Intended as a reference for vocational education personnel who serve special needs populations, this catalog identifies resource organizations that can provide information or technical assistance and recently developed materials for special needs groups and program areas. Section I includes organizations, arranged alphabetically and preceded by a title listing. They represent such diverse types as advocacy groups, clearinghouses, libraries, professional associations, research and development centers, and rehabilitation research and training centers. The information provided for each organization is as follows: organization name, director, contact person, address and telephone number, type of organization, subject terms (major descriptors) that indicate the focus of the organization, subject terms (minor descriptors) that generally denote the types of services offered, and a brief annotation. A subject index provides access to organizations. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This is the second edition of a catalog intended as a reference for vocational education personnel who serve special needs populations. It contains two types of resources: organizations and materials.

The organizations include advocacy groups, clearinghouses, libraries, professional associations, research and development centers, and rehabilitation research and training centers.

The materials were selected from two online databases: Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) and Vocational Education Curriculum Materials (VECM). They exemplify the kinds of materials developed for use in working with special needs students.

Readers are encouraged to contact organizations of interest for detailed information on their products and services and to use the ERIC and VECM databases for locating needed materials.



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INTRODUCTION

Background

This catalog is a product of the Vocational Education Special Needs Exchange, an activity that began in January 1986 to support vocational education special needs program improvement. Major objectives of the Exchange are the following:

- o Develop and maintain a resource network of organizations that serve handicapped, disadvantaged, and limited English-proficient populations.
- o Disseminate information of interest to the vocational education community about the programs, products, and services offered by these organizations.
- o Encourage individuals and organizations to share their expertise and resources related to special needs.
- o Encourage announcement and use of special needs print and nonprint materials in the online databases ERIC and VECM.
- o Provide professional and leadership development opporcunities for people who serve special needs populations.

As part of its dissemination effort, the Exchange offers an electronic newsletter available on ADVOCNET, an electronic communication network maintained by the National Center on Dialcom. Updated monthly, the newsletter announces upcoming professional meetings, conferences, and workshops; new products; current projects; exemplary programs; and other information of interest to vocational educators.

The catalog of organizations and materials is an update of the 1936 edition. It is desi ed to identify resource organizations that can provide inform tion or technical assistance and recently developed materials for special needs groups and program areas.

How to Use the Catalog

The catalog contains two types of resources: organizations that provide products or services for special needs populations



and materials appropriate for special needs students. The organizations included all agreed to be part of a resource network by completing a profile and submitting information about their products and services.

Section I includes organizations, arranged alphabetically and preceded by a title listing. They represent such diverse types as advocacy groups, clearinghouses, libraries, professional associations, research and development centers, and rehabilitation research and training centers. The information provided for each organization is as follows: organization name, director, contact person (if different from the director), address and telephone number, type of organization, subject terms (major descriptors) that indicate the focus of the organization, subject terms (minor descriptors) that generally denote the types of services offered, and a brief annotation. The subject terms were selected from the Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors, 11th Edition.

A subject index provides access to the organizations. The subject index is composed of the major descriptors. Characteristics of special populations are indexed by the narrowest term that describes the condition. For example, organizations that serve deaf individuals have the ERIC descriptor "Deafness" and not "Disabilities". The numbers in the index refer to accession numbers of the organizations and not to page numbers.

Section II provides examples of recently developed materials announced in the online databases ERIC and Vocational Education Curriculum Materials (VECM). These materials were selected to illustrate the kinds of resources available. An information sheet describes each database and gives instruction for accessing the databases to obtain curriculum materials for special needs students. A subject index to the ERIC and VECM materials is included.

Database Description

Established in 1966, the Educational Resources Information Center (ERIC) contains both documents and journal articles that cover all areas of education. ERIC is updated monthly. The database abstracts are also available in <u>Current Index to Journals in Education</u> (CIJE) and <u>Resources in Education</u> (RIE). The <u>Thesaurus of ERIC Descriptors</u>, 11th Edition, is used for subject indexing. A complete ERIC citation as it appears in the database is in appendix A.

Availability of Materials

Microfiche copies of documents are available at over 750 locations throughout the United States. Most are open to the general public. Most of the ocuments can be purchased in paper copy or microfiche from the ERIC Document Reproduction Service. Instructions for ordering documents are in appendix B.

Access

ERIC is sponsored by the Office of Educational Research and Improvement, U.S. Department of Education. It is a public file available as an online database through three commercial vendors: BRS Information Technologies, Lockheed Information Systems (DIALOG), and System Development Corporation (ORBIT). ERIC also is available in compact disk-read-only memory (CD-ROM) from several sources. Database Description

Vocational Education Curriculum Materis's (VECM) was developed in 1982 as a cooperative effort of the National Center for Research in Vocational Education and the six curriculum coordination centers (CCCs) that comprise the National Network for Curriculum Coordination in Vocational and Technical Education (NNCCVTE). The National Center and the CCCs continue to work together in building and maintaining VECM.

The database contains over 6,500 records of both print and nonprint materials, including microcomputer courseware. VECM is updated quarterly. Currently it has no print equivalent. A Classification of Instructional Programs, published by the National Center for Education Statistics, is used for subject classification. A complete VECM citation as it appears in the database is in appendix C.

Availability of Materials

VECM materials have several kinds of availability: loan, rental, free, and purchase. The avail lity source is listed for the individual materials. Many of the iterials on loan are available from the resource collection, of the CCCs for a period of 2 veeks or more.

<u>Access</u>

VECM is a public file maintained by the National Center and available to subscribers of BRS Information Technologies, Inc. It is sponsored by the Office of Vocational and Adult Education, U.S. Department of Education. For more information contact Dr. Shirley A. Chase at the National Center (800) 848-4815.

Special Needs Materials

VECM contains materials developed specifically for handicapped, disadvantaged, limited English, and bilingual students. VECM also includes many materials considered appropriate for both regular and special needs students. Examples of recently developed (1983 or later) special needs instructional materials excerpted from VECM are included in this section. Both print and nonprint materials are included. Many of the items listed are one of a series and were selected to illustrate the kinds of materials available. To learn what other titles are in the series and to identify other special needs materials a computer search of VECM is recommended. Search services are offered nationwide by colleges and universities,



state departments of education, and others, including the CCCs. Additionally, curriculum developers are encouraged to submit their materials for announcement in VECM to the CCC serving their region. The names and addresses of the six CCCs and the states served by each are in appendix D. Exhibit 2 is a detailed sample record from VECM.
