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ABSTRACT

This elective world studies course for 10th, 11th, and 12th grade students examines the problems and dilemmas of non-Western countries that are trying to preserve their own culture and national pride and yet attain the economic wealth of the West as represented by Europe and the United States. It deals with selected non-Western societies (the Republic of South Africa, Brazil, India, and China) in which inter-action between traditional cultures and Western cultures was followed by change and the subsequent development of new societies. It is hoped that the student will consider the ways in which political science, economics, sociology, and anthropology are reflected in the problems of tradition and change. A list of recommended textual materials, films, and filmstrips is included in the guide, as well as a brief course outline and course goals. (Author/OPH)

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## INTRODUCTION

This course of study was written as a part of a total effort to revise curriculum to fit the quinmester administrative organization of schools. The materials and information in this guide are meant to be neither all-inclusive nor prescriptive; but rather, an aide to teachers as they plan instructional programs, taking into account student needs and characteristics, available resources, and other factors.

The major intent of this publication is to provide a broad framework of goals and objectives, content, teaching strategies, class activities, and materials all related to a described course of study. Teachers may then accept the model framework in total or draw ideas from it to incorporate into their lessons.

The guide is divided into a broad goals section, a content outline, and a materials section. The first section provides descriptive and goal-oriented information for the teacher; "indicators of success" refers to suggested prerequisite or corequisite experiences. The content outline illustrates, in general terms, the scope and major subdivisions of the course. The materials section of the guide lists resources in four categories: essential textual or other material; alternate classroom materials to use in place of or in addition to the aforementioned; supplementary teacher resources; and supplementary student resources.

This course of study deviates from the format which was adopted by the Social Studies Quinmester Advisory Council and is used in most other courses of study. The reason for this departure is because Holt, Rinehart and Winston has produced a project containing objectives and learning activities which would more than adequately support this nine-week unit. The project referred to is Tradition and Change in Four Societies. This is a portion of the Carnegie-Mellon University social studies curriculum, which is state adopted.

**RATIONALE:** THE MODERN WORLD IS IN A CONSTANT STATE OF CHANGE. THIS COURSE DEALS WITH SELECTED NON-WESTERN SOCIETIES IN WHICH INTERACTION BETWEEN TRADITIONAL CULTURES AND WESTERN CULTURES WAS FOLLOWED BY CHANGE AND THE SUBSEQUENT DEVELOPMENT OF NEW SOCIETIES. IT IS HOPED THAT THE STUDENT WILL CONSIDER THE WAYS IN WHICH POLITICAL SCIENCE, ECONOMICS, SOCIOLOGY, AND ANTHROPOLOGY ARE REFLECTED IN THE PROBLEMS OF TRADITION AND CHANGE.

COURSE GOALS

1. THE STUDENTS WILL EXAMINE THE TRADITIONAL CULTURE OF SEVERAL SOCIETIES.
2. THE STUDENTS WILL ANALYZE THE IMPACT THAT WESTERN IDEAS AND TECHNOLOGY HAVE HAD UPON THE SELECTED SOCIETIES.
3. THE STUDENTS WILL EXAMINE HOW TRADITIONAL WAYS OF LIVING AND WORKING BEGAN TO CHANGE, AND ANALYZE THE FORMATION OF NEW SOCIETIES.
4. THE STUDENTS WILL FORMULATE HYPOTHESES ABOUT THE FUTURE OF THESE NEW SOCIETIES.
