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**ABSTRACT**

Information is provided on the funding of grant programs for the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) Title IV (Library Services for Indian Tribes and Hawaiian Natives) for fiscal year (FY) 1986. These grants have enabled Indian tribes and Hawaiian natives to improve their public library services through a number of authorized activities, including training of library personnel, purchase of library materials, and the construction and renovation of library facilities. The amount of funding is an established percentage of the annual appropriations for LSCA I, II, and III. In FY86, 1.5% was set aside for Indian tribes and 0.5% for Hawaiian Natives for a total of \$2,211,000.00. This booklet describes the 185 Basic Grant awards (including joint awards) totalling \$606,177.00; the 17 Special Projects awards (made with funds remaining after the Basic Grants are awarded) totalling \$1,052,073.00; and the single Basic Grant for Hawaiian Natives of \$552,750.00 (made to the only organization recognized as eligible by the Governor of Hawaii). For each grant, information is given on the grantee, the grant's focus, names of librarian and project director, amount of funding, project period, and a brief description. A summary of Basic Grants for FY86 is appended, showing breakdown by activity and state. (JMM)

## Foreword

The Library Services for Indian Tribes and Hawaiian Natives Program, Title IV of the Library Services and Construction Act, was enacted in 1984 and authorizes the Secretary of Education to award Basic and Special Projects Grants to federally recognized Indian tribes and to organizations primarily serving Hawaiian natives.

In the second year of operation, these grants have enabled Indian tribes and Hawaiian natives to improve their public library services through a number of authorized activities, including training of library personnel, purchase of library materials, and the construction and renovation of library facilities.

The initial improvement in the quality of public library services is a result of the dedication of tribal communities and, in some cases, cooperative efforts by local and State libraries. In the Department of Education, Frank Stevens, Director, Library Development Staff, and Beth Fine, Program Officer, provided technical assistance to applicants throughout the grant cycle. Dianne Villines, Program Assistant, provided vital assistance in this booklet's preparation.

This booklet describes the 185 Basic Grant awards (including joint awards), the 17 Special Projects awards, and the single Basic Grant for Hawaiian natives. The summaries show how these Indian tribes and the Hawaiian native organization are using grant funds to provide members of their communities with the advantages and services of a public library.

## Introduction

This booklet provides information on the funding of the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) Title IV grant programs. The booklet contains:

- An explanation of the Basic Grant;
- A description of each Special Projects Grant;
- Descriptions of the Hawaiian Natives Projects; and
- An appendix table summarizing each Basic Grant, by authorized activity.

Fiscal year 1986 was the second year of funding for the two LSCA IV programs, Basic Grants and Special Projects Grants. The amount of funding for both programs is an established percentage of the annual appropriations for LSCA I, II, and III. In FY 86, 1.5 percent, or \$1,658,250, was set aside for Indian tribes and 0.5 percent, or \$552,750, was set aside for Hawaiian natives, for a total of \$2,211,000 for LSCA Title IV. Of the amount set aside for Indian tribes, \$606,177 was used to make 185 Basic Grant awards, and \$1,052,073 supported 17 Special Projects Grants.

# **LSCA Title IV**

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## **Basic Grants**



Basic Grants are awarded on a noncompetitive basis to federally recognized Indian tribes and to Hawaiian native organizations recognized by the Governor of Hawaii. Grantees must pursue the authorized activities described below. Basic Grant awards were made totaling \$606,177. All Basic Grants were \$3,277 each, with the exception of one for \$3,209. Three applicants, King Island Native Community, Alaska, Manzanita Band of Mission Indians, California, and Mesa Grande Band of Mission Indians, California, submitted joint applications and applied on behalf of other eligible tribes.

Authorized activities include:

*Library needs assessment*—examining the tribal community's public library needs through surveys or community meetings.

*Training of library personnel*—providing inservice or preservice training of Indians and Hawaiian natives as library personnel.

*Salaries of library personnel*—hiring full-time or part-time librarians or library aides.

*Purchase of library materials*—buying books and other printed and published resources to answer tribal library needs.

*Dissemination of information about library services*—using newsletters, public service announcements, and display cases

*Transportation to enable Indians and Hawaiian natives to have access to library services*—including bookmobile services, as well as vans to transport tribal members to public library facilities.

*Conduct of special library programs for Indians and Hawaiian natives*—producing oral history projects and programs for special populations such as the elderly.

*Construction*—including the purchase, renovation, or remodeling of library buildings

*Contracts to provide library services to Indians and Hawaiian natives, or to carry out any of the above activities*—contracting with local libraries or tribally chartered libraries to provide public library services.

A summary of Basic Grants awarded in FY 86 appears as the appendix to this booklet.

## **LSCA Title IV**

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### **Special Projects Grants**

Special Projects Grants are competitive awards that are made with funds remaining after the Basic Grants are awarded. Applicants must have received a Basic Grant in the same fiscal year to be eligible to compete for these grants. All Special Projects grantees are required to share a minimum of 20 percent of the total project costs, and a librarian must administer the funds of the project. The 1-year projects are part of a long-range plan of 3 to 5 years. Of the 17 tribes that were funded in FY 1985, only six tribes (seven projects) were able to maintain funding for the second year of their long-range plans.

Seventeen Special Projects awards were made in fiscal year 1986, totaling \$1,052,073. The following abstracts summarize the types of activities that the Indian tribes plan to accomplish during the established grant period.

# **LSCA Title IV**

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## **Hawaiian Natives Projects**

The Basic Grant awarded to the Hawaiian Natives was made to Alu Like, Inc., the only organization recognized by the Governor of Hawaii to be eligible to participate in these programs. The Native Hawaiian Library Project Coordinator is Mahealani Merryman. Alu Like chose to receive all of the \$552,750 appropriated under the Basic Grants Program.

The Native Hawaiian Library Project emphasizes continuing development of outreach programs; a media campaign to inform the community of available resources and services of the public library, increased access, evaluation, and strengthening of Hawaiian and Pacific collections; and employment training for Hawaiians in library and information services.
