ABSTRACT

This document is a summary of the findings of the 1997 San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) Senior Survey. The survey is a multiple-choice response questionnaire administered to all San Francisco public high school seniors. Students were asked a series of questions about their plans for work and higher education after high school graduation. Included in the report is information on career and higher education plans of high school seniors, including which postsecondary educational institution students plan to attend. This information is provided at the school district level and is broken down by individual high school and ethnicity. Some of the main findings include: (1) of the 2,364 San Francisco seniors responding to this survey, 1725 plan to go to college, 455 plan to start a job, and 184 have other goals; (2) over 400 respondents indicated an intention to enroll at City College of San Francisco; and (3) post-high school plans vary by ethnicity--African Americans, American Indians, and Latinos are more likely to begin a job and less likely to continue their education after graduation than is the general population. Ambitions also vary by San Francisco's high schools. (JLJ)

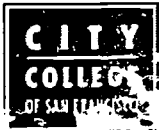

SFUSD SENIOR SURVEY SUMMARY • 1997

Enclosed is a summary of the findings of the 1997 San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) Senior Survey. Included is information on career and higher education plans of high school seniors including which post-secondary educational institutions students plan to attend. This information is provided at the school district level and is also broken down by individual high school and ethnicity.

The 1997 SFUSD Senior Survey is a multiple choice response questionnaire administered to all San Francisco public high school seniors during May of their senior year. For the class of 1997, the survey includes 2364 total valid respondents from a senior class of 3469, or about 68.1% of all SF seniors. Students were asked a series of questions about their plans for work and higher education after high school graduation.

Of the 2364 San Francisco seniors responding to this survey, 1725 plan to go to college, 455 plan to start a job or receive job training, and 184 have other goals (Table 1). Over 400 respondents indicated an intention to enroll at City College of San Francisco. This compares to the nearly 1000 enrollments from recent SFUSD graduates City College receives each year. This discrepancy may be due to seniors not completing the survey or students changing their educational plans. The largest number of students intend to go to CCSF (412 students), SFSU (330), UC Davis (156), and UC Berkeley (124) (Table 2).

Post high school plans vary by ethnicity. African Americans, American Indians, and Latinos are

more likely begin a job and less likely to continue their education after graduation than is the general population (Table 3). African Americans, Filipinos, and Latinos also plan to attend UC at well below average rates. Chinese, Japanese, and Korean students plan to attend UC at much higher than average rates. Over 7% of African Americans would like to attend college but are undecided about where to attend, compared to a little over 3% uncertainty in the general population.

Ambitions also vary greatly among San Francisco's high schools. While 16% of SFUSD seniors indicated an intention to join the workforce after graduation, students at Balboa, Downtown, Independence, International Study Academy, McAteer, School of the Arts, Twain, and Wells high schools plan to start jobs at a higher rate (Table 4). Furthermore, students from Balboa, Independence, Lincoln, McAteer, Mission, O'Connell, Twain, and Wells high schools plan on attending CCSF at greater than average rates for City high school seniors. Seniors from International Study Academy, Lowell, and Wallenberg high schools indicate an intention to attend UC in greater numbers than students at other SF high schools.
