ABSTRACT

Focusing on data for 1997-1998, this institutional profile provides information on students, faculty, staff, finance, facilities, and services at Alabama's Wallace Community College, Selma (WCCS). An introduction provides a history of WCCS, reviews the college's mission and goals, presents maps of WCCS' service area and campus, and provides organizational charts of the college and the adult education division. Data then provided include students related to credit hour production, 1988 to 1998; credit enrollment history, 1991-1997; credit enrollment by race, sex, and county, fall 1997; grade distribution for credit courses, 1990-97; feeder high school enrollment, 1997-98; enrollment history by program, 1991-97; awards conferred by program, 1997-98; student financial aid profiles, 1991-98; non-credit enrollment, 1997-98; companies served through business and industry instruction, 1997-98; and job placement statistics, 1987-98. The next section provides data on student support services, including the WCCS Transfer Initiative and Educational Talent Search Program, an effort involving 11 target high schools to promote college attendance through student services. Tables are provided on fall 1997 school personnel, including comparative data on salaries for the WCCS and the Alabama College System (ACS) and data on race, gender, length of service, age, and highest degree earned. Following information on fiscal year 1997 library resources, financial data are provided for 1992-97, including revenue/expenditure percentages for restricted and unrestricted funds, total current funds, and WCCS foundation revenues. Data on physical plant assets and a building inventory are presented, followed by information on the ACS, including student headcount by race and sex and personnel classified by salary schedule for fall 1997. Finally, an evaluation form is provided for the 1997-98 profile. (SL)

HISTORY OF

WALLACE COMMUNITY COLLEGE SELMA

On May 3, 1963, the Alabama State Legislature approved Acts No. 92, 93, and 94 which provided for the financing, development, and control of Alabama's 2 year colleges. These Acts paved the way for the eventual creation of Wallace Community College Selma and the Alabama College System's other junior and technical colleges.

Many individuals and organizations in the Selma and Dallas county area were active in obtaining Selma as a site for a technical institute. Mr. E. S. Watts donated 20 acres of land in North Selma, just inside the city limits, to be used for the location of the technical institute. The name of the institute was named William Rufus State Vocational Technical School in honor of the famous Alabamian who served 29 years as a United States Senator and served as Vice President in 1852 under President Franklin Pierce. William Rufus King was responsible for giving Selma its name.

When the college opened for its first classes in 1966, the campus consisted of an administration building, cafeteria, seven shops and laboratory buildings, and a warehouse. All of the classrooms were provided with central-air conditioning and equipped with modern facilities. The initial enrollment was 32 students.

On February 16, 1970, under the advisement of Governor Albert P. Brewer, the Alabama Trade School and Junior College Authority approved a resolution establishing a junior college in Selma on the same or adjacent site of the William Rufus King Technical Institute. The State Board of Education gave its approval the same day. Prior to the ground breaking ceremonies the name of the institution was changed to George C. Wallace State Junior College and Technical Institute in hor of the incoming governor. Mr. Charles L. Byrd, who had been the Director of the Technical Institute, was appointed president. The State Board of Education changed the institution's name to George Corley Wallace State Community College on October 1, 1973. Mr. Stan Frasier served as interim president from January until May 1989, at which time Dr. Julius R. Brown became president of the college.



PHILOSOPHY, MISSION, AND GOALS OF WALLACE COMMUNITY COLLEGE SELMA

The mission of Wallace Community College Selma is to provide high-quality educational opportunities and services that are responsive to individual, community and State needs. To accomplish this mission, Wallace Community College Selma shall provide the following:

- General Education and Collegiate Programs at the freshman and sophomore levels that prepare students for transfer to other colleges and universities.
- Technical, Vocational, and Career Education that prepares students for immediate employment, retrains existing employees, and promotes local and state economic stability and competitiveness.
- Business and Industry Development Training that meets employer needs.
- Developmental Education that assists individuals in improving learning skills and overcoming educational deficiencies.
- Student Services and Activities that assist individuals in formulating and achieving their educational goals.
- Continuing Education and personal enrichment opportunities that support life-long learning and the civic, social, and cultural quality of life.

Goal 2: To assess special educational needs of diverse student populations and provide support and educational to meet those special needs.

Goal 1: To foster public awareness of the College and its mission and to promote clear identity.

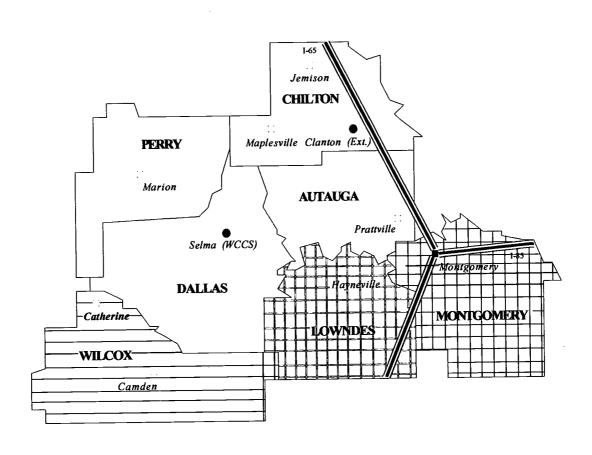

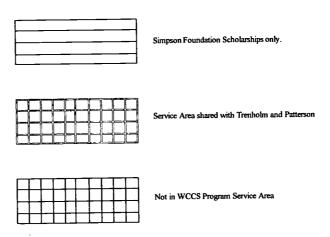

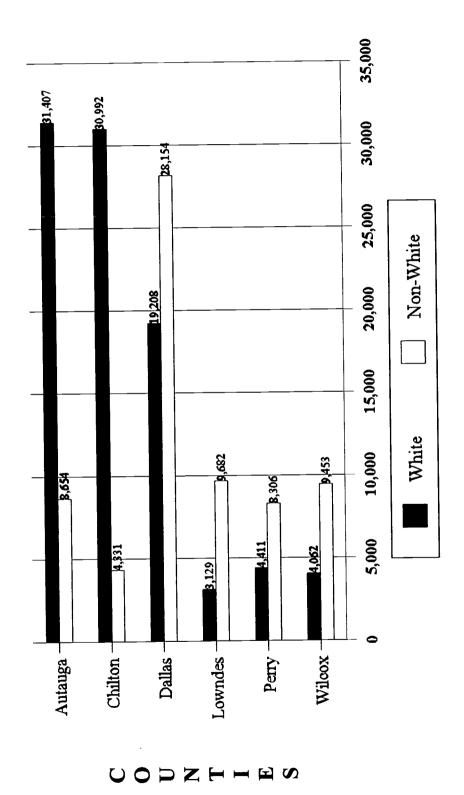

Wallace Community College Selma Program Service Area Race Percentages



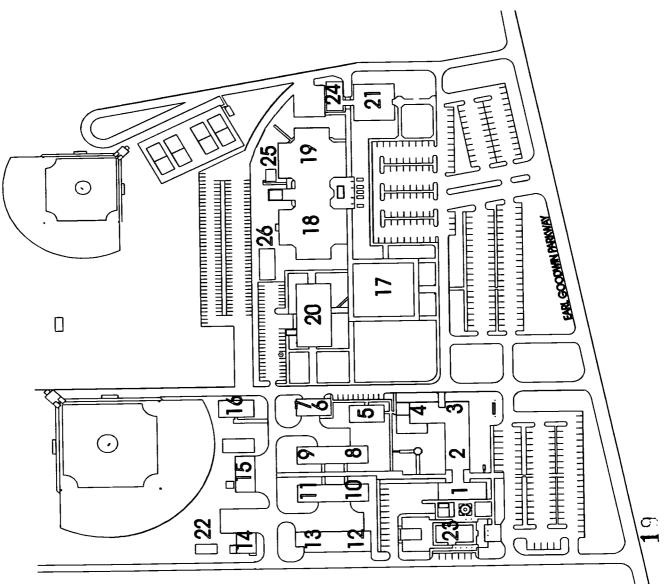

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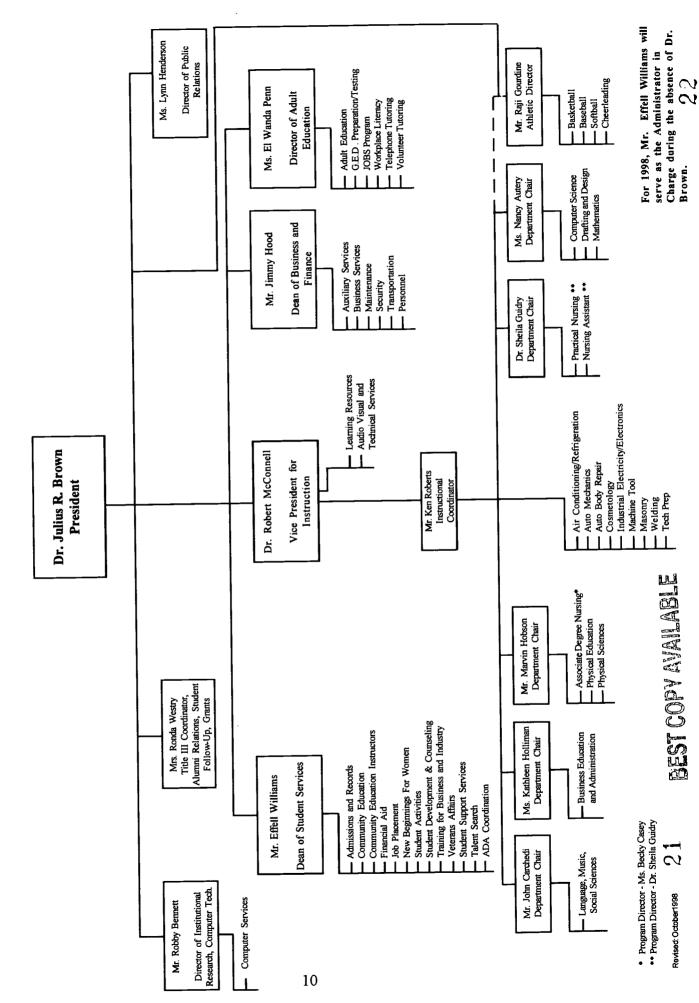
CAMPUS MAP

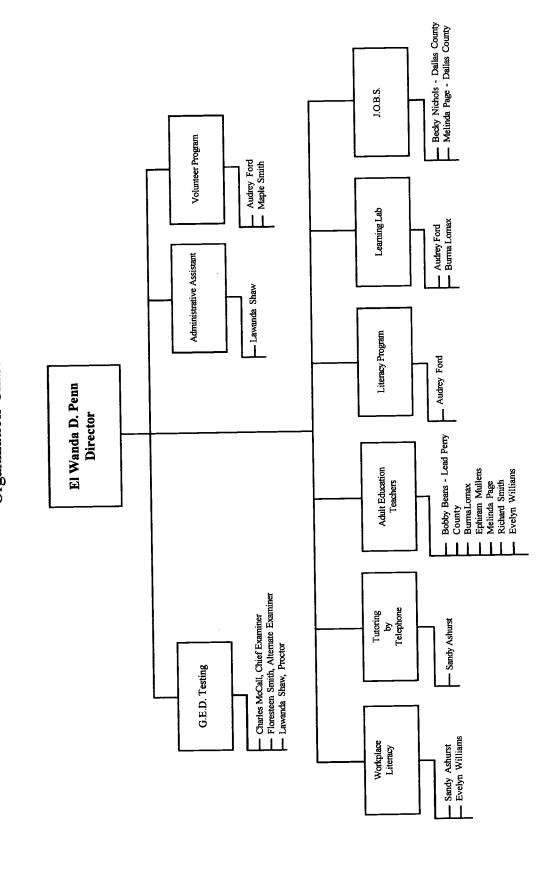
Wallace Community College Selma Organization Chart

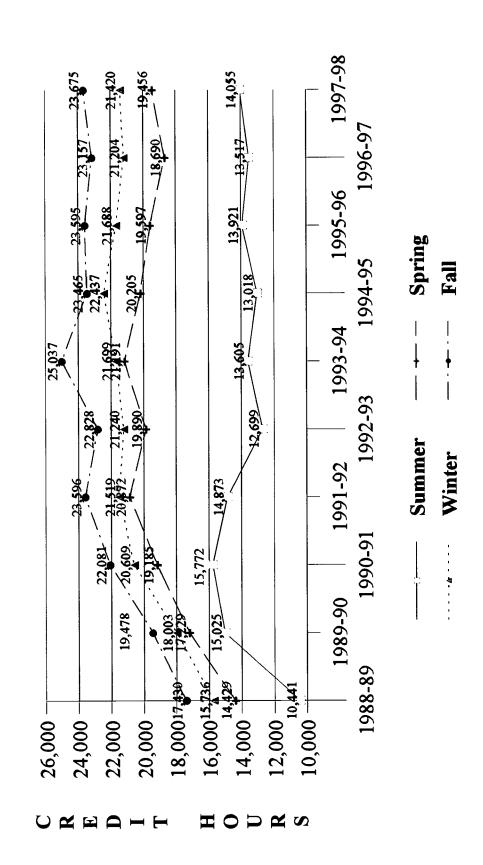

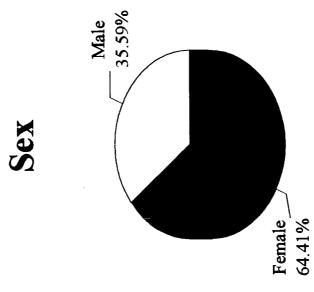
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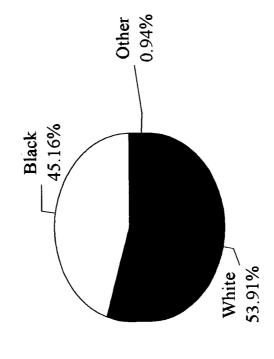

Credit Enrollment by Race and Sex Fall Quarter 1997





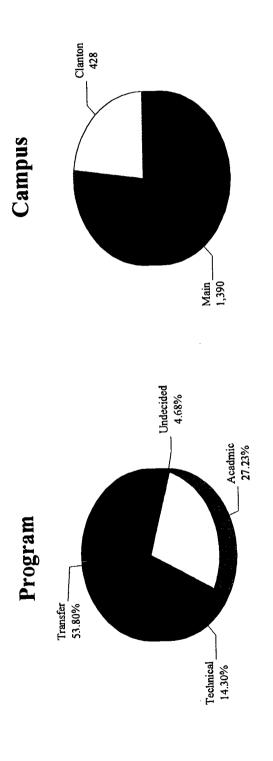


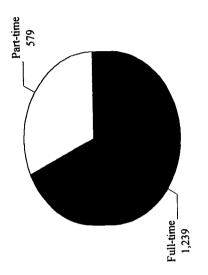

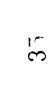


Wallace Community College Selma Credit Hour Production by Course Level Fall Quarter 1997



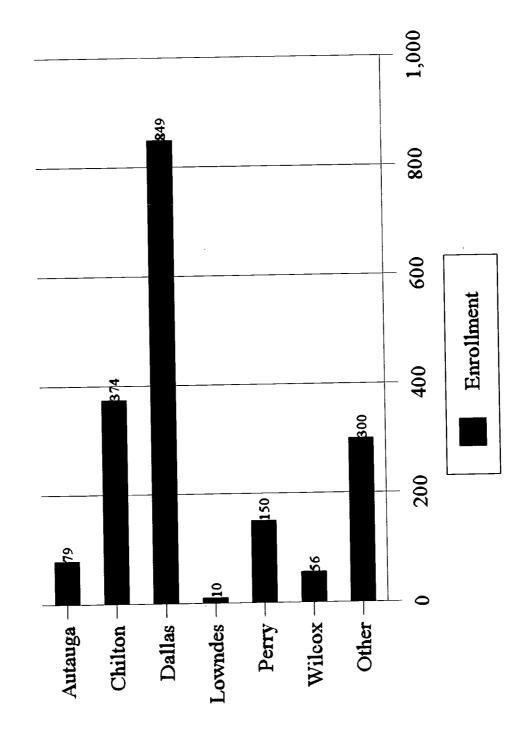
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Credit Enrollment by County of Residence Fall Quarter 1997

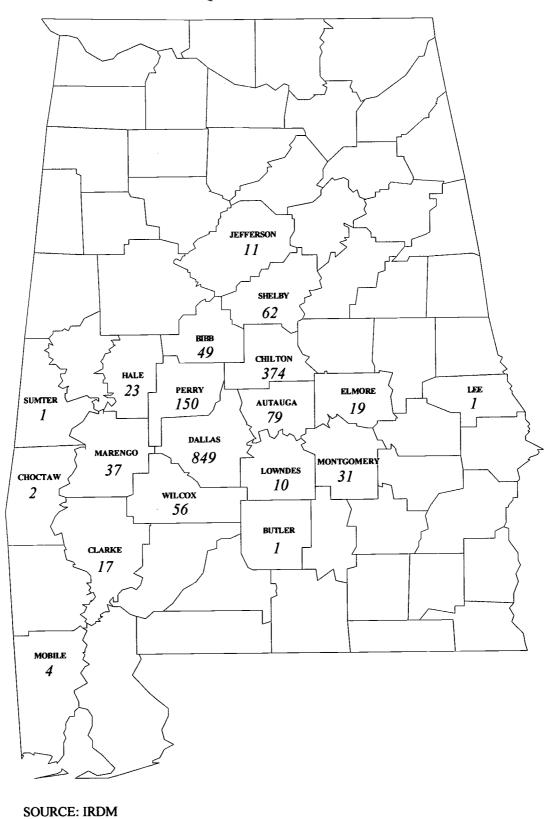




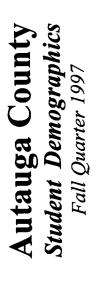

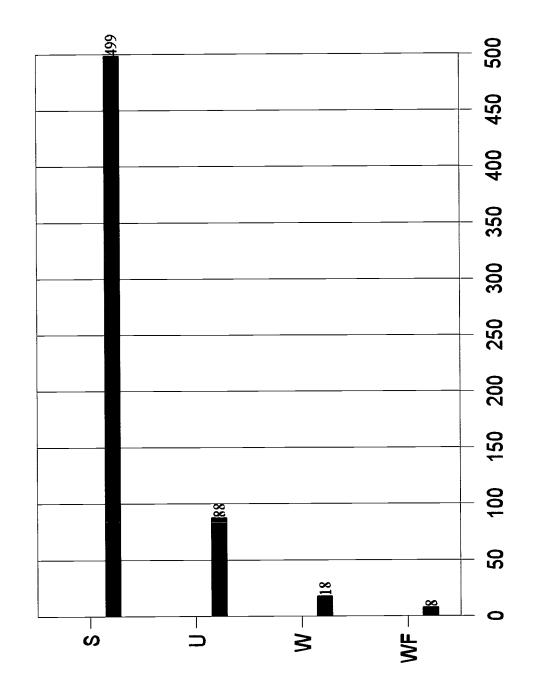

The Transfer Initiative is a component of Student Support Services dedicated to increasing the number of students transferring to four-year colleges and universities. The objectives of the Transfer Initiative are to:

- 1. To provide activities that will foster an institutional climate supportive of its advantaged students.
- 2. To provide the necessary services so that 80% of the Transfer students finish each academic year in good standing
- 3. To ensure that all Transfer students have their full financial aid met prior to transferring to four-year colleges and universities.
- 4. Ensure that at least 75% of the Transfer-ready students transfer to four-year colleges and universities.
- 5. To provide the necessary assistance to ensure that at least 50% of the participants complete degree requirements.

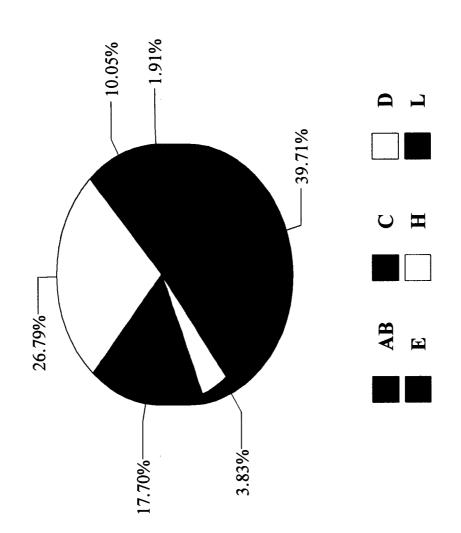
