ABSTRACT

The Scholastic Assessment Tests (SAT) are national examinations designed to assess a student's chances of success at the college level. There are two SAT examinations, the SAT I, a reasoning assessment of students' verbal and mathematics skills, and the SAT II, in which students are tested in specific subject areas. In Wake County (North Carolina), 3,337 high school seniors took the SAT I, representing 76% of the county's seniors. The average SAT score for Wake County Public Schools seniors in 1997-98 was one of the highest in North Carolina, second only to one other district. This average score increased by 5 points over 1996-97. Significant gaps continued to exist between males and females and black and white students, but this gap, which is also seen nationally, has been closing over the past decade. An appendix contains a report of SAT scores according to family income, parent education level, high school grade point average, and high school rank. (Contains seven tables.) (SLD)

ABOUT THE SAT

The SAT is a national examination, offered through the College Board, designed to assess a student's chances of success at the college level. During the 1997-98 school year, students registered for nearly 2.8 million SATs—a 5.4 percent increase from last year. In Wake County, the number of seniors taking the SAT I rose to 3377 in 1997-98 from 3130 in 1996-97.

There are two types of SAT exams: SAT I and SAT II. The SAT I is a reasoning assessment of students' verbal and mathematics skills. Through the SAT II students are tested in specific subject areas. This bulletin summarizes national, state, and county SAT I data.

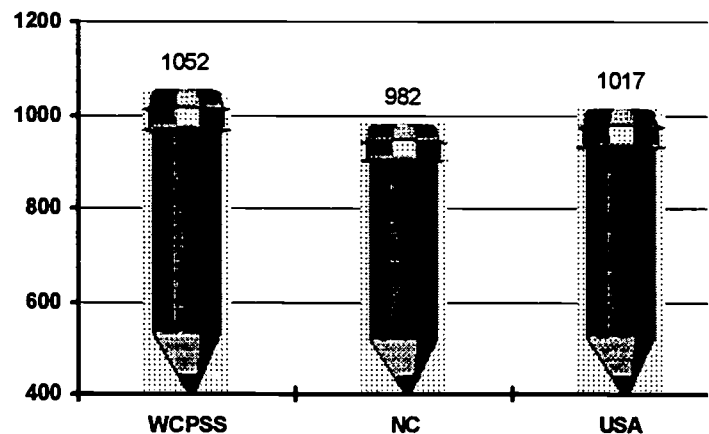
In April 1995, the College Board *recentered* the score scales for students taking the SAT to reflect the contemporary test-taking population. Recentering allows for easier interpretation of scores and more simple comparisons between students' verbal and mathematics abilities.

To permit comparisons with previous years, the College Board has provided conversions of old scores to the new scale. Conversions and new scales are used throughout this bulletin.

DISTRICTWIDE RESULTS

The average SAT score for WCPSS seniors in 1997-98 was one of the highest of all NC districts—second only to Chapel Hill-Carrboro!

The average score for WCPSS students increased by 5 points over 1996-97. This increase exceeds the 1 point increase for students nationwide, and is more than the 4 point gain for the state. A comparison of WCPSS, NC, and the United States is shown below.



While scores were up, participation of the WCPSS senior class also rose two points to 76%. U.S. participation rose one point to 43% and NC participation rose three points to 62%.

The approximate rate of 76% participation in the WCPSS is calculated by dividing the number of students who took the SAT by the size of the 12th grade class at the end of the eighth month of the senior year. The average WCPSS senior taking the test scored 19 points higher on the math test and 16 points higher on the verbal test than the average senior across the country.

WCPSS average math scores have increased 33 points in the last nine years (see Table 1). Average verbal scores increased 20 points, while participation rates remained stable at or near the 75% mark.

The WCPSS total score increase of 53 points over nine years greatly exceeds both the national increase of 16 points and the NC increase of 34 points. It is also notable that over the past nine years there has been a steady increase in scores except for a one-point decline in 1994.

The score for the average WCPSS student compared well to students in other similar large school districts in other states as illustrated in Table 2. While WCPSS exceeded several districts, the average score was lower than the average score in Fairfax County Virginia.

As shown above, total scores for seven of Wake County's high schools improved over the 1996-97 scores and only two schools had a total score below the NC average.

Last year, WCPSS had the fourth highest score of districts across the state. This year WCPSS ranked second. Two other counties that led Wake last year, Watauga and Madison, saw a decline in their scores. Watauga seniors dropped one point from 1048 to 1047, and Madison fell 45 points from 1072 to 1027. Chapel Hill-Carrboro continues to lead NC districts with a score of 1188.
