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ABSTRACT

This package includes the final report and selected products of the Adult education eXpress Intercommunication Support (AXIS) project, which was conducted to facilitate communication related to professional development services administered by the Pennsylvania Department of Education's Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education (ABLE) and communication to the bureau itself through development and coordination of print materials, an Internet presence, online connectivity, and general communications. The project report details the following project activities and outcomes: publication of the 1996 edition of the "ABLE Directors Handbook"; reworking of the Professional Development Centers (PDC) newsletter template; development of a website devoted to ABLE in Pennsylvania; production of statewide publications funded by the Bureau of ABLE; coordination of online communication among PDCs; compilation of monthly schedules of PDC events; publication of the 1996-1997 edition of the directory of ABLE providers in Pennsylvania; and production of several other publications. Also included are the following products of the AXIS project: EQUAL (Educational Quality for Adult Literacy) year 2 final report; three issues of the newsletter "EQUAL Update"; four issues of the newsletter "Action Update"; PDC brochure; catalogue of free materials for ABLE programs; and directory of ABLE services in Pennsylvania in 1996-1997. INTRODUCTION

Project AXIS was developed in response to the need expressed by the Director of the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education to coordinate, unify, and systematize communications related to the staff development programs the Bureau administers, and to support statewide adult education communications efforts, especially those related to professional development.

All of the activities described in this report were carried out between July 1, 1996, and June 30, 1997. This is the second year AXIS has been in operation.

Project coordinator was Tana Reiff, based in Lancaster. Dr. David Karl, Director of Adult and Nonpublic Education for Lancaster-Lebanon Intermediate Unit 13, administered the grant. Judy Perini, I.U. #13 secretary, provided clerical support for mailing, purchasing, reimbursements, and other records. Dr. Karl and Ms. Perini are based in Lebanon.

This report is prepared for anyone interested in the activities of this project. The project's products, as well as permanent copies of this report, are available through Pennsylvania's two State Literacy Resource Centers (SLRCs): AdvancE at the Pennsylvania Department of Education, Harrisburg, and the Western Pennsylvania Adult Literacy Resource Center, Gibsonia.

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GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The primary objective of AXIS was to facilitate communication related to professional development services administered by the Pennsylvania Department of Education, Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education, and to the Bureau itself through development and coordination of print materials, Internet presence, online connectivity, and general communications.

Goals for 1996-97 were to:

- 1. Refine the newsletter template for the six Professional Development Centers (PDCs) and assist individuals in each region in using the template to produce their own newsletters.
- 2. Facilitate development and maintenance of a site on the World Wide Web for the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education.
- 3. Centrally produce statewide newsletters funded by the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education.
- 4. Coordinate online communication among the Professional Development Centers.
- 5. Publish any or all of the following: a new edition of *Freebies for ABLE*, a leadership guide to developing practitioner inquiry communities, a student handbook template for local customization, communications support for Project EQUAL, and any other publications requested by the Bureau.

PROCEDURES

We will describe in detail each activity undertaken during 1996-97. How the activity was evaluated (if it was formally evaluated) will be discussed within each item rather than under separate headings.

The activities of this project were to:

• Publish The ABLE Administrators Handbook, 1996 Edition.

The bulk of the work on this activity was completed during the previous fiscal year. Due to the protocol of having certain material reviewed by the Pennsylvania Department of Education, 2,000 copies of the 64-page book were not printed until August, 1996, in the 1996-97 fiscal year.

With most of the copy assigned, received, edited, reviewed by the Editorial Board, and laid out during the previous year, this year's finishing touches included designing the cover, laying out the last few articles, indexing the book, adding an up-to-date list of GED Test Centers, preparing the electronic file for output to film, and overseeing the distribution of the finished product to the 250 ABLE program directors in Pennsylvania, Bureau of ABLE staff, contributing writers, and State Literacy Resource Centers.

Evaluation of this activity was conducted through a Publication Reaction Form inserted into each copy of the Handbook. Only 25 of these forms were returned by the end of the project year. The results of this reader evaluation were as follows:

• Rework the Professional Development Centers newsletter template.

After soliciting suggestions for improvement from those who used the template during 1995-96, AXIS developed a revised template based on that input and using an up-to-date version of page-layout software. We presented the new template at the first quarterly meeting of the Professional Development Center directors and coordinators and provided ongoing technical support for using it, as needed, by phone and e-mail.

As part of this support service, we also produced maps of Pennsylvania delineating the counties in each PDC region and supplied each PDC with its own customized graphic file of the map for use in their newsletter nameplate or any other purpose. We also used the full state map file to produce a two-foot by three-foot foamboard sign for use at the PDC exhibit at the Midwinter Conference on Adult Education.

• Develop a World Wide Web site on adult basic and literacy education in Pennsylvania.

In cooperation with the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education, AXIS designed and compiled images, HTML files, PDF (Portable Document Format) files, and hyperlink information for a comprehensive Web site called "ABLE Site." The pages completed for this initial site included:

- Home page with links to other pages in the site.
- Links to key related sites (NIFL, NCSALL, NCAL, OTAN, ISAL, etc.)
- EQUAL (Educational Quality for Adult Literacy; with downloadable PDF files of all issues of EQUAL Year 1 and Year 2 Reports and EQUAL Update)
- FAQ (Frequently Asked Questions about adult basic and literacy education)
- State Literacy Resource Centers (with e-mail links)
- Searchable hotspot map of the Professional Development Center regions (with anchors to counties as they fall into each of the six regions)
- Professional Development Centers (with e-mail links)
- The Provider Directory (reformatted for the Web from the print version, divided into regional listings based on PDC boundaries, with e-mail links and a searchable hotspot map added)
- Publications (with downloadable PDF files of all 1996-97 issues of



What's the Buzz?, Focus, and *EQUAL Update*, as well as a link to download a free copy of Adobe Acrobat Reader)

- Guiding Principles of Professional Development
- Indicators of Program Quality
- About the GED Tests
- GED Test Centers in Pennsylvania
- PDE application guidelines, forms, quarterly cash-on-hand forms, final financial report form (as downloadable PDF files)

Site authoring included creating PDF files of the publications available through the site, designing and creating graphic image files (including the ABLE Site logo and page background), converting image files to Web-compatible formats, creating image maps (e.g. Pennsylvania map with hotspots to click on for each PDC region), editing text, testing e-mail and URL hotlinks, dividing long documents into smaller Web pages, creating "anchors" for locating information more quickly within each page, and testing pages through America Online (AOL). Some technical assistance was provided by Ann Witmer, PennLink coordinator at the Pennsylvania Department of Education, and Linda Hinman, Project ABLE Net at Lock Haven University.

Plans call for the site to be uploaded to the server at Penn State being used by the Pennsylvania Department of Education. At the end of the fiscal year, the site had not yet gone up, as it awaited clearance from the PDE Press Office.

• Centrally produce statewide publications funded by the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education.

During 1996-97 AXIS continued to provide editing, design, and pre-press production services for *What's the Buzz?*, Pennsylvania adult education's professional newsletter; *Focus*, a series of bulletins describing exemplary Section 353 projects; and *Action Update*, a periodic newsletter reporting on practitioner research in Pennsylvania.

AXIS project coordinator Tana Reiff served on the editorial board of *What's the Buzz?*, attending two meetings in Harrisburg to discuss the year's content. Then, for the five issues of *What's the Buzz?*, David Fluke, the editor, provided copy to AXIS via fax-modem. Received pages were OCR-scanned, then edited for scanning errors, style, consistency, and general purposes. We then laid out each issue (ranging from eight to 12 pages), conferred with the editor about copyfitting and other editorial considerations, and faxed proof copies to the editor and the other two



members of the editorial board, Ella Morin at the Bureau of ABLE and Priscilla Ferguson at Tri-County OIC in Harrisburg. We incorporated their changes, completed all pre-press work, and provided all the necessary computer files to the printer for two-color direct output to film. We also served as local liaison for the mailing service that prepared the 4,000 finished copies for postal distribution, using mailing labels furnished by the editor.

For the five issues of *Focus*, Sherry Royce, the editor, provided AXIS with a rough electronic layout from a Windows-based version of Adobe PageMaker software via electronic mail file attachment. The AXIS coordinator placed and fitted the text blocks from that four-page layout into a Macintosh version of PageMaker, copy-edited, applied graphic elements, faxed a proof to the *Focus* editor, and fully prepared the files for the printer for direct output to film. The AXIS coordinator also attended one daylong meeting of the Focus panel in November.

For the four issues of *Action Update*, AXIS received a rough hardcopy layout from David Fetterman, the editor, for the purpose of estimating space requirements, along with a text file attached to e-mail. We placed the text files in the page-layout program, prepared the two-page layout, outputted camera-ready pages, and mailed them to each of the PDCs for duplication and insertion into their respective newsletters.

In all cases, the editors of these three publications expressed their satisfaction and gratitude for the technical support.

• Coordinate online communication among the Professional Development Centers.

The restructuring of Pennsylvania adult education's regional professional development system, along with rapid advances in the world of online communications, necessitated reviewing the status of the statewide online communication network we had established last year and implementing changes as required.

In conference with the Bureau, it was decided to continue requiring the PDCs to maintain America Online accounts. Advantages of AOL taken into consideration were: 1) easy online chat capability, 2) integrity of AOL-to-AOL file attachments, 3) easy user interface, 4) presence of our message board there, and 5) implications for use by other staff and students. Midway through the year, we allowed one of the PDCs to switch to a direct Internet Service Provider because AOL was still not providing their area of the state with toll-free phone access.



Although we did not schedule any online chats between the Bureau and the PDCs, several of the PDCs as well as participants in PALPIN (Pennsylvania Adult Literacy Practitioner Inquiry Network) project did hold several online conferences throughout the year. Use of the AOL message board was light. One PDC coordinator independently started a professional development listserv through her AOL account. AXIS used its AOL account to test HTML files for the Web site it developed for the Bureau.

• Complete and publish Freebies for ABLE.

AXIS completed research and production of a 1996 edition of *Freebies for ABLE*, a catalog of no-cost resources for adult basic and literacy education programs. The first edition of *Freebies* was published in 1993 and was very popular among practitioners.

Research for this edition began at the end of the last fiscal year. This involved contacting organizations and companies with listings in the 1993 edition, along with likely candidates culled from three other comparable catalogs for other audiences. A letter with a cut-off form requested specific information on free offerings. Sources were also asked to send samples of their free offerings.

We reviewed all the items—print materials, videos, measuring tools, etc.—for appropriateness and approximate reading level. We also reviewed several Web sites of sources offering online versions of their print material, then compiled listings in the following categories: Home & Family, Health, Math & Money, Recreation, Science & Environment, Government & Law, and Education/Professional. Also included in the 24-page booklet were: a preface explaining how materials were selected, tips for using *Freebies for ABLE* in adult education programs, instructions for reading the listings, information on the Consumer Information Center, how to scavenge other sources, resources available from PDCs and SLRCs (State Literacy Resource Centers), and a map of the PDC regions of Pennsylvania. Three thousand copies were printed.

Enclosed in each copy of *Freebies for ABLE* was a postcard with ten user-response questions, for use as an evaluation tool for this subproject. The results, based on 22 cards returned (including some questions where more than one response was possible), were as follows:

• Publish a directory of adult basic and literacy education providers in Pennsylvania.

The Bureau requested that AXIS compile and produce a directory of providers for use by the providers themselves and to respond to inquiries from the general public.

The Regional Programs Division of the Bureau provided AXIS with its database of some 250 providers. We converted this database to ClarisWorks format, added fields based on information the Bureau wanted to include in the directory, and produced a profile form for each



provider. A mailing of these forms to providers asked for corrections to the existing data as well as entry of data into new fields. A cover letter from Cheryl Keenan, Bureau Director, accompanied the profile form.

We followed up on all the agencies that did not respond by the deadline via either fax, phone, or e-mail. Because we were trying to have the directory ready in time for release at the Midwinter Conference on Adult Education in February, the handful of agencies that never responded had to be listed with only the basic contact information we had derived from the Bureau.

We subcontracted data-entry services and moved the production process along very quickly during January. Upon receipt of the completed database file from the subcontractor we converted the database to a word-processing file, edited the copy, designed a cover and inside pages, and produced *The Provider Directory* (64pp.) in page-layout software in preparation for direct output to film. One thousand copies were produced. The finished product was indeed ready for Midwinter Conference and was distributed to all program administrators who attended the special meeting for administrators on Wednesday morning of the conference. Additional copies were made available through the State Literacy Resource Centers, the PDCs, and the Bureau itself for subsequent distribution as needed.

No formal evaluation of *The Provider Directory* was conducted; however, copy was scrupulously reviewed by the Bureau prior to printing to avoid discrepancies in agency names and for general accuracy.

Produce EQUAL Year Two Report.

As we did last year, we wrote, designed, and produced 6,000 copies of an annual report on Project EQUAL (Educational Quality for Adult Literacy), which was inserted into the second issue of the newsletter *What's the Buzz?*. Additional copies were provided to the Bureau for subsequent distribution as needed.

• Produce three issues of EQUAL Update.

AXIS identified the need to keep the field informed of the Bureau's program-improvement initiative through a publication reporting on progress of related Section 353 projects. We produced three issues of *EQUAL Update*, which were inserted into issues of *What's the Buzz?* as well as mailed individually to the directors of every program funded through the Bureau.

Projects were not required to submit a brief report for all three issues, but were asked to do so if they had something significant to report. Project representatives submitted copy by e-mail, and we edited it to fit onto two sides of one sheet of paper. The list of projects (above) was included in each of the three issues.

• Design, order, and distribute lapel pins and a banner.

In response to the Bureau director's request to provide a tangible promotional device for the Bureau's program-improvement initiative, we designed and contracted production of 1,000 lapel pins bearing the slogan, "... And Quality For All!"

We handed out the pins, at no charge, at the PDE Update session at Midwinter Conference. Remaining pins were distributed through the Bureau, PDCs, SLRCs, and local program administrators, who were encouraged to take some along to give to their staff.

Along with the pins, we designed and subcontracted production of a seven-foot-wide nylon banner bearing the "... And Quality For All!" slogan for use at the conference and thereafter by the Bureau.

• Collect, compile, and distribute monthly schedules of PDC events.

PDCs were reminded monthly to e-mail their calendars to AXIS by a few days before the middle of the month. AXIS posted the edited list via e-mail on or near the 15th of each month.

Those on the e-mail list were the six PDCs, three members of the Bureau staff, Tutors of Literacy in the Commonwealth, and the two State Literacy Resource Centers.

In addition to the above goal-related activities, AXIS project coordinator Tana Reiff was involved in the following activities:

• At the request of the PDCs, designed and produced a two-color trifold brochure on the services of the regional Professional Develop-



ment Centers. Copies were distributed at the PDC exhibit at the Midwinter Conference on Adult Education, then through the PDCs in their own regions. Copy was mostly adapted from the brochure for the Southeast PDC, with additional copy added, including a map delineating the PDC regions and a full listing of PDC contact information.

- At the request of the Training Development Project, designed and produced a sample page layout for the professional development training modules being developed at Tuscarora Intermediate Unit 11.
 Work on the Assessment module and subsequent modules will be completed in the next fiscal year.
- Began work on three sections of the Bureau's Annual Report. This involved some editing and a new layout, as well as redrawing several graphs and charts. Work will be completed early in the next fiscal year.
- Produced a draft layout for the Building Communities for Learning (BCL) training manual. At the end of the 1996-97 fiscal year the draft was being reviewed by Sheila Sherow, director of that project, and Joanne Shane Plummer at the Pennsylvania State Coalition for Adult Literacy (PSCAL), project sponsor.
- Attended the one-day workshop of the Region 1 Technology Hub at the University of Pennsylvania in May to learn about producing files for their Web site.
- Planned and presented a session on newsletter design at the Adult Literacy Technology conference at Peirce College in Philadelphia in May.
- Attended quarterly meetings of regional Professional Development System staff in Harrisburg, to familiarize them with AXIS activities and services and to become familiar with their activities.
- Provided online and telephone communications-related technical support to the staff of the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education, the State Literacy Resource Centers, the regional Professional



Development Centers, and others statewide.

- Met approximately bimonthly with the Director of the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education and the Chief of the Special Projects and Programs Division to report on the activities conducted by the Bureau and formulate plans to support upcoming communications needs.
- Attended the Midwinter Conference on Adult Education in Hershey in February and the Inter-regional Conference on Teaching and Learning at Franklin and Marshall College in Lancaster in June, including the wrap-up meeting of Project EQUAL with pilot-site representatives.
- Served on the board of the Pennsylvania Association for Adult Continuing Education (PAACE), attending three of the monthly meetings as well as editing and producing the organization's quarterly newsletter.
- Produced about 30 customized covers for monographs completed by participants in the action research project based at Penn State Monroeville.
- Reformatted files for reprinting 675 copies of the Assessment Guide developed by the Institute for the Study of Adult Literacy at Penn State, including designing a new cover for it.

A sample of each completed product accompanies this report.

CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Project AXIS succeeded in providing a variety of forms of communication support related to professional development services administered by the Pennsylvania Department of Education, Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education, and to the Bureau itself. Activities included development and coordination of print materials, Internet presence, online connectivity, and general communications. Through formal and informal evaluations of these activities, we conclude that the services provided were appropriate and valuable.



We recommend continuation of Project AXIS, and indeed, it has been funded for the 1997-98 fiscal year has been received.

Specific recommendations include the following:

- Further visual unification of the print and online communications produced under the aegis of the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education. This would involve more consistent use of color, type, paper, layout style, etc.
- Budget sufficient time to maintain, update, and expand the Web site once it has been uploaded to the server.
- Produce frequent updates of publications such as *The Provider Directory*, the administrators and staff Handbooks, and *Freebies for ABLE*, as requested by the Bureau and the field.

WHAT YEAR TWO HAS SHOWN US

Findings regarding assessment, curriculum and instruction, and staff development:

- Pilot sites found that assessment procedures are now more systematic, but that staff could benefit from training on how to select and administer standardized tests.
- Staff development needs to involve ongoing training related to the collection and analysis of learner assessment and program data, as

well as use of data in reviewing the

appropriateness of instructional methods and materials.

Findings regarding changes in program practice:

• Review of student enrollment and assessment data indicated that many students leave instruction before post-testing. To address this issue, more sites are considering implementing new monitoring and interim assessment practices to

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document progress made by students who separate before program completion.

- Programs are changing their intake, assessment, student evaluation, and close-out procedures to make program operations more standardized.
- Second-year pilot sites reported beginning to involve additional staff, board members, and volunteers in data collection and analysis activities.

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
Benefits of participating in Project EQUAL:

- Multi-service agencies recognize the importance of interdepartmental teamwork, common intake, and data collection. Welfare reform, declining funding, and demographic changes are making programs more conscious of using data to serve more students with decreased resources, but also to re-examine program goals and operations.
- EQUAL provided staff with a more formalized, structured approach to reflect on their practice and systematize the way they collect data. Staff have begun to recognize that data collection and analysis are tools for program improvement, not just program requirements.
- Instructors have begun to expand their role as teachers to program planners. They are involved in thinking about

program outcomes, not just individual student improvement.

ON THE AGENDA FOR YEAR THREE

- The 20 pilot sites will continue data collection activities and increase the number of staff (paid and volunteer) who are involved in the program improvement activities.
- A group of eight Core Pilots will be invited to participate in more

EQUAL IS IN YEAR 3

The 1996 fall meeting of the 21 Project EQUAL pilot sites was held on October 23 in Harrisburg. COSMOS's staff provided information to the pilot site participants concerning the results of their Year 2 EQUAL activities in collecting learner assessment data and in using data for program management. Issues were discussed concerning the appropriate administration and reporting of standardized tests, and guidelines for test use were distributed. COSMOS's staff also outlined the activities for Year 3 of EOUAL, in which the pilot sites will form two groups-core and continuing pilots. The core pilots will participate in development activities in support of EQUAL, including the creation of a program plan that will be used to guide program improvement and expanding staff participating in EQUAL activities.

Both the core and continuing pilots will carry out data review activities, with an emphasis on examining practices in curriculum and instruction. During Year 3, all pilots will look toward implementing program changes based on their program and data review activities.

REPORTING STUDENT DATA

The Development of Criteria for Student Data Reporting Project is currently contacting selected EQUAL pilot sites to invite participation in the data reporting project. The data project intends to utilize the insights and knowledge gained by EQUAL participants in the development of definitions for student enrollment,

The Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education has raised the bar on the continuous improvement initiative for Pennsylvania adult education services. An array of 1996-97 Section 353 special projects is working together in an unprecedented way to integrate quality improvement efforts throughout the Commonwealth.

Project EQUAL, now in the third year of its three-year plan, has been building ABLE programs' capacity to collect, analyze, and use data about learner assessment and overall program evaluation to make decisions about improving program operations, with the goal of improving services to adult learners. By the end of this project year, the framework for a performance management system for Pennsylvania's adult education programs will be in place.

Year Three of Project EQUAL extends the meaning of the EQUAL acronym—Educational Quality for Adult Literacy—to all of the 353 projects supporting quality improvement. This publication will keep you informed of their progress during this year.

progress, completion, and outcomes. The project is also researching existing definitions, determining compliance with federal guidelines for reporting, and developing interview protocols and other processes for gathering information related to the project. The data reporting project plans to work with EQUAL participants in November to develop draft definitions for consideration by February.

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STREAMLINING DATA SUBMISSION

The Center for Literacy started the **Transmission of Data through Technology** project in 1994 to enable adult literacy programs throughout the Commonwealth to submit their student, tutor, and staff data to the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education via computer disk.

This fall, the database project

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has updated the program to include additional levels for students and to remove unrequired data elements. To welcome new and continuing users, seven workshops in five locations were presented during October. Each workshop, lasting between two and a half and three hours, covered an introduction to the database. Ninety-six participants from 60 agencies attended.

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Updated disks, containing changes in the pull-down menus, have been mailed to each participating agency. A further upgrade to include changes in reports and printer access will be available this winter.

This year the project is striving to make the database application more user-friendly. In addition to updating certain elements, including the expansion of student entry level as required by PDE, a new, easier-to-use interface is in the works.

STAFF CENTERS RESTRUCTURED

Professional development for adult basic education practitioners statewide is focusing on improving teaching and learning that results in positive outcomes for adult learners. Recently, the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education reorganized nine Regional Staff Development Centers into six Professional Development Centers (PDCs). These centers carry out well-planned opportunities for professional development with input from adult educators in the regions. The Regional Professional Development System is working toward meeting the challenge of providing consistent training in core content areas across regions.

Adult educators are participating in PDC-sponsored activities designed to meet individual and program needs leading to program improvement. The PDCs offer opportunities for teachers, administrators, and volunteers to participate in both training and research-oriented activities, as well as take part in workshops and focus groups.

DEVELOPING TRAINING MODULES

The Training Development Project is developing materials for use in Pennsylvania's professional development system. Project outcomes will ensure uniform content in the delivery of professional development for Pennsylvania's adult educators.

Selection of content areas is being determined through input from practitioners in activities such as those in Project EQUAL

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pilots and the Professional Development Centers as well as review of national resources. Practitioners statewide will advise on content. delivery, and trainer recruitment.

Content areas to be considered this year were determined through needs assessments conducted in the past year in PDCs and EQUAL pilots. Specialists in the areas will be designated and appropriate materials will be reviewed and screened by them as well as a review committee of practitioners, administrators, and staff from the Bureau and PDCs. Content-area training materials will highlight emerging practices. Trainers and training plans will be identified. Materials will be packaged and disseminated to trainers. Delivery of training in at least two content areas is planned to begin this program year.

INFORMING THE PROFESSION

AdvancE at the PDE Resource Center in Harrisburg continues to provide information services. Requests for references, technical assistance, and document retrievals were answered through such means as the Internet, state library LUIS searches and document retrieval, telephone/TDD, or subject files.

In support of Section 353 projects, certain project directors

were added to AdvancE's e-mail group, and federal project reports and projects were prepared for Focus review.

LEARNING THROUGH PRACTICE

Pennsylvania Adult Literacy Practitioner Inquiry (PALPIN) is providing four primary activities this year. The Winter Inquiry Institute will take place January 22-25, 1997 in Philadelphia. This Institute is open to any practitioner from an ABLE-funded program. Three PDC regions will offer practitioner inquiry seminars as well. In the Central-Northeast area most of the group's work will be conducted online. South-Central and Southeast regions are situating inquiry groups within particular programs.

Each of the regional groups and the Winter Institute will depend on facilitation and mentoring from 1995-96 participants. In this way, PALPIN has begun to build practitioner inquiry leadership around the state as it continues to provide ongoing opportunities to build professional community. generate new knowledge about teaching and learning. and improve individual practice and program development.

The Pennsylvania Action Network (PA-ARN) is in its second year of training and mentoring practitioners through the Southwest, South-Central

and Northwestern PDCs. with Central-Northeast yet to begin. The first of four *Action Update* newsletter issues have been distributed across the state describing project possibilities and how personal peer support will take place in 1996-97.

LEARNING ABOUT DIFFERENCES

The Statewide Staff Development on Adults with Learning Differences project began in August with a training session in the far corner of Northeastern Pennsylvania. Wayne and Pike Counties. Already this year, more than 200 adult educators have attended the 18 training activities conducted as part of this project. These activities include introductory, follow-up, and in-depth training sessions, as well as demonstrations of assessment and teaching techniques to adult educators who have a particular interest in learning problems.

WHAT DO WE NEED TO BE TEACHING?

Collection of research and reports is under way in the project called **Research and Development of Pennsylvania-Specific Adult Learner Competencies in Family, Work, and Community Contexts.** Several states have developed adult competencies lists. usually based on CASAS. Much of the research focuses on workforce education competencies. usually based on the SCANS competencies and, more recently, on O*NET. In addition, the National Institute for Literacy is sponsoring research to expand on its Equipped for the Future initiative, identifying skills that adults need to function in family, workplace, and citizenship contexts.

The project is organizing and synthesizing the competencies found, focusing on a skills-based model encompassing communication and numeracy skills. This model will provide flexibility for programs to customize the competencies to match their goals and instructional focus. A sixmember workgroup will meet in December to discuss the competencies framework.

BUILDING LEARNING COMMUNITIES

The Building Communities for Learning (BCL) project is assisting communities in establishing a collaborative process of community-based planning through which adult basic and literacy education providers, business and industry, job-training programs, county and community economic development and planning groups, local government and municipalities, and human resource services work together to improve adult education services.

Through their planning groups. BCL sites identify literacy needs. gaps in services. and widespread problems; prioritize current and emerging issues: develop strategies to promote and support literacy efforts; promote economic development by unifying literacy services with local employment needs: and develop plans for their most effective use. The result is better-coordinated and more comprehensive services for adult learners.

Four new community-based planning sites were awarded BCL grants this fall. Last year's pilot sites (Fayette County. Lycoming County. and Wyoming Valley) are functioning as Mentoring Communities. providing the new sites with field-driven training. technical assistance. resources. and ongoing mentoring.

Project EQUAL pilots are expanding program improvement initiatives within their respective agencies. By year end, pilots will have expanded the number of staff involved in program improvement and examined issues in new areas of operation. In these ways, EQUAL pilots will have diffused quality continuous improvement processes throughout their entire agencies.

In early February, core pilots and Professional Development Center coordinators met to discuss and design the materials needed to train new agencies in Project EQUAL activities. Drawing on their experiences and what they have learned in the two and a half years of EQUAL, they are developing training modules for the skills and knowledge leading to implementation of continuous program improvement activities statewide.

With the dissemination of the draft program performance standards, the Section 353 development projects funded in recent years, the revised statewide monitoring system, and the new structure of the PDCs, ABLEfunded programs have guidance and assistance in meeting the goals and needs in their agencies for program improvement.

This publication is designed to keep you informed of the Section 353 projects operating in Pennsylvania in support of the EQUAL initiative.

Quality improvement for programs funded by the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education took on a new, visible dimension with the introduction of the slogan " ... And **Quality For All!"** at the Midwinter Conference on Adult Education. Adult educators of every ilk were seen sporting lapel pins bearing the slogan, and a seven-foot banner served as a backdrop for the PDE Update session.

"... And Quality For All!" signifies a unity among Pennsylvania adult basic and literacy education providers to work cooperatively toward the goals stated in the Draft Program Performance Standards released at the Bureau of ABLE Preconference Administrators and **Directors Meeting:**

Every adult who wishes to improve his or her basic educational foundation shall have access to quality adult education that will enable the individual to articulate educational goals, persist in learning, demonstrate achievement, and become a lifelong learner.

Thus, the initiative known as EQUAL-Educational Quality for Adult Literacy-moves us another step forward as we all work together for a high-quality, accountable adult basic and literacy education system in Pennsylvania.

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PROGRAM **IMPROVEMENT:** WHERE TO START

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The Program Improvement **Plans & Needs Assessment** project at Lancaster-Lebanon Intermediate Unit 13 has developed a draft Program Self-Assessment that is now being fieldtested by several EOUAL core pilot sites. Its purpose is to help identify and prioritize program improvement needs related to Pennsylvania's ten Indicators of Program Quality. It is designed to help establish benchmarks for program improvement by using a consistent measurement instrument

The Self-Assessment is the first step in a larger Program Improvement Plan that will take information gleaned from the Self-Assessment, help programs prioritize identified areas of need, present a consistent structure for reporting program improvement plans to ABLE, and integrate the Data for Decision-Making process that has become second nature to EQUAL pilot sites. At the conclusion of the project, Pennsylvania's adult education programs will have a new tool for initiating continuous improvement efforts at the local level.

COMPETENCIES WILL BE 'SKILLS'

Barb Van Horn, director of the **Adult Learner Competencies** project, met with an advisory group comprised of ABE, GED, ESL, and workplace practitioners in December. They discussed the goals of the project, definitions of competencies, and what the field would need to make the competencies useful as a tool for linking curriculum, instruction, and assessment to improve instruction and learner outcomes.

The final competencies will be phrased in terms of communication (reading, writing, speaking, listening) and math skills, as well as "soft skills" (e.g., employability skills). The skills will be arranged from basic to higherorder skills and divided into several levels (beginning, intermediate, advanced). The final report will include background information on competencies, the list of competencies, examples of how the competencies can be used to build curricula and instruction in family, work, and community contexts, and links to standardized assessments.

TRAINING MODULES TAKING SHAPE

The goal of the Training Development Project is to provide Pennsylvania ABE practitioners with the tools for quality teaching and lifelong learning through the provision of consistent training activities.

The content areas selected for this year were field driven and based on input from practitioners serving in various roles of adult education throughout the state.

Modules include: Teaching the Reading Process, Math as Problem Solving, Teaching Strategies for Multi-Level ESL Classes, Cooperative Learning, Case Management, and Assessment.

Some of the modules were developed by a consortium in the Northwest and will be adopted;

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others[•] will be adopted and utilized with supplemental materials particular to Pennsylvania's specific needs. The other modules are being produced based on projects developed in Pennsylvania, as well as other resources.

The training modules will provide important tools for practitioners to use to address quality improvement in their programs.

INQUIRING MINDS

The Action Research Project's training team has been meeting with groups in four regions: Northwest, Southwest, Central-Northeast, and South-Central. There are 40 participants this year.

Action Researchers are posing questions in five broad areas: teaching and evaluating ESL students, retaining ABLE students. student skill building, improving student diagnosis and placement. and program evaluation. Several researchers from last year are serving as mentors. Participants work on problems in the group setting, like last year, but they are now linked to researchers statewide according to the nature of their question. And, they are examining "lasting change" as an internal study of changes to practitioners and programs as a result of involvement with Action Research. The project continues to maintain a database so that findings can be shared.

In the cast, the **Pennsylvania Adult Literacy Practitioner Inquiry Network** (PALPIN) continues to support the development of inquiry groups in two regions of the state.

The Central-Northeast Regional Inquiry Seminar has scheduled four face-to-face meetings but is doing most of its work online. After several rounds of discussion on pressing issues in the field in relationship to their own work, everyone is now moving toward developing an inquiry focus. Online work is being facilitated by participants in last year's Winter Inquiry Institute.

In the Southeast region, participants from two of last year's regional inquiry groups are leading "program-based" inquiry groups. These groups come together within an agency and are developing a single thematic focus for their inquiries.

The statewide Winter Inquiry Institute was held in January. More than half of the 19 participants were from western Pennsylvania, which means that even without inquiry groups there, practitioners are getting involved in PALPIN. After this intensive inquiry experience, participants identified an inquiry focus and are now collecting data.

At Midwinter Conference, PALPIN hosted a preconference session as an opportunity for ongoing sharing and network development and a concurrent session providing hands-on experience for those new to inquiry. At the University of Pennsylvania Ethnography in Education Conference. PALPIN will present a panel discussion on moving from participant to leader in inquiry groups.

ABLE NET IS NOW ON THE WEB

ABLE Net serves as a technology resource for Pennsylvania's ABE/GED and literacy programs, with emphasis on developing online capabilities among practitioners and providing training across the state through technology mentors located in each of the six PDCs. ABLE Net maintains a Web page with links to useful sites in eight categories: Potential Sources of Funding. Interactive Sites. Career and Vocational Education, School-to-Work, Career Information, Current Events Sites, Career Counseling Sites. and Links of Interest for Adult Educators. URL is http://eagle.lhup.edu/~lhinman.

Progress is being made toward the goal of bringing 60 new programs online in 1996-97. with 23 additional programs fully connected and utilizing online capabilities as of December. At Midwinter Conference. ABLE Net mentors met for a session on technology planning and problem solving, and Project Director Debra Burrows made a presentation on funding strategies for technology purchases. In February, ABLE Net assisted two PDCs with training sessions on software and technology planning and funding.

ABLE Net staff and mentors have encountered numerous impediments to technology utilization. However, the hard work will be worth it, since technology is a tool programs can use to achieve quality improvement goals.

COMMUNITIES JOINING FORCES IN ABLE PLANNING

The **Building Communities for** Learning (BCL) project conducted a competitive process to select four more communities to participate in a collaborative planning process among adult basic and literacy education providers, business and industry, job-training programs, economic development groups, local government, and human resource services.

Communities awarded new grants are Carbon County, Washington County, Northern Cambria County, and Pittsburgh. Last year's three pilot sites— Fayette County, Lycoming County, and Wyoming Valley are functioning this year as Mentoring Communities and are matched with new sites to provide ongoing technical assistance and support.

Project director Sheila Sherow urges adult literacy providers to look at communitywide collaboration as a necessity in providing adult learners with the high-quality. comprehensive services they need to become independent and productive members of the community. 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A QUALITY IMPROVEMENT REPORT TO PENNSYLVANIA'S ADULT BASIC & LITERACY EDUCATION COMPUNITY

SELF-ASSESSMENT: FIRST STEP TOWARD IMPROVEMENT

The Program Improvement Plans project is working with several EQUAL sites in piloting a draft self-assessment instrument designed to help programs think through what they are doing, how they are doing it, and why they are doing it. When the pilots have completed the draft self-assessment, they will have not only a laundry list of potential areas for program improvement, but also a solid sense of what is and is not working in key program areas. The EQUAL pilot sites will provide valuable feedback related to the design of the self-assessment instrument and the process of working through it with a Program Improvement Team.

Based on the ten Indicators of Program Quality, the self-assessment tool guides Program Improvement Teams through a series of questions related to each indicator. Questions are of three types: 1) questions about whether a program is doing certain things and if documentation is collected to support these activities, 2) descriptive questions that ask how certain things are done within the program, and 3) brainstorming questions designed to generate ideas for future investigation.

Project findings are not yet available; it is clear, however, that the pilot sites have found the instrument helpful in identifying areas for program improvement.

Training will soon be available to help programs use the revised self-assessment instrument. Since it parallels the ABLE monitoring instrument, it will also be an excellent tool for help-

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BUREAU OF ADULT BASIC & LITERACY EDUCATION

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EDUCATION

Project EQUAL is developing Pennsylvania's adult education program improvement and accountability system. The staff of Abt Associates have been working to support the further development and dissemination of Project EQUAL through a number of activities.

Janet Voight from Abt conducted visits to each of the Project EQUAL core pilot sites, meeting with staff to discuss their EQUAL activities and

ways in which their participation in EQUAL has helped improve their program operations.

Abt's staff have reviewed the Data for Decision Making Logs submitted by EQUAL sites and are providing feedback to the sites on their problem-solving strategies using program data.

An important component of Abt's work on Project EQUAL this year has been to provide technical assistance to Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education staff and Section 353 project directors. Judy Alamprese facilitated a discussion with EQUAL sites and Professional Development Center staff to develop the framework for EQUAL training modules. She also has been working with Section 353 project directors in their development of materials to support the dissemination and implementation of EQUAL.

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ing programs prepare for a monitoring visit. Until a program can clearly articulate what it is doing, how it is doing it, and why, positive change is little more than a shot in the dark. As the first step in the program-improvement cycle, program selfassessment plays an essential role in helping programs systematically identify key areas of strength and weakness. With this knowledge as a starting point, a program is well on its way to demonstrating continuous improvement.

DEFINING LEARNER COMPETENCIES

The work group of the Learner Competencies project has met to review and discuss the draft skills lists. These lists include communication (reading, writing, speaking, listening), math,

metacognitive (learning-tolearn), and basic "employability" (e.g., time management) skills. Organized in three levels (beginning, intermediate, advanced), these lists will provide a framework for ABLE programs that will inform curriculum design, focus instruction, and link instruction to assessment.

STREAMLINING DATA SUBMISSION

An upgrade of the data system, Version 2.1, has been mailed to agencies participating in mechanized data collection. Many bugs have been fixed (e.g. printer problems), and fields have been added to enable complete export to PDE of the Program Data Form. This version will assist programs in providing valid and complete information for export to PDE at the end of the year.

TRAINING MODULES AVAILABLE SOON

As the project year winds down staff training modules are in the last stages of development by the **Training Development Project**.

The Assessment module offers comprehensive training in a three-day format with a followup period during which technical assistance will be offered. Content of the module includes theory of assessment, selecting and administering standardized assessments, assessment for program accountability, informal assessments, and program assessment planning. Trainers will provide hands-on activities for small groups.

The Case Management module will offer a comprehensive planning guide to developing a case management system within ABE programs.

Both modules will be ready for delivery by the end of the summer. Contact your regional PDC for scheduling. Other modules include Teaching Strategies for the Multi-level ESL Classroom, Cooperative Learning, and Math Problem Solving.

STAYING IN TOUCH

Project AXIS has been working behind the scenes in a communication-support role. Publications including *The ABLE Administrators Handbook, The Provider Directory,* and *Freebies for ABLE* were produced during 1996-97. A Web site for the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education will soon be announced. "ABLE Site" contains information on adult basic and literacy education in Pennsylvania, the entire *Provider Directory* in Web-CONTINUED C accessible format. downloadable files of publications. PDE funding guidelines and forms, and much more.

BUILDING MORE

Building Communities for Learning (BCL) is a Pennsylvania State Coalition for Adult Literacy (PSCAL) communitybased planning project designed to improve the delivery of adult learner services and, ultimately, adult learner outcomes. During 1996-97 four pilot sites were added: Carbon County, Northern Cambria County, the Pittsburgh Neighborhood Learning Collaborative, and Washington County. These sites, along with Fayette County, Lycoming County, and Wyoming Valley, established in 1995-96, are building comprehensive, coordinated delivery systems of adult learner services. As a result of their collaborative efforts, these communities are more effectively and efficiently serving the multiple needs of adult learners.

The three original pilot sites were matched with 1996-97 grantees to provide individualized technical assistance and support. PSCAL plans to add four new community-based planning sites during August and September 1997. RESOURCE CENTER IMPROVES ACCESS

AdvancE's collection, files, and computers moved to a new location on the 11th floor of the Department of Education. The change combines all the collections housed in the Resource Center and provides improved access to the adult, vocational/ School-to-Work, and basic education resources. The downlink site for teleconferences and an area for videoconferencing demonstrations are also available.

In support of the dissemination of 353 projects, AdvancE produced the *Projects Abstracts* for the Fiscal Year 1995-96 and mitted all 1995-96 final re-

ports and products to the U.S. Department of Education and to ERIC for review and possible inclusion in the ERIC database. RESEARCH YIELDING NEW KNOWLEDGE

Participants in **Pennsylvania Adult** Literacy Practitioner Inquiry are busily analyzing data and writing up the findings from their inquiry projects. The topics represent a broad range of experiences and program types.

A literacy council coordinator used dialogue journals with three learner-tutor pairs to learn more about program participants' needs. A volunteer tutor is seeing how his students respond to language experience activities. A math teacher is learning more about how to help students succeed by involving them in developing a new math placement test and then collecting math writing samples and observations of them doing their work. He reports that this "has revealed a ton of information." A number of participants are either trying out a new approach and documenting how students respond to it or are working to understand better how students perceive and respond to current practices as a way to develop new approaches.

A number of PALPIN participants in the Southeast region have been working with colleagues to develop a programwide inquiry project. Two such groups are investigating the challenges of meeting the literacy needs of ESL learners where listening and speaking have been the primary instructional emphasis. One group is developing a plan to restructure their program based on the inquiry work.

This brief summary illustrates ways in which inquiry is helping to improve individual practice and contribute to overall program improvement and knowledge generation for the field.

The **Pennsylvania Action Research Network** research team has logged hundreds of hours and miles to meet and exceed the project's goals. A brief summary: PA-ARN provided training and mentoring along with a training handbook. About 30 participants are expected to complete projects and monographs. The Action Update newsletter kept practitioners aware of both PA-ARN and PALPIN. A data bank is making every project accessible to anyone. Mentors from last year's project assisted this year. A panel of experts added objective input to the individual projects in two regions.

An internal evaluation of impact involving participants in PA-ARN's first year showed that some had continued with action research, some had not; yet. 94% said they "look at problems in a more systematic way as a result of action research." The same percent said they had "better problem solving strategies." A total of 63% had changed their program permanently and 63% said the institution's procedures had seen a lasting change as well. Their supervisors confirmed these statements in a second round of interviews.

Project leaders report that action research is beginning to show consistent strategies and patterns of findings, and that the field is already seeing some lasting impact—both in practice and institutional functions. With a growing base of knowledge, they hope that emerging patterns of successful strategies can be even better disseminated. (5)

ONLINE ACCESS ENHANCING COMMUNICATION

ABLE Net developed and maintains a Web page (www.lhup.edu/ ~lhinman/home.htm) targeted to ABLE programs by providing links and information on technology funding, lesson plans, pending legislation, ESL, School-to-Work, training opportunities, workforce education, and more. During the past year, there has been a significant increase in the number of ABLE-affiliated individuals and programs that have secured online access. This will provide opportunities for faster, more efficient communication and access to information, which will help with the overall program improvement effort. 🕄

WHY WE'RE HERE

In 1995, the Pennsylvania Department of Education announced statewide initiatives involving teachers, tutors, counselors, and administrators in systems of problem solving and knowledge building for their organizations. The Pennsylvania Action Research Network (PA-ARN) and the Pennsylvania Adult Literacy Practitioner Inquiry Network (PALPIN) were the results of that funding. The thrust of both projects was to enable practitioners to solve problems in their practice and, in various ways, to disseminate the findings to others.

The process of action-based research is: 1) a specific issue or problem question is defined; 2) the researcher/practitioner designs a procedure for addressing the problem; 3) the procedure is implemented; 4) an evaluative process is built into the process to determine if the question has been satisfactorily addressed; 5) the process continues in this cyclical fashion until the researcher is satisfied with the results, and/or begins with a new issue.

1995-96: What was done?

In Year 1 of the projects a variety of topics were researched by practitioners from across Pennsylvania. Among the topics explored through the Pennsylvania Action Research Network (PA-ARN) (monographs of these projects are available through AdvancE):

- Building self-esteem through reading (Susan Cooper)
- How classroom tests affect students' sense of progress (Kathleen Moon)
- Increasing the return of monthly progress reports (Debbie Thompson)
- Attendance and retention of Adult Basic Education students (Pat Scott)
- Increasing recruitment in the Gateway Project (Paige Thomas and Gail Campbell)
- Improving attendance of adult learners (Virginia Fetsko, Nancy Ott, and Lisa Walsh)
- Recruitment of ABE students through structured strategies (Gary Narbut and Joseph Mando)

- Implementing a portfolio system in the adult reading/writing classroom (Karen Tuminello)
- Learner retention action plan (Lisa Schmalzried)
- Increasing vocabulary levels of deaf (Patricia Palmiscno)
- Improving retention and resolving personal problems by instituting a regularly scheduled student support group (Nicole Despines)
- Increasing students critical reading (Monica McAghon)
- Linking adult education programs to postsecondary institutions (Barbara Kroh)
- Utilizing alternative assessment tools with individuals having developmental challenges (Joy Zamierowski)

Among the topics explored through the Pennsylvania Adult Literacy Practitioner Inquiry Network (PALPIN) were:

- What does discovery learning look like in my class?
- What will happen when I try to implement a program-wide inquiry project as staff development?
- How are ESL students learning to read in a second language?
- How can a small learning group support reading growth for the lowest-level readers in a very large class?
- What happens when I try to implement a visual screening for use during intake/ student orientation in a volunteer-driven

program?

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- What happens when I try to get students to return to class after they dropped out?
- How do various stakeholders in a workplace literacy class perceive the benefits of the class?
- What happens when I implement small discussion groups focused on literature in my GED preparation class?
- How do I feel about having a learnercentered classroom and how do my students respond to this new approach?
- What happens when a process for adult learners to set and assess their monthly goals is implemented?
- What teaching strategies help make adult education studies more interesting to learners?
- What does community look like in my program, and how does it get built?
- What could we do to improve retention in our program?

Debbie Thompson, a participant in the PA-ARN project ("Increasing the return of monthly progress reports"), said: "The purpose was to see if by including students in the process (submitting monthly reports to area literacy coordinators), the rate of return of these reports would increase ... It was my hope that with more student involvement, tutors would be more inclined to complete the reports and give them to their area coordinators. This in fact did happen. The project was conducted in three...areas and saw an overall increase, over a three-month period, of 25%."

PALPIN

There will be ongoing inquiry groups in the Southeast, Central-Northeast, and South-Central Regions:

- Southeast Region: inquiry-based professional development through peer coaching, program-based practitioner inquiry groups (meeting regularly at the program site), and an online or faceto-face cross-program inquiry group (determined by participant location and telecommunications access).
- Central-Northeast: an online inquiry group.
- South-Central: a program-basedpractitioner inquiry group.

"All groups will have leadership and facilitation provided by local practitioners who participated in PALPIN during the 1995-96 year," Alisa adds.

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Action Research & Adult Literacy Practitioner Inquiry Networks—Progress Reports

PA-ARN (The Pennsylvania Action Research Network) and PALPIN (The Pennsylvania Adult Literacy Practitioner Inquiry Network) are both several months into the second year of their work. They are working with groups and individuals across Pennsylvania. This issue of *Action Update* will report on the progress of these projects to date. In addition, there are some insights from several PA-ARN participants.

News from ... Central-Northeast PDC

Kathy Kalinosky is facilitating Action Research Training in this region. To accommodate the size of the territory, there are two groups projected at the present time. One group will meet in the western portion of the region, while the other meets in the eastern portion.

The actual training in each section of the region is being preceded by an Orientation Meeting. At this session, potential participants have an opportunity to learn about PA-ARN, as well as about the ideas and expectations of program participants. The first Orientation Meeting was held in the eastern sector of the region on Thursday, November 21, with ten people in attendance. The Orientation Meeting for the western sector will be held on Friday, December 6. There's still room to join in the Central-Northeast.

The word about Action Research and PA-ARN has been spreading through several programs in the past few months. In October Allan Quigley and David Fetterman presented a paper on Action Research: "Who Should Produce Knowledge? Variations on Practitioner Action Research for Adult Literacy," at University Park at the Eastern Adult, Continuing, and Distance Education Research Conference. In early November, Allan was on a panel with Dr. Peter Jarvis and Dr. David Deschler at the Commission of Professors of Adult Education Annual Conference in Charlotte, North Carolina. The panel topic was "Trends and Issues in Research." Allan shared details about the work of PA-ARN and PALPIN. In late November Allan Quigley, Marcia Anderson, and Debbie Thompson made a carousel presentation at the 12th Penn-**Ohio Adult Basic Education Conference** in Mars, Pennsylvania. Their topic was "Why not join the Action Research family?" Participants from this were interested in the progress being made here. In addition PA-ARN will be looking to present sessions at the PAACE Midwinter Conference, as will PALPIN.

News from a ... 'Returnee'

In this second year of PA-ARN and PALPIN, there are a number of learners who have returned to do further research. One of them offers comments that help to illustrate the continuing value of this work for practitioners.

Joy Zamierowski from Erie writes: "I decided to become involved in a second year of Action Research for a few different reasons. The main reason was that after completing one project, I was not sure that I had the confidence to utilize the process of Action Research on my own. Also, I decided to become involved again because one of the instructors in our program wanted to try it, and I believed that she would be more comfortable if I were to complete the process with her. Finally, I found that I had learned a lot from the other action researchers by simply attending the meetings. It was interesting to learn how others were attempting to solve problems that were also problems in our program.

"Action Research provides practitioners the opportunity to discover ways to improve existing practices. The end result is not always what one hopes it will be; however, it is a learning experience."

News from ... PALPIN

Regional inquiry groups have formed in the Central-Northeast and Southeast areas of the state. In Central-Northeast, the group had the first of four face-toface meetings in early November. The group will participate in online journal groups for about two months, during which time participants will read current research literature on a variety of topics and respond to it in relationship to their own work experiences. Journal groups are being led by 1996 Winter Inquiry Institute participants in the region. By mid-January, they will move toward identifying an inquiry topic and will share data and collaborate on analysis online through the spring.

In the Southeast, participants from the 1995-96 PALPIN Region 6 Seminar will work as leaders in their region by facilitating inquiry groups based in their own or other programs. Program based, PALPIN encourages groups of practitioners in a program to identify a common theme or focus for inquiry.

In addition to these activities, plans are under way for the Winter Inquiry Institute to be held in Philadelphia on January 22-25. Applications, due December 13, are available from PDC Coordinators. Practitioners from all regions of the state are encouraged to participate. PALPIN also hopes to host two sessions at the PAACE Mid-Winter Conference. One will give interested practitioners from around the state an opportunity to gain hands-on experience doing an inquiry activity. The other will feature 1995-96 participants discussing their inquiry project findings.

Across the State and Beyond: Working to Improve Practice Through Action Research and Practitioner Inquiry

Over the months PA-ARN and PALPIN have been working to develop new knowledge and leadership in the field of adult literacy. Much of that work goes on quietly: trainers from each project working with practitioners from every corner of Pennsylvania to enable them to enhance their own work in their own contexts. In addition, though, PA-ARN and PALPIN leaders have been at work to influence practitioners who are not directly involved in either projects to broaden the impact of action research and practitioner inquiry.

Action Research Network at Midwinter Conference

This year at the Midwinter Conference in Hershey, current Pennsylvania Action Research Network (PA-ARN) team members Kathy Kalinosky, Allan Quigley, Drucie Weirauch, and Raiana Mearns presented a panel, "Pennsylvania Action Research Network: What We Have Done, What We Have Learned, What the Future Promises." They discussed the fact that there were 25 participants in three regions last year and 40 participants in four regions this year. Of the current participants, 30% in the two western regions participated in PA-ARN last year and have returned for either another cycle of their project from last year or a new project.

The PA-ARN panel also discussed their database, which remains a source of networking information for educators around the state. This newsletter, *Action Update*, was also discussed. It continues to be a source of information and updating for those across the state.

Those who attended this presentation also heard about some of what PA-ARN has been learning in its one and a half years of existence. They have learned that single researchers with minimal contact with a group of peers or a group leader seem to have trouble carrying a project through to completion. Interaction with others provides a source of accountability and support. PA-ARN has discovered the value of "mentor assistants" persons who have been through one year of PA-ARN training and are providing support and assistance to this year's participants.

For the future, the PA-ARN team is starting an internal study of the lasting effects of participation in action research-both on participants and their work and on programs and institutions. It is hoped that the future will also see the ability to be part of a system which will use the common findings from projects (such as repeated findings in retention projects), or the consistent findings in instructional approaches, to benefit practitioners across the field. Small studies are not suggesting wide generalizability from common findings, but those findings can be of help to those who want the benefit of what others have learned. Finally, the panelists stressed that through PA-ARN they have learned that people can help each other a lot in their work-more than they might have guessed at the beginning of the project.

ABOUT THIS ISSUE

Because of the external work of PA-ARN and PALPIN, this issue of Action Update will focus on researchers' work outside of their immediate projects through an upcoming book and the recent Adult Education Midwinter Conference, as well as a look at the networking activities of PA-ARN and a note from a PALPIN returnee.

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PA-ARN Participants Network

To facilitate the sharing of problems and intervention techniques among PA-ARN participants statewide, a network of common issues has been established. Information from participants' Project Planners have provided themes related to adult literacy. These thematic issues have been categorized. This list and an updated directory were mailed to all PA-ARN participants and trainers in the four PA-ARN regions.

Since "shared knowledge" is one of the goals of PA-ARN, this thematic issues network will encourage communication among participants statewide during the course of their projects. The network will facilitate the consideration of issues such as shared problems, interventions, and data-collecting methods. The network will also complement the monographs, which disseminate findings at the end of the project year.

To date, the network has included all 1996-97 projects that had completed Planners, as well as those with completed monographs from 1995-96. The themes, and the number of projects from each year, include:

- *Retention* (97:8, 96:5)
- Student Outcomes (cognitive & affective) (97:4, 96:2)
- ESL (97:3, 96:1)
- Special Needs Students (97:1, 96:3)
- Recruitment (97:2, 96:1)
- Administrative (97:1, 96:1)
- Diagnosis & Student Placement (97:2)
- Incentives & Motivation (97:1, 96:1)

Action Research Book to be Published

Coming in May or June of 1997 Jossey-Bass will publish Creating Practical Knowledge: Problem-Posing and Problem-Solving Through Action Research. This book will be part of Jossey-Bass's New Directions for Continuing and Higher Education Series. Serving as co-editors are Allan Quigley and Gary Kuhne. Contributors include action researchers Kathleen Cegles, David Fetterman, Kathy Kalinosky, Reana Mearns, Linda Murphy, and Drucie Weirauch, all discussing the projects they successfully completed in Pennsylvania.

In addition, the authors discuss the issues of research in the wider field of adult education and public education. The closing chapters constitute a discussion between John Peters of the University of Tennessee, known for his participatory research work with the Highlander Folk School, and the editors on action research. It promises to be a helpful, engaging addition to the field.

PALPIN at Midwinter Conference

The Pennsylvania Adult Literacy Practitioner Inquiry Network (PALPIN) participated in the Adult Education Midwinter Conference in two ways. A preconference session was held for all current and past PALPIN participants from around the state to meet each other, hear about each other's work, and share experiences and findings from practitioner inquiry projects. Current participants received feedback on their inquiry questions, which they are now in the process of articulating. This session was used to look collaboratively at some data from one participant's inquiry project. The future of PALPIN was discussed as well. One central challenge that the group identified is maintaining the benefits of face-to-face contact as participants work together over greater and greater distances. This separation has meant fewer opportunities to work together. Although PALPIN is experimenting with telecommunications (i.e., e-mail) as a partial alternative, those who are using it now agree that there is a need to work at making it a more effective substitute for being together.

PALPIN also facilitated a concurrent session by offering a hands-on inquiry experience, aimed at those who are uninitiated to practitioner inquiry (although several past and current participants attended). After providing some background on PALPIN and definition information on "practitioner inquiry," the bulk of the session was spent using a "structured conversation" (a frequently used inquiry strategy) to look at data from the classroom of Sandy Harrill, PALPIN facilitator. Participants commented that the experience of looking collaboratively and descriptively at Sandy's data had stimulated them to think about issues in their own work in new ways and also gave them a new strategy for working with colleagues.

A PALPIN RETURNEE SPEAKS

A returnee to the PALPIN Project this year, Kathy Gleockner, writes of her experiences and her reasons for returning:

"I am an instructor at Bradford County Action, an adult learning center in Towanda, PA. I've taught here four years, mostly in GED classes. I joined PALPIN last year because I was curious about practitioner inquiry and teacher research. I thoroughly enjoyed my participation last year at the Winter Institute in Philadelphia. Participation in PALPIN has given me a new way of looking at my students and myself. My project involved looking at GED classes and how change affected my students. I believe my research really helped me understand what my students were thinking and how they viewed class. I believe I am now better able to interact with my students and to individualize instruction.

"I chose to continue with PALPIN this year because Alisa [Alisa Belzer, PALPIN Director] offered me the opportunity to take a leadership role. I'm excited about sharing practitioner inquiry with other adult educators so that they may bring a new focus to their programs."

Since the fall of 1996, four staff developers with the Pennsylvania Action Research Network (PA-ARN) have been working with practitioners across the state in Action Research. They have been mentoring, and facilitating their groups as practitioners developed, implemented, and evaluated specific projects using action research. Finally, they have guided those who have completed projects in 1996-97 in the writing of monographs. The 1996-97 monographs are available through AdvancE and Professional Development Center Offices.

... in the Southwest Region

Drucie Weirauch facilitated the work of practitioners in the southwestern Pennsylvania counties. The nine completed monographs in the Southwest Region group are:

- Use of interviews and creative writing assignments to identify barriers and improve retention.
- Just-in-time training for volunteer tutors.
- Creating a process to evaluate the progress of ESL students' speaking skills using audiotapes.
- The effects of a problem-solving and goalsetting curriculum on student motivation.
- Increasing the number of potential recruits in the literacy program by formalizing policies in the orientation process.
- Improving student retention by concept maps and criterion-referenced testing.
- Using vocabulary building strategies to improve students' GED social studies and

science skills.

- Researching Greater Pittsburgh Literacy Council's impact survey to encourage students to be more reflective about their experiences with the agency.
- Recruitment of ABE students in a corrections facility.

... in the South-Central Region

Linda Ritchey served as trainer for this region. Seven practitioners have completed action research projects and monographs. Projects from South-Central include:

- Effectiveness of offering additional classes to increase student retention.
- Motivating students to complete the GATB through workshop participation.
- Promoting job readiness in county jail inmates through self-awareness.
- How adult students respond to optional and additional class time.
- Improving self-esteem of minority students.
- Illiteracy's impact on patient education and compliance.
- Increasing the use of the computer lab for literacy, GED, and ESL students.

... in the Northwest Region

Trainer David Fetterman guided the work of action researchers in this region. The following six projects and monographs have been completed in the Northwest Region:

• Learner retention action plan.



- Using flash cards and audiotaped words to increase student vocabulary.
 - Mixing ESL students with nativespeaking basic education students.
 - Increasing frequency of outside reading among literacy program participants.
 - Action research on student retention in a one-on-one tutoring program.
 - Utilizing student tutors within a special needs class.

... in the Central-Northeast Region

Trainer Kathy Kalinosky reports that five persons have completed Action Research project for 1996-97. Topic areas in this region include:

- Increasing communication between incarcerated dads and their children.
- Increasing participation and retention through cooperative learning groups.
- Increasing monetary and human resource support for annual fund-raising events.
- Using editorials and political cartoons to improve students thinking skills and GED social studies scores.
- Using collaborative learning to improve students' retention.

Inquiry Project Update

The Pennsylvania Adult Literacy Inquiry Network (PALPIN) project for 1996-97 is drawing to a close and participants are in the process of working on data analysis and final report writing based on very interesting and exciting projects. Two innovative approaches have been used this year to support the ongoing inquiry work of participants who work all over the state and are not able to have face-to-face meetings to provide ongoing feedback or support.

In the Central-Northeast Region, PALPIN participants have shared data from their projects using either U.S. mail or e-mail, and then the group has provided incisive and stimulating feedback which the facilitator then summarizes. All responses and summaries are shared via e-mail—not the same as sitting around a table together, but it might be the next best thing to being there!

Winter Inquiry Institute participants are currently looking at each oth-

ACTION RESEARCH IMPACT STUDY COMPLETED

In April 1997, Debbie Doyle, the Action Research Network Project Assistant, conducted a study of those who participated in the Pennsylvania Action Research Network and completed their projects in 1995-1996. The goal of the study was to gauge the impact of participation in action research on practitioners' work and on their institutions. Both participants and their supervisors were interviewed by telephone. A total of 16 participant-respondents participated in the study. Of those 16, 15 (94%) responded that after participating in action research they now look at problems in a more systematic way. Further, 15 (94%) also stated that, as a result of participation in action research, they now have better problem-solving strategies. Of the seven supervisors interviewed, 100% said they would allocate funding for action research in the future. A total of 57% saw an attitude change, 57% saw a behavior change in their staff who had participated, and 56% saw a lasting impact on their institution.

Action research is a method of organized problem posing and problem solving. It is intended to help practitioners to systematically analyze and solve specific problems and issues confronting them in their individual practice and/or that of the organizations in which they work. It is also hoped that utilizing the process of action research will enable the practitioner to view problems and their solutions in a more systematic way. This recent impact study of 1995-96 PA-ARN participants is important data suggesting that those goals are being accomplished. Complete results of this study are available from the Action Research Network Office.

ers' data and providing response and feedback via U.S. mail. This is not as quick as e-mail, but it doesn't exclude participants who lack access to telecommunications technology. Participants continue to remark that the data-sharing sessions used in PALPIN are stimulating and helpful to both the presenters and the participants.

The Southeast Region has five program-based inquiry groups under way (an on-site facilitator works with a group of staff at a single agency instead of the typical cross-program inquiry group). Program-based groups have identified a single theme or topic that is investigated by multiple staff people in the same program. Such groups have the pragmatic advantage of cutting out travel time to meetings and the professional-development advantage of allowing more in-depth investigations into a topic. However, they lack the opportunity for outsider input available in crossprogram groups. We are going to try to borrow some of this benefit on June 15 at an inter-regional conference when participants from all five groups will have an opportunity to meet, exchange experiences and ideas, and share findings.

The projects this year represent a broad cross-range of experiences and professional positions, interests, and program types-from a volunteer tutor to program directors, from ESL to family literacy to prison literacy. Participants are investigating topics that focus on understanding what happens when they try something new in their practice, or are focusing on getting a better understanding of what's happening within their current practice. The range of projects illustrates well the fact that inquiry is helping both to improve individual practice as well as contribute to overall program improvement.





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

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WELCOME TO THE LAND OF THE FREE

early four years ago, we published the first-ever Freebies for ABLE. It was a big hit with adult basic and literacy educators in Pennsylvania and beyond. Since that time, materials budgets have remained tight, as teachers and tutors not only continue to sight their 'scopes for anything good and free but also find ever more merit in working with realiathe materials of real life. Many of the resources listed in the 1993 edition of Freebies are no longer available, and many new ones have become available. And, while most of us had never even *heard* of the Internet in 1993, many of us are now finding it an indispensable resource for adult education.

So, the time was quite nigh for a new edition of *Freebies*, and here it is!

We started our search for freebies practically from scratch. We recontacted the organizations and companies who had items listed in the 1993 edition. We asked Cheryl Harmon to list materials that are currently available from AdvancE. We also collected leads on other freebies from magazines, newspapers, and television, tucking the information into a file folder over the years. We located several other catalogs of free things (gee, other people have had the same good idea!) and culled them for anything that might be

appropriate for adult learners. Even a publication in the waiting room of a dentist's office produced some good sources. And, to be sure, there's plenty more out there that we don't know about.

We asked each source for samples of the freebies they were offering, then reviewed each item to determine its potential usefulness and appropriateness for ABLE programs. The following pages are the result of that search-and-review process. We think you'll find a lot to choose from!

A few things to keep in mind as you use this catalog:

- The first criterion for inclusion was that the item had to be free. Many, many more materials are available at minimal charge. Everything in *Freebies for ABLE* had to be FREE.
- There's no guarantee that the resources listed here are still available. Some will not be. In some cases, specific offerings change from time to time, but the source may be offering something else instead.
- Not everything is for everyone. But there's probably at least *something* for everyone in your ABLE program.
- Please follow the ordering instructions to the letter. If the source's "order pref" (preference) is to call an 800 num-

ber, then call the 800 number, even if an address is included in the listing. If the source is honoring "individual requests only," please don't ask for classroom quantities.

- Order directly from the source. AdvancE has on file one copy of each of the items listed, for review purposes only. Several other materials are listed as available from AdvancE or WPALRC. Otherwise, the State Literacy Resource Centers, the Bureau of Adult Basic and Literacy Education, and Project AXIS are *not* distributors of the materials listed here.
- Many of the resources have a commercial angle. If we felt the angle was *too* commercial, we didn't list the item. The private sources in particular may have an agenda to promote. Use this as a lesson in critical reading skills!
- Students can often do their own ordering. Having adult learners be responsibile for obtaining materials of interest to them as individuals or groups, perhaps with your assistance, is a valuable activity in itself.

HOW TO USE THOSE FREEBIES

rot hose materials that are not necessarily designed for classroom use, here are some tips for creating valuable lessons from the materials you've gathered.

Help students to:

- Share what they know about the topic before and then after reading the brochure.
- Rewrite brochures into shorter, easier-to-understand sentences.
- Identify key words.
- Identify the main idea of a whole brochure, section, or

single paragraph.

- Discuss as a group issues presented in the brochure.
- Write individual reactions to the material.
- Read for specific details you have listed.
- Locate answers to specific questions about the material.
- Figure out unknown words by using context.
- Read a section, then paraphrase it orally.
- Report on how they have applied ideas from the material.
- Create similar materials re-

lated to your program: write and publish a student orientation guide; tips for taking the GED gathered from those who "have been there"; a booklet of student writings; information gathered on a topic of interest; or a publicity brochure for your program.

For more ideas, borrow *A Field Guide for Literacy*, by Jane W. Ditmars, from your SLRC. It is packed with step-by-step curriculum ideas for teaching adult basic education and literacy students using real-life materials.

The bad news is that an increasing number of CIC's offerings are not quite free. Even the free items require a \$1 fee for up to 25 titles. Still, this is an unbeatable central source. Or subscribe to the quarterly catalog in quantities of 20 of more.
