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ABSTRACT

This document is a bibliography of easy reading materials appropriate for adults who are beginning to read in English. It is divided into seven sections: (I) Leisure Reading; (II) Consumer Information; (III) Current Events, Politics in the U. S.; (IV) Health, Nutrition, and Family; (V) History and Biography; (Va) Contemporary Biographies; and (VI) Science. Titles were chosen on the basis of their appeal to a mature person. Many deal with some problem of American life. Vocabulary level is indicated for some titles. A key to abbreviations/acronyms used in the bibliography and brief descriptions of publishers' series are included. (Author/JDS)

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EASY READING MATERIALS FOR ADULTS LEARNING ENGLISH: 1976-1977 Revised edition

For those students whose first or second language is English and who are beginning to read in English, there is a small but growing collection of books and pamphlets meant to provide a supplement to class assignments. This "Easy Reading Collection" is shelved on a grey bookcart just north of the circulation desk on the fourth floor.

An attempt was made to choose each title on the basis of its possible appeal to a mature person. Many works deal with some problem of American life. A very few abridgements or simplified adaptations of "classics," have been included, but all materials which seemed patronizing or demeaning have been excluded. A few children's books have slipped in (but only on the advice of reading specialists) Finding a variety of materials has been oddly difficult. What is more disturbing is the sameness of tone found in all literary efforts for beginning readers.

To help in the selection of new titles, there is a bibliography: Reader Development Bibliography, 2d edition; compiled by the Reader Development Program of the Free Library of Philadelphia, published in 1974 by New Readers Press. Our call no. 016.428.F853 REF. Recommended titles are annotated and assigned a level of reading difficulty according to the Gunning Fog Index. In the list that follows on these pages, every title listed in the Reader Development Bibliography is marked here with a . Only in these cases is a reading level mentioned, and that reading level is noted on pages 10 through 12, where the publishers and publisher series are described.

The Free Library of Philadelphia also distributes a newsletter <u>PIVOT</u> several times a year (available in librarian's office). The editors review newly released books and discuss trends in adult basic literacy.



SERIES and PUBLISHERS: Key to Abbreviations or acronyms used

- AFF: Accent/Family Finances. Published by Clarion House, distributed by Follett, 1968-1970. 5th to 8th grade [Gunning Fog Index] Photographs indicate Chicago setting. Consumer financial problems worked out as long story-problems. Includes exercises.
- CES: Consumer Education Series. Published by Pendulum Press (q.v.) in 1973. 7th to 8th grade reading level. Published for adults, but presently heavily used in upper grade centers in urban areas. Concentration on text, few photographs. Includes thoughtful exercises.
- CME: Collier-Macmillan (publisher) English readers. This "graded series includes original and adapted short stories, articles, biographies, modern (?) novels and simplified classics." Vocabulary ranges from 2,000 to 4,000 words (though which basic word list used is no where mentioned).
- EL: Elephant editions. Just large print editions of "classics." Resemble cover of coloring books in format. But titles used might prove of interest to our foreign students, since the authors are widely read in translation (e.g. Stephen Crane, Jack London, H.G. Wells).
- FDS: Family Development Series. Steck-Vaughn publishes these consumeroriented booklets. Generally 7th grade level, large type, attractive
 format. Examples of forms, schematics, appropriate to subject are
 thoroughly discussed. Abstract ideas are presented forcefully (no mean
 feat in Adult Basic Readers) particularly in Being an informed citizen
 and Understanding yourself.
- FIR: Firebird series, published by Scholastic Book Services (Note the similarity between it and the Zenith series in format and content) 6th to 8th grade levels. Documents and drawings contemporary to times described illustrate the books. Level of writing approaches literary style. Thematic emphasis is on the history and biography of minority peoples in the United States (e.g. Native American, Spanish Speaking, Asian American and Black American).
- IML: Institute of Modern Languages. Few examples presently, but several titles will be added in 1976/77. All texts are meant for students (adult) whose native language is other than English.
- INC: Incredible series. True tales of mystery, adventure, escape, published in 1972 by Dexter and Westbrook, alas, with a children's picture book format, though intended for adolescent and adult readers.

NR; NR-LL NR-HAB: New Readers Press. Publishing company totally involved in the preparation of Adult Basic Literacy materials. Their publications range from picture books with simple captions, in the New Readers, Laubach Literacy series to intercultural texts for intermediate readers.

The "Be informed series" consists of simple articles on consumer education adapted from the weekly newspaper "News for You." Format is similar to that of workbook with simple outline, short paragraphs, and examples of standard forms (e.g.: credit application, car loan, home mortgage forms) Each booklet is 40 pages long with 4 pages of review questions. All were published in 1970.

NR-HAB. New Readers-Having a Baby. Very short leaflets on conception, pregnancy, delivery, family planning. 3d grade reading level.

- OD: Open Door books. Published by Children's Press in 1970. Each of the 36 titles in this series, is a biography of a person from Black, Spanish-speaking, Native American or Asian American culture, many of whom are currently living and working in Chicago, all of whom have attained some dignity and worth in their life and on their job... Each is written very simply, with some dialogue and much truth told about their pasts. Of all the works described in these pages, these give the most personal feeling of what an ordinary life is like here in the United States. Through all of them runs a feeling of hopefulness.
- PAC: Pacemaker. Fearon Press publishes this series of adventure stories.

 2d to 4th grade level. Simple minded style and carton strip illustrations combine to produce an unremittingly dull series.
- PEN: Pendulum Press publishes in a constantly attractive (though not always very sophisticated) format, materials at 4th through 8th grade level. Among their publications are the biographies in the Nov Age Books, meant for high school students and adopted by Los Angeles County school systems for use with adolescents who are not literate. Other texts are those noted on page 9 and 10 on ecology (Total education in the total environment).
- Readers Digest. Readers Digest readings consist of 6 volumes of slowly increasing difficulty. Articles adapted in many cases from those which had originally appeared in more complex form in the Readers Digest. Each article is 2 to 5 pages long and is followed by a set of exercises meant to test comprehension. Books 1 and 2 build on an assumed vocabulary of 500 words; books 3 and 4, 1000 words, books 5 and 6, 2000 words. Starting—with book 4, the Thorndike and Lorge Teacher's word book of 30,000 words is used as a base. (A very modest survey revealed that most students took two to three weeks to read one of the earlier books, were eager to start on another book, but found books 4 and 5 rather difficult) These are the most consistently popular works in the collection.

Readers Digest Science readers. The Digest assigns grade level to them in the form of small flying horses—three for green, representing third grade...students here as in all series will find their own level. Adapted

from stories in the Reader's Digest, the writing seems more slanted to children, but the Chicago Board of Education representatives state that these are used successfully with adults emerging into literacy. No exercises at the end of each article, just a suggestion for simple experiment using home materials.

- SKAT: A skill at a time. Jamestown Publishers. Not a reader or story, but a collection of excerpts from the "classics," generally short paragraphs from the likes of <u>Victory</u>, <u>Vanity Fair</u>, <u>Crime and Punishment</u>. One multiple choice question appears at the end of each quoted paragraph.
- TAT: Teen age Tales. Published by Heath and Co. in 1966. Aimed at the high school market and dated in format and illustration. However, the Central Y high school reading specialist has often found them helpful, because they included so many stories of such variety that students could find a few in each volume in which they could become absorbed. Many of the stories deal with white teen age America's world of proms and football, but there are some stories which deal with a more growning world of work. (Little readership for these volumes)
- UA: Published by Pendulum Press in 1969. Small paperbacks about 60 pages in length, each one dealing with a different social problem nagging American cities today. Vocabulary, sentence and paragraph structure seems slightly more complex than advanced readers in Readers Digest series. Illustrated, no exercises. Students in the credit divisions often use these books for term-paper research. UA: Urban American series.
- ZEN: Zenith books. Published by Doubleday, between 1967 and 1974. 6th to 8th grade reading level. Great respect in tone for the subject (history and biography of minority peoples in the United States) and for the reader (attractive page layout, distinctive illustrations).
