ABSTRACT

Designed to encourage students in grades 7-12 to make reading a habit, this annotated booklist contains over 400 titles of fiction and nonfiction books published between 1987 and 1989. It is intended for students who are able to read but lack the motivation to do so because they have not encountered books that speak to their interests and concerns. The titles represent a variety of books of high quality, some series literature, and some "fast-read" books that deal with topics of interest to the average adolescent. Titles and annotations are arranged under the following categories: (1) adventure; (2) animals; (3) biography; (4) death; (5) ethnic; (6) family life; (7) fantasy; (8) folklore and legends; (9) friendship; (10) growing up; (11) health; (12) historical fiction; (13) history; (14) how-to; (15) humor; (16) love and romance; (17) mystery; (18) poetry; (19) science; (20) science fiction; (21) social problems; (22) sports; (23) supernatural; and (24) travel. A directory of publishers is included, as well as author, title, and subject indexes. (SR)

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Foreword

The National Council of Teachers of English is proud to publish four different booklists, renewed on a regular rotation, in its bibliography series. The four are Adventuring with Books (pre-K through grade 6), Your Reading (middle school, junior high), Books for You (senior high), and High Interest—Easy Reading (junior, senior high reluctant readers). Conceived as resources for teachers and students alike, these volumes reference thousands of the most recent children's and young adults' trade books. The works listed cover a wide range of topics, from preschool ABC books to science fiction novels for high school seniors, from wordless picture books to nonfiction works on family stresses, computers, and mass media.

Each edition of an NCTE booklist is compiled by a group of teachers and librarians, under leadership appointed by the NCTE Executive Committee. Working for most of three or four years with new books submitted regularly by publishers, the committee members review, select, and annotate the hundreds of works to be listed in their new edition. The members of the committee that compiled this volume are listed on one of the first pages.

Of course, no single book is right for everyone or every purpose, so inclusion of a work in this booklist is not necessarily an endorsement from NCTE. However, it is an indication that, in the view of the professionals who make up the booklist committee, the work in question is worthy of teachers' and students' attention, perhaps for its informative, perhaps its aesthetic qualities. On the other hand, exclusion from an NCTE booklist is not necessarily a judgement on the quality of a given book or publisher. Many factors – space, time, availability of certain books, publisher participation—may influence the final shape of the list.

We hope that you will find this booklist useful and that you will collect the other booklists in the NCTE series. We feel that these volumes contribute substantially to our mission of helping to improve instruction in En glish and the language arts. We think you will agree.

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Note to the Reader

The committee has intended this book for students, although it may also be of use to teachers and media specialists, librarians. The students for whom the book may be useful are generally in grades 7-12 and generally nonreaders, although that is an indication of inclination, not ability. We betieve that the primary audience for this edition, as in previous editions, is the student who can read—but often does not.

Entries are, therefore, written for students. We have not indicated a grade level or a sophistication level as a general rule, however, we have, in some instances, noted that a given book may contain mature subject matter. Nor have we suggested a reading level. We believe that reading levels are occasionally misleading and that interest will be the most significant factor.

We have looked for books that hold high interest for people in this age group and have been guided, to some degree, by accessibility. We have avoided books whose format suggests an elementary level, we have also avoided books whose content is too complex. While we have always looked for high-quality books, we have operated on the premise that the person who reads can always be helped in the search for better literature, the nonreader cannot. Thus, we have included some series literature and some "fast-read" books that will be of interest to less sophisticated readers.

Booklists generally provide information about what's available rather than what *must* be read. This list is no different. We believe, however, that these books are worth the time and effort to read, students who have tested them agree. The final test lies with the individual reader.



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1 Adventure

1.1 Alexander, Lloyd. The Drackenberg Adventure. E. P. Dutton, 1988. ISBN 0-525-44389-4.

It is 1873, and seventeen-year-old Vesper Holly accepts an invitation to attend 'he diamond jubilee in the grand duchy of Drackenberg for her guardians, Brinnie and Mary. In Drackenberg, they meet Helvitius, an old enemy. By teaming up with the local gypsies, Holly fights Helvitius's plot to take the fortunes of Drackenberg as his own. Exciting adventures lead to an unusual climax.

1.2 Alexander, Lloyd. The El Dorado Adventure. E. P. Dutton, 1987. ISBN 0-525-44313-4.

Having risked her life in Illyria last year, green-eyed Vesper Holly, only seventeen, is now eager to explore her newest piece of property—a volcano in the republic of El Dorado in Central America. Amidst palm-thatched roofs, spicy food, and cantina music, Vesper st. uggles to protect her land from Alain de Rochefort, a villain who intends to use it in his plan to turn an Indian tribe's homeland into a swamp. In the jungle, her struggle with de Rochefort becomes a deadly game. Sequel to *The Illyrian Adventure*.

1.3 Borton de Treviño, Elizabeth. El Güero: A True Adventure Story. Illustrated by Leslie W. Bowman. Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 1989. ISBN 0-374-31995-2.

When an upstanding Mexican judge is exiled to uncivilized Baja California in 1876, his son Porfirio ("El Güero"), must travel through wilderness, storm, and silen Indians to find him. El Güero must then win the confidence of the commandante of the army garrison in order to save his father and the village of Ensenada from mutinous soldiers and American outlaws.

1.4 Carr, Jess. Intruder in the Wind. Commonwealth Press, 1987. ISBN 0-89227-075-4.



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One beautiful spring day, Maria Fremont puts her baby son down on his blanket for a few minutes in the sun. While she is distracted by a phone call, a golden eagle swoops down, grabs the infant, and heads for its nest. Near the eagle's nesting place, Necco Tufferelli, a shell-shocked Vietnam veteran, has taken refuge. The noise of the rescue helicopters spurs Necco to action; the whimpering of an infant brings him a different message. While Necco fights with the rescue forces, time begins to run out for the baby.

Downing, Warwick. Kid Curry's Last Ride. Orchard Books, 1989. ISBN 0-531-05802-6.

Alex Penrose faces a long summer in 1935. He's twelve, and his parents have shipped him off to his grandmother in Sheridan, Wyoming, while they take an Atlantic cruise. There's nothing for Alex to do in Sheridan and no one to do it with. Then he meets an old man who claims to be Kid Curry, a member of the old Butch Cassidy gang. Kid would like one more fling, one more bank robbery, but he needs a partner—and Alex fits the bill.

Hallman, Ruth. Search without Fear. Dodd, Mead, 1987. ISBN 0-396-08924-0.

Dee's world has fallen apart. Gran, who took Dee in when her parents died, has just died herself, and Dee must go live with her commanding older brother David, a state trooper. In David's little mountain town, it's hard to make friends, so, to David's horror, Dee accepts a date with Will Snipes, the brother of a man David has sent to prison. Then David's worst fears about Will's need for revenge come true: Dee is kidnapped, Will plants a bont, and Dee's chances of escape look slim.

1.7 Henken, Heidi. Cobb's Cave. High Noon Books, 1989. ISBN 0-87879-655-X.

Dusty finds a cave on Cobb's Hill and convinces Anne to explore it with her. When they do, they find a tunnel that takes them through the hill to the beach. There they meet a fisherman, Captain Jim, who tells them the story of Fast Jack, a pirate who may have buried treasure in the tunnel. Dusty decides that she will find the treasure. Later, Cobbie, a mysterious, pipe-smoking woman, clears up the mystery of Fast Jack's treasure, but the mystery of Cobbie still remains.



1.8 Paulsen, Gary. Hatchet. Bradbury Press, 1987. ISBN 0-02-770130-1.

Thirteen-year-old Brian Robeson is on his way to spend the summer with his father in the Canadian wilderness. Brian's parents have recently divorced, and the court has determined that Brian will spend the school year with his mother and the summer with his father. As Brian is flying to his father's engineering camp, the pilot suffers a fatal heart attack, and the plane crashes. Brian is not badly hurt, but with only a hatchet his mother has given him, will he be able to survive?

1.9 Paulsen, Gary. The Island. Orchard Books, 1988. ISBN 0-531-05749-6.

Fifteen-year-old Wil Neuton was not excited about having to move from the life he had just established in Madison, Wisconsin, to a small house way out in the boonies. However, that was before he discovered the island—or it discovered him—he is not quite sure which way it happened. The hours that he spends there grow into days that are filled with keen observation, studying, and learning about the life and truth of the island and about himself.

1.10 Petersen, P. J. How Can You Hijack a Cave? Delacorte Press, 1988. ISBN 0-440-50063-X.

Curt Carver has met his match. Lori is almost as tall as he is and can almost beat him at one-on-one, but the worst part is that she's his boss! It takes a couple of weeks, but Curt is finally settling into his job as a guide at Cathedral Caverns. Then terrorists strike, kidnapping rich Pauline and holding her hostage in the caves. Can Curt and Lori rescue her through a secret entrance? Curt discovers the courage and ingenuity needed to match Lori in this suspenseful story.

1.11 Regan, Dian Curtis. Game of Survival. Avon, Flare Books, 1989. ISBN 0-380-75585-8.

Nicky Brooks has big plans for Mitchell High's weekender at Camp Chautauqua in the Colorado Rockies, but those plans abruptly change on a scavenger hunt the first morning out. Nicky and a new student, Martinella Lee Prigmore, get lost when a surprise snowstorm comes in. They are joined by Nicky's archenemy, Sidney "Scruggs" Scruggman, who has been badly injured. The three are then forced to use all of their knowledge to survive.



1.12 Ruckman, Ivy. No Way Out. Harper Keypoint Books, 1988. ISBN 0-690-04669-3.

Danger and fear stalk six young hikers in the Zion Narrows in Utah when a flash flood turns their perfect weekend into a night-mare. Amy and Rick fight for their lives and their future together as they learn more than they may have wanted to know about each other.

1.13 Service, Pamela F. The Reluctant God. Atheneum, 1988. ISBN 0-689-31404-3.

Fourteen-year-old Lorna Padgett, only daughter of an archaeologist working in Egypt, loves everything Egyptian. Ameni, son of the ancient pharaoh Senusert II, wants to travel and have adventures, rather than train as a priest of Osiris. Incredibly, Lorna's love of Egypt brings her together with Ameni when she revives him from the state of suspended animation he had been in since ancient times. Forming a friendship that bridges four thousand years, Ameni and Lorna travel to England, where they find themselves in an adventure that is more dangerous than either of them ever bargained for.

1.14 Tolan, Stephanie S. The Great Skinner Homestead. Four Winds Press, 1988. ISBN 0-02-789362-6.

When their motor home breaks down in the Adirondack Mountains. Jenny Stinner's father decides that their family of six will become pioneers. They'll homestead there, with no electricity, no cars, and no boys for fifteen-year-old Jenny to date. As the Skinner family braves nature, some of them long for the comforts of the city, while Jenny considers overcoming her fear of snakes for a handsome college student doing rattlesnake research. All of them, though, learn about surviving, and Jenny and her sister Sarah find themselves the only people who can save their father's life. Second book in a series about the Skinner family.

1.15 Townsend, John Rowe. The Fortunate Isles. J. B. Lippincott, 1989. ISBN 0-397-32365-4.

The king of the Fortunate Isles has declared war, and all the healthy men of Eleni's village must join the army and fight. Hardly anyone is left behind to take care of the women and children, who are in the midst of a famine. But Eleni might be the key to an ancient prophecy. She begins a journey to the Holy Mountain of Ayos, where she hopes to find salvation for her people.



1.16 Wallace, Bill. Red Dog. Holiday House, 1987. ISBN 0-8234-0650-4.

In the 1860s, Adam's stepfather moves his family into the Wyoming mountains. When he then leaves for Cheyenne, twelve-year-old Adam and his dog Ruff are left alone to protect Adam's mother and sister from a group of greedy prospectors. In bone-chilling action, Adam and Ruff give their family everything they have.

2.1 Caras, Roger A. Animals in Their Places: Tales from the Natural World. Sierra Club Books, 1987. ISBN 0-87156-707-5.

Meet the giant Kodiak bear as she moves her 700-pound body about Kodiak Island in search of food. Soar above cliffs with one of the few remaining California condors, and swim upstream with a salmon bent on returning to her birthplace. The author takes you into the wild and shines a spotlight on everything from pythons and elephants to panthers and wolves as they go about their daily lives.

 Diggs, Lucy. Moon in the Water. Atheneum, 1988. ISBN 0-689-31337-3.

JoBob knows he's a misfit, he's small for a fourteen year old, and, unlike the families of the other kids at the stable where he works, his family struggles to make ends meet. Blue, the pinto at the stables, is a misfit, too. Others think Blue is only good enough to use as a teaching horse, but JoBob has been secretly training Blue to jump. His work with Blue gives JoBob both the greatest joy and the greatest sorrow that he's ever known.

- 2.3 Herberman, Ethan. The City Kid's Field Guide. Simon and Schuster Books for Young Readers, 1989. ISBN 0-671-67749-7.

 Abundant wildlife is not limited to forests, rivers, marshes, and land far from civilization. For the keen observer, "wildlife" may be found in homes, backyards, parks, and the vacant lots of large cities. Illustrations and interesting facts about wildlife, dangerous and harmless, are presented in this "guide to the urban nature trail." Index included. A Nova book.
- 2.4 Hopkins, Lila. Eating Crow. Franklin Watts, 1988. ISBN 0-531-10499-0.

On his first day at a new school, Ezekiel Silverstein gives all of the other students the silent treatment. One of the other students, Croaker Douglas, resents this so much that he takes matters into



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his own hands and attacks Ezekiel. When their teacher makes Croaker go to Ezekiel's house to apologize, Croaker finds a couple of big surprises, including Piccolo, a talking crow.

2.5 Jurmain, Suzanne. Once upon a Horse: A History of Horses—and How They Shaped Our History. Lothrop, Lee and Shepard Books, 1989. ISBN 0-688-05550-8.

Whether as servant, traveler, messenger, game player, racer, or friend, the horse has been the most pampered domestic animal in history—and with good reason. The horse is "the only four-legged animal that has ever changed the way humans lived, fought, worked, and played." The horse is found in folklore, legend, religion, and every form of art the world over. Index included.

2.6 Mauser, Pat Rhoads. Love Is for the Dogs. Avon/Flare Books, 1989, ISBN 0-380-75723-0.

Janna loves animals and works as a volunteer in a veterinarian's office. She hates her new neighbor, Bramwell Hamilton, on sight because he leaves his dog Pepper outside even when it rains. In an effort to help Pepper, Janna becomes friendly with Bramwell, and she soon learns some very interesting things.

2.7 Patent, Dorothy Hinshaw. Where the Wild Horses Roam. Photographs by William Muñoz. Clarion Books, 1989. ISBN 0-89919-507-5.

Horses died out on the American continent nearly 8,000 years ago, and it wasn't until the fifteenth century that the Spanish explorers reintroduced them. Today, wild horses are found in ten western states. In 1971, the Wild Horse and Burro Act was passed to protect horses and burros, and between 1971 and 1980, the wild herds grew from an estimated 17,000 to 64,000. Includes an index and a list of organizations dedicated to protecting wild horses.

2.8 Sattler, Helen Roney. The Book of Eagles. Illustrated by Jean Day Zallinger. Lothrop, Lee and Shepard Books, 1989. ISBN 0-688-07022-1.

Eagles are difficult to study in the wild because they are very swift and because they fly so high. However, scientists do agree that there are at least sixty species around the world and that only two of those species are found in the United States. Despite their power as hunters, their size, and their strength, these "lords of the skies" are threatened with extinction.



2.9 Saville, Lynn. Horses in the Circus Ring. E. P. Dutton, 1989. ISBN 0-525-44417-3.

This book takes an important part of every circus—the horses—and gives them the center ring in a show of their own. Packed with colorful pictures, it explains how the horses are trained for such things as precision teamwork, carrying a human pyramid, and stunt riding.

2.10 Shachtman, Tom. Wavebender: A Story of Daniel au Fond. Illustrated by Jamichael Henterly. Henry Holt, 1989. ISBN 0-8050-0840-3.

Sea-lion beachmaster Daniel au Fond sets out on a quest to find Pacifica, a cove in an ancient sea-lion legend where sea creatures and humans once lived in harmony. To find this secret place, Daniel and his tribe roam the oceans seeking a wavebender and collecting unusual allies from different species of sea creatures. After several dangerous encounters with pollution and commercial overhunting, Daniel realizes that heroic action is necessary to preserve all sea life.

2.11 Silver, Donald M. The Animal World. Illustrated by Patricia J. Wynne. Random House, 1987. ISBN 0-394-86650-3.

From the tiny, one-celled protozoa to the 150-ton blue whale, the animal kingdom is filled with many unique creatures. Their ways of living, playing, gathering food, mating, defending themselves, and nurturing their young are as varied as the animals themselves. Over a thousand color illustrations of animals in their natural habitats give you a glimpse of how they have evolved and how they survive. Index included.

2.12 Springer, Nancy. Not on a White Horse. Atheneum, 1988. ISBN 0-689-31366-7.

Twelve-year-old Rhiannon DiAngelo has always loved horses, so when she sees the ad in the newspaper about the lost white Arabian, she hops on her bike and heads out to look for it. She spots the horse several times and develops a relationship with its owner, Chickie Miller, who begins to teach her about horses. This new outlet gives Rhiannon a focus for her life and helps her to deal with her father's alcoholism and abuse.

2.13 Wallace, Bill. Snot Stew. Illustrated by Lisa McCue. Holiday House, 1989. ISBN 0-8234-0745-4.



"Don't play with your food," Mama always said. "Unless it's a mouse. Then it's okay." Kikki remembers her mother well, but Kikki and her brother Toby are alone. Abandoned by their mother and the other kittens, Kikki and Toby learn to live in the world of "people things." Everything is wonderful until the children that Kikki and Toby live with invent a game called Snot Stew.

2.14 Wilson, A. N. Stray. Orchard Books, 1989. ISBN 0-531-05840-9.

Old Father Puffrail may be getting on in years, but he's still a proud old alley cat who is pleased to share his experiences with his grandson. Kitchener. Pufftail began life innocently enough but soon discovered that not all humans are good people nor can they all be trusted. He discovered that cats, too, are imperfect, and he tries to tell his grandson that life, though not always pleasant, is generally worthwhile.

3.1 Aaseng, Nathan. The Fortunate Fortunes. Lerner, 1989. ISBN 0-8225-0678-5.

Who would have thought a train ride sixty years ago would lead to the development of the popular biscuit mix, Bisquick? Or that in order to insult a resort guest who had made him angry, a chef would slice potatoes paper thin and fry them, thus producing the first potato chips? Similar stories about other products and businesses and the people who introduced them illustrate that not only does the creation of new products take hard work and ingenuity, but the success of these products also depends upon luck. Is good help hard to find? Are you tired of staining vegetables to make baby food? Are you losing your hair and becoming bald before the age of thirty? These stories and others illustrate how familiar products were developed in response to a need. Index included.

3.3 Aaseng, Nathan. The Unsung Heroes. Lerner, 1989. ISBN 0-8225-0676-9.

If the names Earl Dickson, John Pemberton, James Spangler, Jerry Siegel, Joe Shuster, and Maria Innocentia were mentioned, would you know who they are? These people invented or helped create well-known products or businesses, but they often received little recognition - and sometimes little profit—for their ideas. However, if Band-Aid, Coca-Cola, Hoover vacuum cleaners, Superman, and Hummel figurines were substituted for the names above, you would know the products these people are associated with. 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3.4 Barnes, Jeremy. Samuel Goldwyn: Movie Mogul. Silver Burdett Press, 1989. ISBN 0-382-09586-3.

Samuel Goldwyn was a Jewish immigrant from a Warsaw ghetto who had little money and very little schooling and who didn't even speak English. Since his only talent seemed to be selling gloves, he appeared to be an unlikely person to produce some of Hollywood's finest films. However, entirely by his own effort, he earned tage, and wealth and developed a reputation for paying people very well and insisting on the highest quality. Part of The American Dream series. 3.5 Black, Sheila. Sitting Bull and the Battle of the Little Bighorn. Illustrated by Ed Lee. Silver Burdett Press, 1989. ISBN 0-382-09572-3.

In 1876, thousands of Sioux warriors led by Chief Sitting Bull massacred a troop of United States soldiers led by General George Custer. Custer attacked the Indians, but Sitting Bull and his people were blamed. Who was Sitting Bull, and why did he gather his people for war? Part of Alvin Josephy's Biography Series of American Indians.

3.6 Bowman, John. Andrew Carnegie: Steel Tycoon. Silver Burdett Press, 1989. ISBN 0-382-09582-0.

The son of Scottish weavers, Andrew Carnegie came to America at an opportune time and settled with his fazaily in Pittsburgh. By chance the young Andrew became involved with the telegraph and, later, railroads. This led naturally to an interest in iron and steel, which made him the richest man in the world in his time. Carnegie believed that a rich person who died with a fortune intact died disgraced, so he gave most of his money away to charity, mainly to libraries, concert halls, and educational institutions. Carnegie was extremely interested in projects that would result in the improvement of society. Part of The American Dream series.

3.7 Buranelli, Vincent. Thomas Alva Edison. Silver Burdett Press, 1989. ISBN 0-382-09522-7.

Because he was a poor student, Thomas Edison was taken out of school at the age of seven and taught at home by his mother, who had been a teacher before marriage. Edison's father taught him the value of hard work. Later, when Edison was called a genius, he



often replied with his most famous saying: "Genius is 1 percent inspiration and 99 percent perspiration." During Edison's lifetime, and because of his inventions, the world changed from gaslights and still photographs to a "world transformed by electric lights, motion pictures, and the phonograph." 3.8 Castiglia, Julie. Margaret Mead. Silver Burdett Press, 1989. ISBN 0-382-09525-1.

Born in 1901, anthropologist Margaret Mead was considered a woman ahead of her time. Even getting a college degree in the early part of this century was unusual for a girl. At an early age, she was encouraged by her grandmother to observe human relationships and actions and to make a record of those observations. Energetic, dedicated, and enthusiastic, Margaret Mead traveled all over the world and wrote many books and magazine articles about her observations. Part of the Pioneers in Change series.

3.9 Cwiklik, Robert. King Philip and the War with the Colonists. Illustrated by Robert L. Smith. Silver Burdett Press, 1989. ISBN 0-382-09573-1.

When the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock, they entered the land of the friendly Chief Massasoit, whose name was later adopted by the state of Massashusetts. This book tells the story of Chief Massasoit's son, who saw that his father's friendliness toward the Pilgrims led only to loss of lands and death for his people. The colonists called him King Philip, and he fought his own war of independence against the newcomers. Part of Alvin Josephy's Biography Series of American Indians.

The Furopeans wanted to force the tribe to either give up their Indian ways and accept white culture or leave their land and move away. But Sequoyah gave his people a way to hold onto their culture even while living among more and more whites. Part of Alvin Josephy's Biography Series of American Indians.

Did you know that Muhammad Ali boxed on television at the age of thirteen? That Louis Braille invented the Braille system of reading at the age of fifteen? That at thirteen Anne Frank wrote her famous diary depicting life during World War II? Texas is the home of the Alamo. It is also the home of Henry Cisneros, San Antonio's mayor. The ensuing battle between the slave owners and those who fought for the rights of fugitive slaves caused riots and made necessary the calling in of federal troops. And at the center of the struggle was Anthony Burns himself, the last fugitive slave to be seized on Massachusetts soil.

3.18 Ireland, Karin. Albert Einstein. Silver Burdett Press, 1989. ISBN 0-382-09523-5.

Albert Einstein was gentle and sensitive and believed in peace between nations, and yet he spoke in favor of developing the atom bomb. In this fictionalized biography, Neimark tells of Ché's treks through Latin America to his rise to international fame as Tidel Castro's close ally in Cuba to his defeat in Bolivia. Working until his death to free the oppressed, Ché Guevara became a hero to revolutionaries around the world. The author points out that this fictionalized account of Ché is faithful to the historieal man.

When American paratroopers jump out of airplanes today, they shout, "Germimo!" Leader of the Apache Indians in the late 1800s, Geronimo's very name now stands for freedom fighting. When Robin discovers that she, too, has leukemia, she relies on Rick's antics and his thoughtfulness to help her through the bad times. 4.6 Schwandt, Stephen. Holding Steady. Henry Holt, 1988. ISBN 0-8050-0575-7.

After seventeen-year-old Brendon Turner's father is killed in a single-car accident on an icy road, he doesn't know how to cope with the loss. He feels angry, guilty, and sad all at once. Then his mother rents a cottage in Wisconsin for their summer vacation, and Brendon meets Courtney, who is dealing with losses of her own. Together they learn about life, acceptance, and love—and a lot about themselves.

4.7 Zindel, Paul. A Begonia for Miss Applebaum. Harper and Row, 1989. ISBN 0-06-026877-8.

Will Dinah have to choose between her parents and Geoff?

5.2 Filichia, Peter. What's in a Name? Avon/Flare Books, 1988. ISBN 0-380-75536-X.

What do you picture when you hear the name Rose Sczylanska? Right. That's what Rose thinks, too. As they grow older, the two boys and their dreams are torn and twisted by the social system of South Africa.

5.5 Lasky, Kathryn. The Bone Wars. Morrow Junior Books, 1988. ISBN 0-688-07433-2.

Thaddeus Longworth is an orphaned fourteen year old in 1874 when he signs on as scout for a Harvard paleontologist, one of many who are looking for dinosaur bones. Thad does not approve of the fierce competition among the paleontologists, nor is he happy with the situation developing between the Plains Indians and the U.S. government. Thad and his English friend, Julian, decide to join forces in order to achieve their goals concerning the discovery and display of the enormous creatures who once roamed the earth.

- 5.6 Levitin, Sonia. Silver Days. Atheneum, 1989. ISBN 0-689-31563-5.

 The Platt family is finally together again in America. After they escaped from Nazi Germany, Papa came to America to establish a foothold while his family stayed in Switzerland. Now they face the rigors of a new environment, a new language, and a different perspective. Lisa's ideas of what life in America will be like turn out to be quite different from the reality she finds here, but she is determined that the family's new life will be better than the one they left behind. Sequel to Journey to America.
- 5.7 Lowry, Lois. Number the Stars. Houghton Mifflin, 1989. ISBN 0-395-51060-0.

Ten years old in Copenhagen in 1943, Annemarie Johannsen hasn't had time to grow up yet, and now she's being asked to be brave when her family temporarily adopts Jewish Ellen to protect her from the Nazis. Annemarie's story tells us how the resistance to German occupation depended a great deal on individual, isolated acts of bravery during a time of great fear.



5.8 Pitts, Paul. Racing the Sun. Avon/ Camelot Books, 1988. ISBN 0-380-75496-7.

Brandon knows very little about the Navajo culture of his family. His father left the reservation, changed his name from Redhouse to Roger and moved to a white suburb. Then when Brandon's grandfather becomes ill, he leaves his home on the reservation to come and live with his son's family. It is through this old man that Brandon learns the beauty and richness of his heritage.

5.9 Rochman, Hazel, compiler. Somehow Tenderness Survives: Stories of Southern Africa. Harper and Row, 1988. ISBN 0-06-025022-4.

Living in a society where racism is the rule might mean a number of things: hiding in a toilet every morning for fear of being discovered in the wrong neighborhood; watching your father being dragged from your home in the middle of the night; living in fear, depression, and hate. These ten stories and autobiographical accounts (five by black southern Africans and five by white southern Africans) explore the meaning of apartheid.

5.10 Roth-Hano, Renée. Touch Wood: A Girlhood in Occupied France. Four Winds Press, 1988. ISBN 0-02-777340-X.

In this novel based on her own childhood, the author describes the terror of World War II for French Jews. The oldest of three girls, Renée and her family flee her home in Alsace to safety in Paris. In a desperate attempt to protect the girls, Renée's parents send them to a Catholic women's residence in Normandy. Separated from her parents for the first time, Renée realizes that this refuge, too, is in danger from the Nazis, and that she must help her sisters survive bombings that have moved dangerously close to them.

Raisin Stackhouse is intrigued by the mystery of what famous person is buried in the New Africa No. 1 Missionary Baptist Church Cemetery, which she is helping Miz Effie Pfluggins clean up. Through Miz Effie, Raisin learns about black history in Calvar, County and learns some lessons about herself as well.



5.12 Wallin, Luke. Ceremony of the Panther. Bradbury Press, 1987. ISBN 0-02-792310-X.

Deep in the Florida Everglades, sixteen-year-old John Raincrow, a Miccosukee Indian, is caught between two paths. His father wants him to follow the path of tradition and become a Miccosukee shaman. His friends want him to join them in their pursuit of pleasure. John Raincrow struggles to find his own path.

5.13 Wisler, G. Clifton. The Wolf's Tooth. Lodestar Books, 1987. ISBN 0-525-67197-8.

Thirteen-year-old Elias Walsh isn't too happy about having to leave his home in Texas in order to move to the Indian reservation where his father will be the new school teacher. Life there is hard and playmates nonexistent until he meets Thomas Three Feathers, and the two boys decide to hunt the wolves that are killing the Walshes' chickens. Through this adventure, Elias earns Thomas's respect, and the boys develop a solid friendship and an understanding of each other's culture.

6.1 Adler, C. S. If You Need Me. Macmillan, 1988. ISBN 0-02-700420-1.

As thirteen-year-old Lyn becomes closer to her stepmother, she realizes that her father seems to be drawing away from both of them. Lyn believes that Brian, the new boy next door, would be fun to know, but she becomes increasingly upset by the interest her father seems to be showing in Brian's mother. The two young people find themselves unable to stop a relationship that threatens to destroy both families.

6.2 Adler, C. S. One Sister Too Many. Macmillan, 1989. ISBN 0-02-700271-3.

Twelve-year-old Case is an individual. Outspoken and impulsive, she creates conflict at school and at home. She believes her teacher doesn't like her, the teacher believes Case is insolent and rebellious. Case believes her mother and stepfather don't love her; her parents believe that she could and should try harder. Case believes the babysitter recently hired for her younger sister is weird and untrustworthy, her parents believe —until it is almost too late that Case simply overdramatizes. Sequel to Split Sisters.

6.3 Auch, Mary Jane. Cry Uncle! Holiday House, 1987. ISBN 0-8234-0660-1.

City-born Davey Anderson's new life on the farm proves to be a tough adjustment. his mother has discovered 101 ways to fix zucchini (so they don't waste the garden), and he is often the victin. of bullying by the Spider twins. Then, as if things weren't bad enough, his seventy-four-year-old great-uncle comes to live with them, and Davey finds Uncle Will's slips into childhood behavior embarrassing and difficult to deal with.

6.4 Auch, Mary Jane. Glass Slippers Give You Blisters. Holiday House, 1989. ISBN 0-8234-0752-7.



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Kelly is nervous about starting middle school, but her life begins to look up when she becomes involved with the school theater production of "Cindereila." Then her two best friends get parts and Kelly doesn't. She even gets kicked off the crew doing sets. Next, her grandmother has a stroke, and Kelly is pulled into the midd' of a thirty-year conflict between her mother and her grandmother.

6.5 Auch, Mary Jane. Pick of the Litter, Holiday House, 1988. ISBN 0-8234-0692-X.

For eleven-year-old "Cat" Corwin, life is pretty easy as an only child. The fact that she was adopted has never bothered her because her parents have always said they were able to pick her. Then a drug helps Cat's mother get pregnant, possibly with more than one baby, and suddenly Cat's life no longer seems important to her parents as they prepare for children of their own.

6.6 Betancourt, Jeanne. Home Sweet Home. Bantam Books, 1988. 1SBN 0-553-05469-4.

High school junior Tracy Jensen is thrown into culture shock when her parents move from New York City to her grandmother's tarm. Most of the people she meets in her new rural school are kind, but ways are different there—perhaps less different, though, than they seem to Anya, a Russian exchange student also living in the tiny community. Together, Tracy and Anya endure Tracy's grandmother's stroke and try to raise enough money to help a family keep their farm. Fast friends, Tracy and Anya face cultural differences and life's drama together.

6.7 Boutis, Victoria. Looking Out. Four Winds Press, 1988. ISBN 0-02-711830-4.

In 1953 America has a kind of witch-hunt—a hunt for Communists. Ellen, whose family has just moved to a new town, must face the idea that her parents may be Communists. Ellen then must choose: her friends or her parents. Who is right? Or can there be another way?

6.8 Collier, James Lincoln. Outside Looking In. Macmillan, 1987. ISBN 0-02-723100-3.

Fourteen-year-old Fergy is tired of his family's lattle. He's tired of camping out and being dirty, but most of an he's afraid of growing up illiterate and of being branded a thief. His dad says it's



all right to "reclaim" necessities from society, but Fergy no longer believes that. Fergy decides to run away, to try to find his grandparents, but he realizes that he cannot leave his little sister behind. He wants a normal life for both of them, but he hasn't considered that his little sister may not feel the same way he does.

6.9 Corcoran, Barbara. You Put Up with Me, I'll Put Up with You. Avon/Camelot Books, 1989. ISBN 0-380-70558-3.

When she is twelve, Kelly's life changes dramatically - and not for the better. She liked being an only child and living with her widowed mother. But now they are moving to her grandmother's old house so her mother can open a restaurant. If that's not bad enough, her mother's partners and their children will all be living in the same house, and Kelly will have to share a room with a boycrazy cheerleader. Only her friendship with the strange girl next door and the prospect of a relationship with one of the older boys in the house might make life more tolerable, maybe even interesting.

6.10 Danziger, Paula. Remember Me to Harold Square. Laurel-Leaf Books, 1987. ISBN 0-440-20153-5.

Fourteen-year-old Kendra is worried about the boy who is coming to New York to live with her family for the summer. She is not excited about having to spend her summer with her little brother and this unknown boy. But when the three learn about the citywide scavenger hunt that their parents have planned, the summer begins to look a little better. Can the three get along well enough to find everything and collect the special grand prize?

6.11 Dines, Carol. Best Friends Tell the Best Lies. Delacorte Press, 1989. ISBN 0-385-29704-1.

Best friends Leah and Tamara (one timid and one outrageous) are fourteen and live with their mothers. Their parents' divorces have been difficult for both of them. When Leah's mother becomes serious about her boyfriend José, Leah gets nasty, and with Tamara's help, tries to break them up. Leah viciously attacks José's heritage. But she does an about-face when she meets José's nephew, Miguel. He is great looking and talented, and he likes her, too. The electricity of first love, its frustration and pain, the confusion and insecurity of facing reality, and the discovery that a good friendship is not blind all help Leah to know and accept herself.

But over Nina's objections, she and her mother move again, to Utah and then to California. Once more having to give up a friend. Mina rebels, but they are on their way to New York. In New York, Nina, now sixteen, learns her mother's secret, and it changes her life forever.

6.13 Fine, Anne Alias Madame Doubtfire. Joy Street Books, 1988. ISBN 0-316-28313-4.

Together Ray and Bruce explore, sharing adventures, secrets, and a very special dog.

Sixth-grader Kelly McCoy has a big fight with her two best friends. In order to fill the void, Kelly develops a friendship with old Mrs. Haggerty, who lives in a haunted house. During the time Kelly spends with Mrs. Haggerty, she learns a great deal about friendship and about ghosts.

Fifteen-year-old Beth Bridgewater is having the perfect summer in New Hampshire at Pretty Penny Farm. Eventually, Dan is forced to make some decisions that will affect his entire future.

10.2 Bell, William. Crabbe's Journey. Little, Brown, 1986. ISBN 0-316-08837-4.

Franklin Crabbe, a senior from a wealthy family, has always done well in school and has always played by the rules. However, just before finals, he is hopelessly frustrated with everything. He plans an escape into the wilderness, where mishap brings him into contact with the most influential person in his life, a woman who teaches him about wilderness survival and about himself. But he can't stay with her forever, and leaving is one of the hardest things he's ever done.

10.3 Block, Francesca Lia. Weetzie Bat. Harper and Row, 1989. ISBN 0-06-020534-2.

Weetzie Bat hates high school because students seem to be so unaware. She and Dirk, her gay best friend, want to live "happily ever after," but long-range happiness eludes them. After the summer camp director, Miss Mack, orders Betsy onto the old white scale and announces that she needs to lose weight, Betsy becomes painfully aware that what her mother has called baby fat is real fat. Determined to change her body, Betsy makes herself a goal to be slim enough to enter the end-of-camp Bathing Beauty Contest. No one, not even her friends, dreams how far Betsy will go to be a bathing beauty, or just how powerful an ending Betsy's summer will have.

However, unless she "shows a little maturity," she will not be allowed a summer visit to Italy a visit from which she plans not to return.

The "goats," a boy and a girl, are stripped of their clothes and left on an island for the night by the other kids—a tradition and annual prack at the summer camp where they are staying, Reluctant to be spied upon during the night and then found on the



island in the morning, the two "goats" manage to escape. Rather than return to camp, though, they decide to run away and scare the camp counselors into thinking that something has happened to them.

When he returns to the United States, he finds that nothing will ever be the same; he has "lost his own time."

Thirteen-year-old Francie is shocked when she's given a chance to perform in a play at a London boys' school. She lacks experience with drama and with boys, but as the play proceeds, her talents shine through both success and failure. More importantly, though, she learns to identify the difference between true friends and people who only play the role.

Mrs. Fulton plans to change the biology curriculum and devote the first semester to sex education. The major assignment for the term is a "caring project." In the summer of 1933, fifteen-year-old Elizabeth runs away from home, looking for work so she can help her family. Her father needs a job, her mother needs a doctor, her little brother needs a meal, and they all need money so the bank won't take their house. As Elizabeth rides the rails from town to town in search of a job, she discovers the Great Depression, some new friends, her fears, and her real self.
