population growth rate in 2004 was 3.8%. If this population growth rate continues, the population of Aden governorate is expected to double by the year 2010 (SYB, SCO, 2006).

The age distribution of the population showed that the child population (1-4 years old) constituted 36 percent of the total population. The population of age group (15 - 64 years) constituted 61% and the age group (65+ years) constituted 3%.

Chart 3: Population of Aden Governorate by District and Sex - 2007





Chart 4: Percentage Distribution of Population of Aden by District - 2007



4.5 Education:

Educational level of the population of the governorate is an important characteristic as educational attainment often observed to be determining the socio-economic development process. Overall, a little less than one third (28%) of the population of Aden governorate are illiterate. Illiteracy is higher among females than males (20% among males and 38% among females).

With regard to educational attainment, the total number of students in the basic education (1 - 9 level), in the educational year 2005/2006, registered was 96,735 students (51,231 males and 45,504 females) distributed in 87 basic schools in Aden governorate. Number of students in secondary level (10 - 12 level) was 19,325 students distributed in 28 secondary schools.

At the university level, the number of students in Aden University has increased from 4,415 students in the academic year 1990/1991 to 20,462 students in the academic year 2004/2005. Number of new students admitted has increased from 1.677 students in 1990/1991 to 8,500 students in 2004/2005. Number of graduate students for the year 2004/2005 was as 4,934 students, while 715 students graduated in the year 1990/1991, an increase of seven-fold approximately. Number of teaching staff increased from 945 teachers in 1990/1991 to 1,300 in 2004/2005 (SCO-Aden, 2005)

4.6 Health:

Number of hospitals in public sector for the year 2007 was 5 which were in Seera, Khormaksar, Almansoora and Al Shek Othman. There were 20 health centres, 12 clinics and 2 maternal centres, 4 workers' clinic and 3 health units in different districts of the governorate in the same year.

Number of hospitals in private sector for the year 2007 was 7 which were in Khormaksar and Al Mansoora Shek Othaman ans Altawahi districts with total of 150 hospital beds. There were 11 nursing homes in Seera, Khormaksar, Al Mansoora and Al Shek Othman districts with total of 220 beds. There were 412 specialized and general clinics, 92 laboratories and 21 x-ray units.

4.7 Road and Transportation:

According to the Statistical Year Book of Aden governorate for the year 2002, length of asphalted and paved roads were 277 Km and 428 Km respectively. Total length of roads in the governorate was 705 Km.

Number of registered vehicles in the governorate by activities were: 35,325 private cars, 5,180 taxies, 2,201 buses, 16,413 commercial trucks and lorries, 2,066

motorcycles, 1,121 tractors & cranes. Total number of vehicles in the governorate was 62,306.

With regard to Aden seaport, total number of ships arrived was 1,782 ships in 2002. The size of unloaded dry cargo was 1,705,000 tons, while the size of offloaded dry cargo was 209,000 tons.

The number of aircraft movement in Aden International Airport registered was 3,443 flights. Total number of passenger arrivals and departures were 87,000 and 93,000 respectively in the year 2002. The size of freight incoming and outgoing were 618 and 239 ton respectively in the same year.

4.8 Electricity

Electricity power generated was 843 G.W.H in 2002 in Aden governorate. Number of subscribers were 87,800 and average consumption per subscriber was 5,784 K.W.H. Total energy sold was 396 G.W.H.

4.9 Communication

Total number of telephone lines and mobile phones available were 60,041 and 3,316 respectively in 2002. Line telephone service is provided by Public Telecommunication Corporation (Yemen Telecom). International direct dialing facility is provided by Yemen International Telecoms Co. LLC (Tele Yemen). Mobile phone service providers are Tele Yemen, Spacetel and Sabaphone. Satellite telephone service is provided by Thuraya Company. Internet service providers are Yemen Telecom and Tele Yemen.

Altogether there are 13 post offices and 5,530 post boxes. The 13 post offices are located in the eight districts of the governorate.

5- Resources Available:

Agriculture Produce:

The main types of agriculture produce in the governorate are corn, sesame, vegetables and fruits, cotton and fodder. The average production of corn and sesame crops, for the period 2005-2007, reached 170 ton and 50 ton respectively. The average production of vegetables, watermelon and muskmelon were 25 ton, 18 ton and 14 ton respectively for the same period. The production of cotton crop decreased from 225 ton in 2005 to 178 in 2007.

The types of livestock available in the governorate are cow, sheep, goat and camel. The average number of cows in the governorate, for the mentioned period was

3,500 heads. The number of sheep decreased from 52,400 heads in 2005 to 53,500 heads in 2007. There were 11,500 head goats in average in the governorate for the same period. There were 1,800 head camels in average for the period 2005-2007.

Fishery and Sea Products

Surface water fish production was 11,213 ton in 2005, 12,198 in 2006 and 9,650 in 2007. This shows that surface water fish production has been 11,000 in average for the period 2005-2007. Deep water fish production decreased from 6ton in 2005 to 2567 ton in 2007. Sea products (lobsters) increased from 835 ton in 2005 to 1268 ton in 2007.

6- Human Resources and Skills Available Traditional Skills Available

A sample survey of 100 micro and small enterprises of 4 districts - Seera, Al Shek Othman, Al Maalla and Al Mansoora and more than 50 business organizations of Aden governorate was carried out to find out traditional skills available in the governorate.

According to the sample survey, the main traditional skills available in Aden governorate are embroidery, incense, handloom textile, tailoring, fishing net, tanning, blacksmith, pottery, weaving baskets and mats, cooking oven and Hinna. Most of these skills are available in all the districts of Aden governorate. However some skills like fishing net is mostly available in Al Burayka, pottery in Seera and Al Shek Othman, cooking oven, tanning and weaving baskets in Al Shek Othman. For details see Annex 01.

Human Resources from Academic Institutions:

Main academic institution of Aden governorate is Aden University. Other universities are Applied and Social Sciences University, Al Watania University and Technology University and Lebanese International University which are recently established.


Total number of students graduated from Aden University during the period 2002-2003 reached 2,796 students which included 1,357 female students (49%). Out of the total graduates during the period, 44% of students were science, education and arts

degree holders . 24% of students were economics and management degree holders .7% of students were engineering degree holders and 16% of students were medicine degree holders and 9% of students were law degree holders. Total number of teachers and instructors were 1321 which included female 294 and male 1027 for the academic year 2002-2003..

7-Economic Activities Number of People Involved in Economic Activities

Total number of people involved in economic activities in 2002 were 95,668, which consisted of 80% male and 20% female. Highest percentage of people was involved in public administration including defense and security (25.83%) and followed by wholesale and retail trade (14.15%), transport, storage and communication (12.48%) and education (11.54%). Manufacturing sector absorbed 6.59% of the total economically active people.

Chart 5: Economic Activities by Sex in Aden Governorate 2002





Unemployed Persons (15 years and above) by Sex and Educational Status


Unemployment is one of the problems facing Yemen economy in general, as percentage of unemployment is increasing in alarming rate. The 1996 statistical year book for Aden governorate indicated that unemployment rate in the governorate was 19% where as for the year 2001, unemployment rate was 27.8%. (Yemen HDR, 2001)

Total number of unemployed persons were 3,7581 which consisted 26,825 male (71%) and 10,756 female (29%).

8- Export and Import of Aden Governorate Export:

Total export value of Aden governorate was 2.7 billion YR in the year 2002 as per the statistics available from the Customs of office of Aden governorate. The main export items included fish (69%), bran and fodder (15.63%), cotton (3.54%), soap (3.4%) and salt (2.64%).

Import

Total import value of Aden governorate was 56.6 billion YR in the year 2002 as per the statistics available from the Customs of office of Aden governorate. The main import items included wheat and rice (30.85%), iron (20.54%), sugar, honey and sweets (16.76%), and wood (9.35%), building materials (7..52%) and meat (6.84%).

9- Business Related Organizations and Institutions Governmental Organizations

There are total of 47 governmental organizations in Aden governorate. Private Sector Organizations related to Businesses

Total number of associations registered with Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs (MoLSA) Office in Aden is 447 as of 31 December 2002. Types of the associations registered are classified in the table below.

Commercial and Development Banks and Financial Institutions

There are 11 commercial and development banks in Aden. Among them, there are 2 foreign banks - Credit Agricole Indosuez and Arab Bank.

Academic and Training Institutions:

There are 11 academic and training institutions. Among them, there are 3 universities, 4 vocational and technical institutions and 1 each of tourism, commerce, marine and administrative sciences institutions.

10. Existing Businesses:

Businesses are registered with district municipality offices, Investment Authority and Ministry of Industry and Trade.

All types of micro and small, medium and large business are required to be registered with their respective district municipality offices. However it seems that some of the medium and large businesses registered with Investment Authority are not registered with the respective district municipality offices.

Existing Businesses Registered with Municipality Offices The total number of businesses registered with district municipality offices were 3,692. Micro and small trading business constituted 50% of the total number of businesses. Micro and small service business were 27% of the total number of businesses. Medium manufacturing business constituted 8.6% of the total number of businesses.

Informal Business Sector

There is no studies or any proper estimation of number of informal businesses. However as per the views of retailers and informal vocational training centers, total number of informal businesses would be 3 fold of micro and small enterprises registered with Municipality offices, which are about 9,000.

Manufacturing informal businesses mostly include tailoring, making pickles, making incense, stone cutting, weaving and making handicrafts. Service informal businesses mostly include pensions, hairdressing, ceremonial services and repairing shoes. Trading informal businesses mostly include selling cooking gas, grocery, selling vegetables, selling Kat and selling snacks and food items.

11. Potential Business Ideas

Based on the opinions of business entrepreneurs, business promotional organizations, financial institutions and government organizations, some potential business ideas have been identified. Potentiality of businesses were identified based on availability of raw material, skilled labour, market demand, market competition and availability of required infrastructure. Lists of potential business ideas that were identified are in Annex 15 (manufacturing), in Annex 16 (service) and in Annex 17 (trading).

12. Problems and Needs of Micro and Small Business:

In view of finding out the problems and needs of micro and small businesses, a sample survey of 100 micro and small businesses was carried out in 4 districts - Seera, Al Maalla, Al Mansoora and Shek Othman. The survey included 25% of the sample of women run businesses.

The sample survey revealed that a large number of respondents faced problems

related to customs, tariffs and taxes (17.5%), registration and licensing (15.5%) and infrastructure like electricity, water and rental (15%). However other problems mentioned were machinery and equipment (12%), raw material (10%), skilled labour (9%) and marketing (8%). Detailed list of problems with percentage of respondents is given in the table below.

13.-Recommendations:

In view of the study, a number of recommendations for the socio-economic potentiality of Aden Governorate can be stated, and these are as following:

- 1- Aden, as an economic and commercial capital of Yemen, should be given greater importance in any socio-economic development plan.
- 2- Utilization of the biggest part possible of the area available for the free zone in Aden to be inline with the size of foreign investment.

- 3- Decentralization and adoption of Local Authority Low enacted in February 2000.
- 4- Improving and expansion in the level of public services in Aden Governorate. recommendations for the promotion of micro and small business in Aden Governorate are summarized as following:
- 5- Make available raw material and machinery and equipments for small businesses
- 6- Make available well trained skilled labor as demanded by small businesses
- 7- Provide support to vocational and training institutes to improve their services for small businesses
- 8- Make available improved financial and non-financial services and support for small businesses through banks and non-governmental organizations
- 9- Improve registration, renewal and licensing procedures and systems
- 10- Decrease customs, tariffs and taxes for small businesses
- 11- Provide government support, incentives and facilities for promotion of small businesses
- 12- Improve the existing legal framework and regulations for the growth of small businesses
