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ABSTRACT

Brief narrative descriptions of the development of Missouri community colleges and the purposes and goals of the Hissouri Department of Higher Education introduce the 17 tables of data pertinent to various aspects of Missouri junior colleges which make up the bulk of this report. An aggregate statement of income, expenditures, and physical assets of state junior colleges is presented, followed by tables reporting individual college and cumulative data. These cover assessed valuations of community college districts, operating and debt service levies from 1971 through 1974, estimated full-time equivalent (FTE) per capita operating costs and tuition and fees for the 1974-75 academic year, state aid, headcount and FTE enrollment from 1966 through 1974, total semester hours taken in academic years 1972-73 and 1973-74, total graduates during 1973-74, summer school enrollments from 1963 through 1974, categories of semester hours generated in 1973-74, headcount enrollment by program area during fall 1973, student information for fall 1973 and fall 1974, sources of revenues and unrestricted expenditures from fiscal year 1971 through fiscal year 1974, actual and projected FTE enrollments from 1970-71 through 1977-78, and actual and projected per capita costs from 1970-71 through 1977-78. 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REPORT OF PUBLIC JUNIOR COLLEGES

The history of the development of the public junior college system in Missouri since the outset has been very closely linked to the State Board of Shortly after the turn of the century, statutory provision was made Education. for the offering of two-year college courses by fully accredited high schools upon the ".... approval of and subject to the supervision of the state superintendent of schools." The authorization to offer two-year college courses as an extension of the high school served as the basis for public junior college education in the state for a period approximating a half century. Characteristic of these early efforts was the fact that, for the most part, the courses were designed solely for transfer to four-year colleges and universities. It wasn't until 1961 that the concept of the comprehensive community college began to have an impact upor the established pattern of providing college parallel courses. In that year, the 71st General Assembly enacted into law Senate Bill 7 which provided for the formation of independent districts exclusively for junior college purposes. Again, the State Board of Education was by statute assigned the responsibility for state-level administration and supervision.

The new Junior College Act made it poss ble for the State Board of Education to broaden the junior college concept so that newly created institutions would be comprehensive in nature, thus providing programs of instruction and services in the following areas below the baccalaureate level: (1) occupational education, (2) general education, (3) transfer and preprofessional education, (4) adult education, (5) community services, and (6) individualized counseling and guidance services.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE DEVELOPMENT 1961-1974

Since the enabling legislation passed in 1961, ten independent comprehensive junior college districts have been organized, two of which are multi-campus operations with three separate campuses serving each district. Two junior colleges (Moberly and Trenton) still operate as extensions of elementary and secondary systems under the provisions of Section 178.370 RSMo. The total state system presently consists of twelve districts and sixteen operating campuses enrolling 44,478 students in the fall of 1973.

Faculty: The number of full-time equated faculty teaching in public junior colleges has paralleled the rapid growth in student enrollment. In 1961, there were 209 teachers serving a total of 6,787 students. In 1973, there were approximately 2,100 teachers serving 44,478 students. Of the 2,100 teachers, 82 percent held doctor's degrees; 64.7 percent held master's degrees; and 27.1 percent held the bachelor's degrees. In 1973-74, the average salary for fulltime faculty was \$11,178.

<u>Curriculum</u>: The fact that the public community colleges continue to be the fastest growing segment of higher education in the state is due in part to the development of a wide range of curricular offerings designed to meet the educational needs of the communities they serve. Illustrative of this is the fact



that students may receive the first two years of a transfer oriented curriculum or may choose from a variety of occupational programs designed specifically to prepare individuals for immediate employment. (Currently, the twelve districts offer over 150 occupationally oriented programs.) In addition, Missouri's community colleges have made significant progress toward the development of programs of adult and continuing education.

<u>State Aid</u>: With the passage of the Junior College Act in 1961, the state became a partner in sharing the cost of junior college education with local districts and the student. The state's share was based on a formula which initially provided \$200 per full-time student. The original formula has been revised three times in the past thirteen years; in 1965, 1967, and 1972. The 1972 revision provides a maximum of \$400 for each 24 semester hours generated or 50 percent of the full-time equated per capita cost, whichever is less. In 1973-74, the colleges received \$14,139,586 in state aid which represented approximately 35 percent of the state-weighted average operating costs.

GOVERNMENTAL REORGANIZATION

The decade of the sixties witnessed the phenomenal growth and development of the comprehensive community college in Missouri resulting in increased postsecondary educational opportunities to thousands of Missouri citizens. The Department of Education is proud to have been a part of the creation and management of these truly unique institutions. In slightly over ten years, public junior colleges have become a significant part of the higher education community enrolling approximately 30 percent of all students attending public institutions of higher education.

While many of the Department's goals have been achieved with regard to the development of a state system of comprehensive community colleges, much remains to be done. For example: (1) Approximately 48 percent of the high school graduates in the state still reside outside a junior college d strict. (2) The need for an improved formula to provide more adequate fundit or the public junior colleges at both the stare and local levels continues an urgent priority. (Past studies by the Department and independent study groups have suggested that the state should provide from 50 percent to 75 percent or operating costs and that the state should also share in capital outlay costs connected with the construction of educational buildings.) (3) Programs and services in existing districts should be expanded to more effectively meet the educational needs of the adult population. (4) Continued development and expansion of vocational and technical programs is a vital concern. (Currently, approximately 30 percent of the total enrollment is in the vocational area -- an immediate goal should be 50 percent.) (5) And finally, the need to clarify the role of the comprehensive community college as it fits in and relates to the role and scope of all other educational institutions is perhaps the most pressing issue and should be addressed in such a way that unnecessary duplication can be avoided.

As provided for in the Omnibus State Reorganization Act of 1974 and effective July 1, 1974, the statutory responsibility for state-level administration and supervision of Missouri's public junior colleges was transferred to the



newly created Department of Higher Education. With this change, it is hoped that the public junior colleges will continue to be a dynamic force in the total educational delivery system of the state and that they will continue to be the segment of higher education which strives to equalize postsecondary educational opportunity to all those, both young and old, who can profit therefrom. The label "democracy's colleges" is both a worthy goal and fitting challenge for the future.
