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ABSTRACT

The annotated bibliography cites law-related curriculum materials for elementary and secondary education. Most materials listed have been published in the 70's with the exception of a few dating from the 60's. The bibliography consists of the following seven sections: 1) origins and concepts of law; 2) the constitution; 3) the bill of rights; 4) current issues; 5) the political process; 6) practical law; and 7) teaching of law: sources and concepts. Within each section, books are listed alphabetically by author. Information provided for each entry includes grade level, a brief description of content, number of pages, price and availability of a paperback edition and teacher's guide. A series listing and publishers listing with accompanying addresses are provided. A title/author index is also included. (RM)

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The late Adlai Stevenson said:

"Democracy is not self-executing. We have to make it work, and to make it work we have to understand it. Sober thought and fearless criticism are impossible without critical thinkers and thinking critics. Such persons must be given the opportunity to come together to see new facts in the light of old principles and to evaluate old principles in light of new facts by deliberation, debate, and dialogue."

The American Bar Association Special Committee on Youth Education for Citizenship believes that democracy can only be made to work effectively if "understanding" as called for by Ambassador Stevenson is developed in the elementary and secondary schools of our country. It is not our intention to make every student a lawyer. It is rather to help educators use the substance and process of law as vehicles by which students and their teachers can "examine new facts in the light of old principles, and evaluate old principles in light of new facts."

Our goal is to see that law is taught systematically in our schools at all levels. All of our efforts are directed at developing interdisciplinary programs in law-related education. We work with lawyers, representatives of the justice system, educational administrators, teachers and parents. Each of these groups must support and participate in effective programs. Soon, we hope an elementary or secondary school without courses in law will be as rare as a school today without courses in mathematics.

Last year, we published the first edition of our *Directory of Law-Related Educational Activities*. That book (now in revision) described over 170 law-related projects throughout the United States. The book proved important not only for the information it contained, but also as a demonstration that the movement for law studies in the schools was alive and prospering. Similarly, this *Bibliography of Law-Related Curriculum Materials: Annotated* will, we think, be useful as evidence that materials are available, and as a reference source for those materials. To be sure, much needs to be done, particularly for the lower grades, in development of curriculum materials. YEFC does not itself attempt curriculum development nor does it have a proprietary interest in any curriculum materials. Our function is entirely facilitative. However, we welcome publication of improved materials at all levels, and are prepared to help K-12 curriculum developers in any appropriate manner.

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INTRODUCTION

*Events in our courts, legislatures, government offices and streets over the past 15 years have led to an increased interest in teaching about law—both its process and its content—in America's elementary and secondary schools. The resulting proliferation of interdisciplinary law-related citizenship education projects has led to a search for appropriate materials. Unfortunately, library classification systems were not designed with law-related education in mind. Also, many books in this field are developed and distributed by bar associations, law enforcement agencies, civic groups, and other non-commercial publishers. These books are not always available in the library under any classification, nor are they found in such reference sources as *Books in Print*.*

This annotated bibliography is an attempt to provide teachers and lawyers with access to a wide variety of printed materials—commercial and non-commercial—dealing with the content of law-related education and with successful pedagogical approaches. In addition to textbooks, this bibliography includes books that were not written specifically for use in the classroom, but can often be valuable for teachers and students. While we have attempted to avoid evaluation in the annotations, we have omitted materials that, in our opinion, are clearly inadequate in content or pedagogical method.

Audio-visual materials, games and simulations are also available. While many of these are worthwhile and exciting, we did not include them in the bibliography. We are currently making inquiries to determine whether a comprehensive bibliography of such materials is being prepared elsewhere. If not, the Special Committee on Youth Education for Citizenship will consider publishing one.

Many people have helped put this bibliography in your hands. Shelley Cox, a professional librarian and bibliographer, did a considerable amount of research and organization. Susan Davison, a YEFC Assistant Director, did an enormous amount of difficult and painstaking work in putting this book together. YEFC staff members Norman Gross, Charles White, Earnestine Murohy, Carin Smith and Jeanne Wilson all worked unstintingly to see this job to completion. In addition, friends and colleagues from our Special Committee and Advisory Commission and from other law-related citizenship education projects have been helpful in commenting on successive drafts. We also wish to acknowledge the assistance of Neal Miller, who made available to us his unpublished bibliography prepared for the ABA Young Lawyers Section High School Law Program Committee and Section of Criminal Law Teacher Training Institute Committee.

In spite of the efforts of all involved, we are confident that we have missed some publications. We urge publishers, colleagues and friends to let us know of any books they believe appropriate for future editions of this bibliography. For this purpose a form is included on the last page.

KEY TO THE BIBLIOGRAPHY

- ☆ *The main body of the bibliography* consists of seven major parts. "Origins and Concepts of Law", the first part, contains books which relate to the philosophy and history of law and the function of law in society. Part II, "The Constitution," is concerned with the role of constitutional law in shaping the legal, political, and social order of the United States. This section includes materials concerning the three branches of our federal government as well as states' rights and local government. Part III, "The Bill of Rights", describes books which can help develop an appreciation of the rights and responsibilities contained in the Bill of Rights. Materials on freedom of expression, freedom of religion, the right to privacy, due process, privileges and immunities of citizenship, and national security are included. Part IV, "Current Issues", contains books dealing with law-related issues in today's society. "The Political Process", Part V, describes books dealing with elections, electioneering, lobbying and other practical aspects of politics. Part VI, "Practical Law", describes materials covering general issues of law with which the average citizen should be familiar. The emphasis in this section is on common legal problems. Part VII, "Teaching of Law: Sources and Concepts", lists books which should be especially valuable to teachers new to the teaching of law. The books in this section discuss strategies, activities, objectives, and other useful information.
- ☆ *Books are listed alphabetically* by author. They often indicate a grade level. Grade level is a reflection of a combination of factors, including conceptual sophistication and reading level. However, all books must be measured by local norms. Listings specifying "Teacher" indicate resource and background materials for adults. If a book relates to more than one content area, we have attempted to list it in each appropriate section. Following the author and title is a series name, if the book is part of a series that incorporates other volumes pertinent to law and citizenship studies. Next we list publisher (or distributor) and copyright date.
- ☆ *The annotation of each book* contains a brief description of its contents. We have attempted to avoid judgmental statements. In addition, the following information is given after each annotation:
 - Number of Pages:* This is listed where appropriate. Some non-commercial materials are not paginated because they are continually revised and updated with new looseleaf material.
 - Price:* Prices for single copies are indicated. Prices should be checked in the most recent catalogs or with the publisher before ordering, however, as price lists are subject to frequent change. Also, there are often special prices available for schools and orders in bulk quantities. In some cases, no price is listed at the request of the publisher. This usually indicates either that a limited quantity is available or that price varies according to the quantity ordered.
 - Paperback:* Editions available in paperback are indicated by "pb". Price listings in these cases indicate the paperback price.
 - Teacher's Guide:* If a separate teacher's guide exists, a "TG" is noted.
 - Text/Trade:* A book is noted as "text" if it was published primarily for use in a school curriculum. "Trade" indicates that a book may be used to enrich or amplify material but probably does not contain suggestions for activities, discussion questions, etc. "Text (teacher)" indicates that a book is designed for use by teachers in conjunction with classroom activities.
- ☆ *The "series" listing* lists all titles in each series referred to in the main body of the bibliography. These lists also contain books which are not law-related, if they were published in a series containing law-related books. They may be of interest to social studies teachers and librarians interested in purchasing or reviewing complete series.
- ☆ *A publishers list* follows. The address indicated is the best address to use in placing an order, or so the publishers have informed us.
- ☆ *The index* alphabetically lists titles and authors.

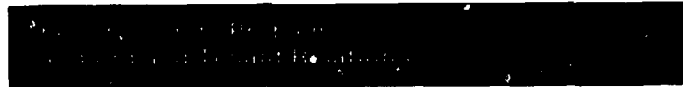

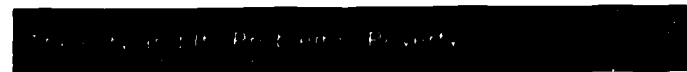
