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ABSTRACT

Information on enrollments and student characteristics at Washington state community colleges is provided in this report for fall 1982. After introductory material and report highlights, tables provide data on headcount and full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment for fall quarters 1978 through 1982; FTE and headcount by course intent category; state-supported course sections by course intent; FTE by time/location and course intent; FTE by instructional subject area; FTE faculty by employment status; rates of change in FTE enrollment, FTE faculty, course sections, and student/faculty ratios; FTE enrollment by source of support (i.e., state, contract, and student), by time/location, and by course intent; course sections by college by course intent; and FTE faculty by employment status and college. The next section gives systemwide and college data on students by age, gender, ethnic background, previous status, and full- or part-time status. Among the findings highlighted in the report are the following: (1) the fall 1982 headcount was 10% below that of fall 1981 following a decline of 17% between 1980 and 1981; (2) vocational FTE's decreased by 7%, while academic FTE's fell by 1%; (3) part-time students constituted half the enrollments in 1982 compared to 65% in 1978; and (4) day-time, on-campus students increased from 63% to 72% of the enrollment between 1978 and 1982. 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FOREWORD

The Washington Community College Fall Quarter Report 1982 is the third edition of an annual report published following the conclusion of fall quarter. Typically, fall quarter is the focal point for community college data and is considered the term most reflective of college activities throughout an academic year.

The Fall Quarter Report is one of two annual informational and reference publications prepared by the State Board for Community College Education. The second is the Washington Community College Academic Year Report which includes information based on the full academic year, and is published following the conclusion of the academic year.

FALL QUARTER REPORT 1982 INTRODUCTION AND HIGHLIGHTS

Fall 1982 enrollment in Washington community colleges was less than that of the previous fall quarter for the second straight year. Concurrently, the characteristics of the student body continued to become more like those of more traditional institutions.

The Fall 1982 headcount was 152,976, 10 percent below that of Fall 1981 which was 17 percent below that of Fall 1980.

The Fall 1982 Full-time Equivalent (FTE) enrollment dropped 3 percent from Fall 1981 to 88,079 (including student-funded and contracted enrollments). FTE enrollment dropped 11 percent the previous year.

The principle reason for the enrollment reduction was the elimination of classes necessitated by budget cuts; however, enrollment was also affected by tuition increases.

Most of the cuts were applied to evening and off-campus classes, taught primarily by non-tenured, part-time faculty. This, in turn, caused large reductions in part-time students, older students and vocational education students who account for a large proportion of the evening enrollment.

Part-time students (those with 9.9 credits or less) constituted 65 percent of the headcount enrollment in 1978. Last fall they provided half the enrollment. Daytime, on-campus students increased from 63 percent of the FTE enrollment to 72 percent during the same period. The average student age fell from 28.8 to 28.3 between Fall 1981 and Fall 1982.

Vocational FTEs decreased by 7 percent while academic FTEs decreased by 1 percent between Fall 1981 and Fall 1982. Contributing significantly to the vocational decrease was a 23 percent drop in home and family life students, most of them in parent education. Outside of home and family life, most categories of vocational education enrollment also decreased except data processing. There was a large decrease in the occupational support category, due to an 80 percent drop in industrial first aid enrollments which can be attributed to fee increases.

In the academic category, enrollment increases in basic skills, science and mathematics partially offset reductions in business administration, social sciences, humanities and health and physical education.

The male-female ratio remained constant during the past year with females accounting for 53 percent of total enrollment.

Minority enrollment, as a percentage of total enrollment, increased from 10.69 to 11.26 percent.

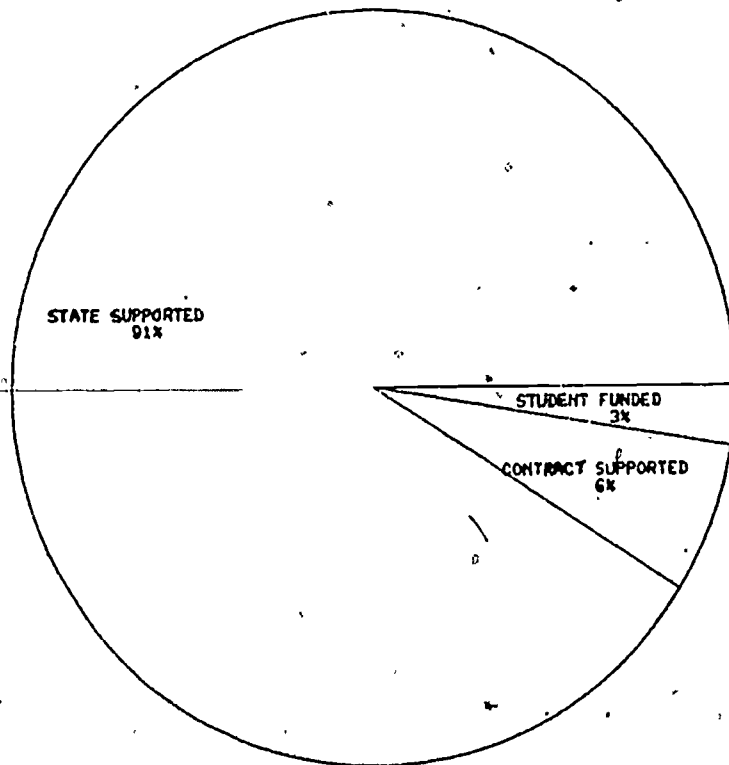
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COMMUNITY COLLEGE FUNDING SOURCES

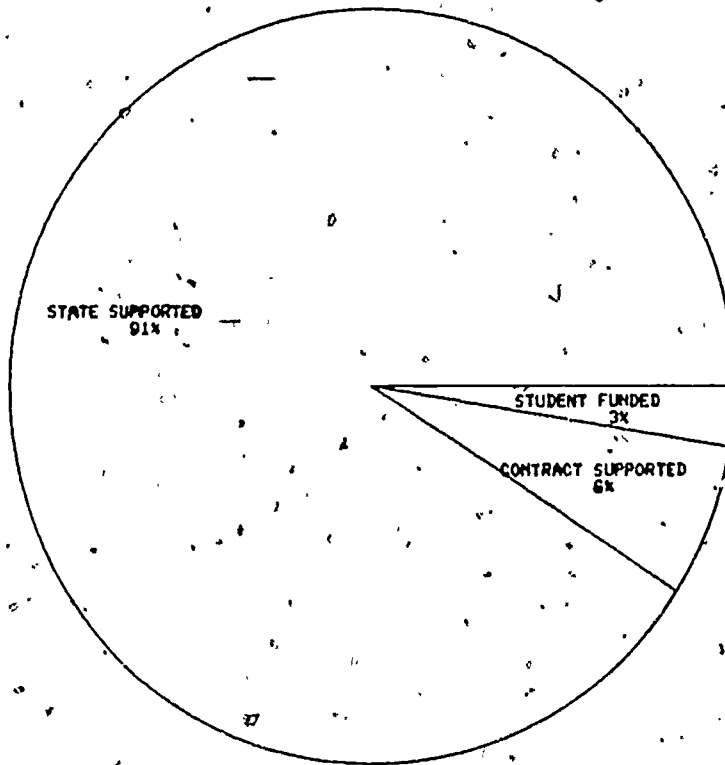

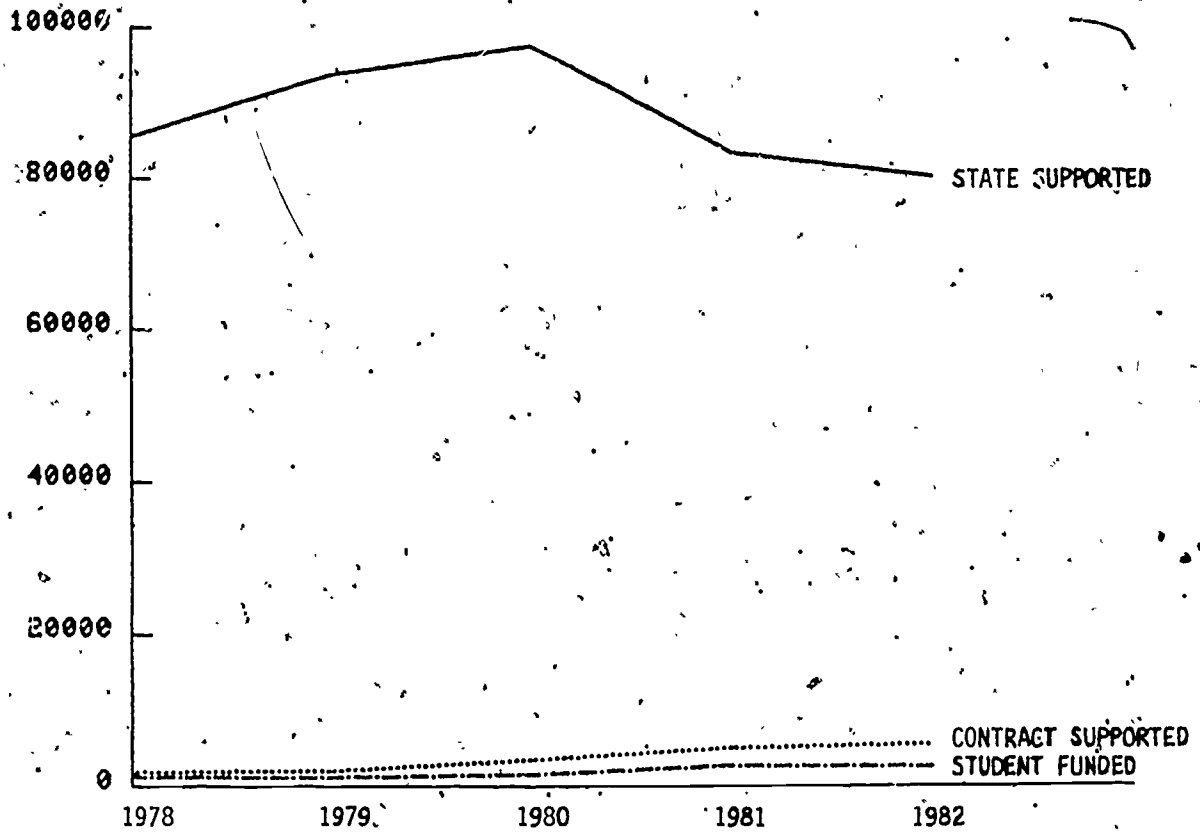

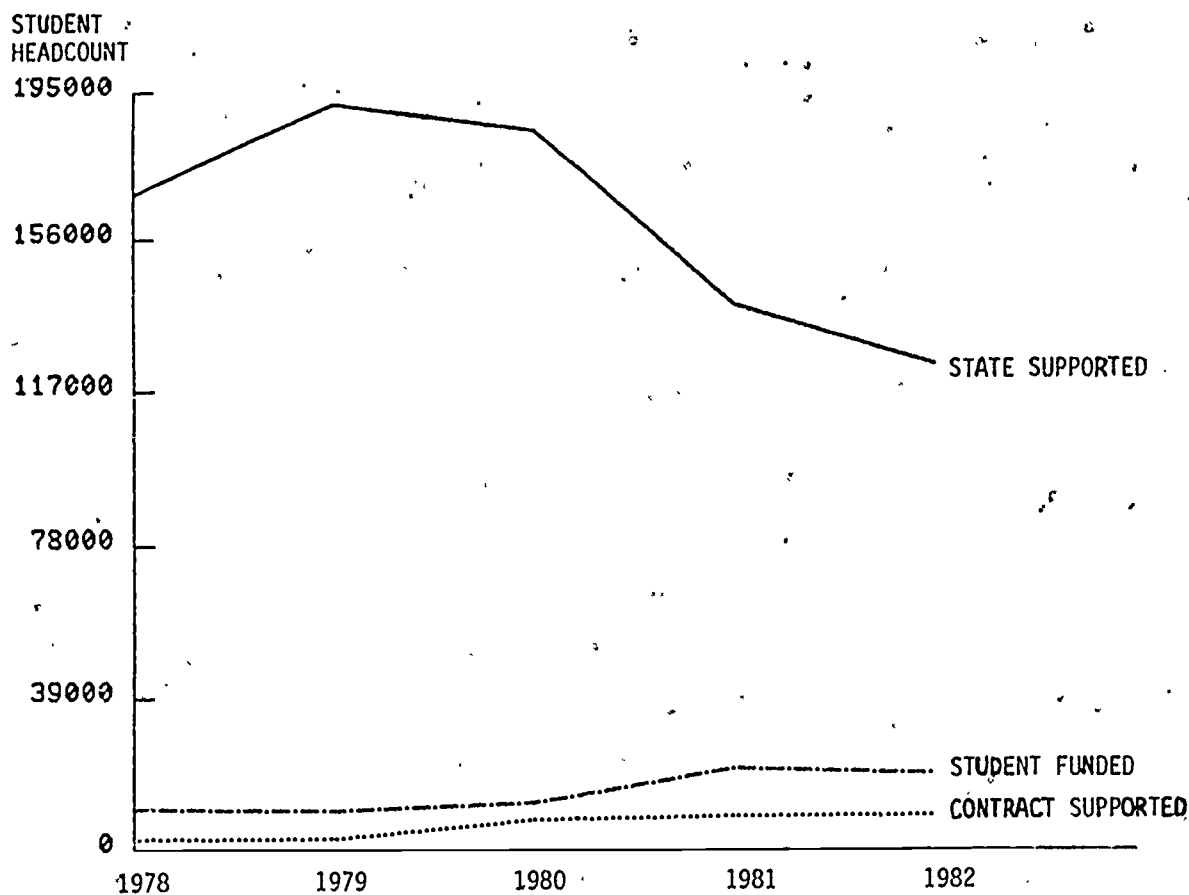

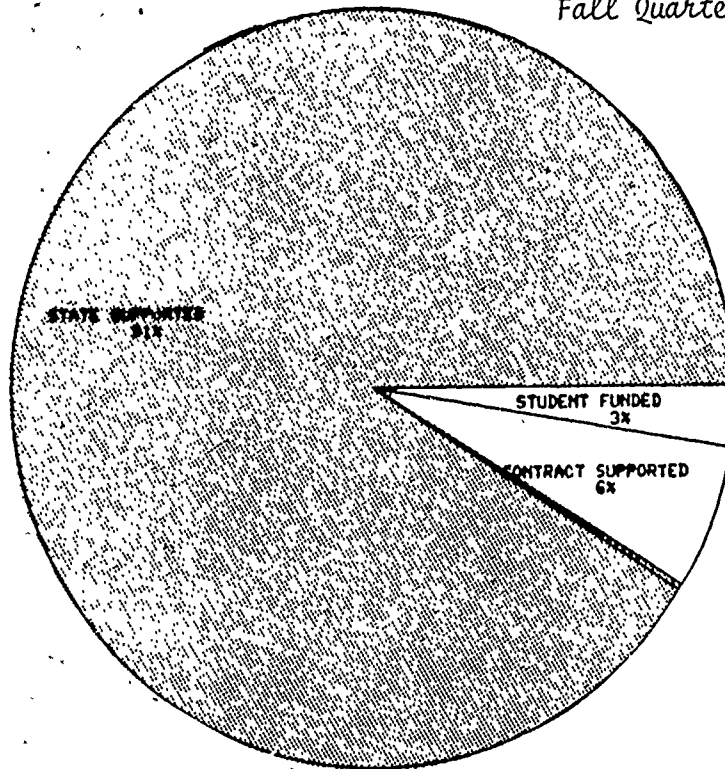

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STATE SUPPORTED INSTRUCTION

Tables 4 through 9 provide system-wide information related to community college instruction which is supported through legislative appropriation of state monies. For enrollment counting purposes, state supported students are those whose curricula includes a course which is funded fully or in part through state appropriations.

COURSE INTENT CATEGORIES

Instructional programs in Washington's community colleges vary because the communities differ in demographic, economic, and geographical characteristics, but courses are generally offered in six basic areas:

- Academic Transfer:** Courses providing the first two years of a baccalaureate program; enabling students to transfer to four year colleges and universities to complete their study.
- Vocational:** Courses providing instruction related to specific occupational fields; leading to an associate degree or certificate, or providing retraining and upgrading of skills in these fields. Washington Community Colleges offer vocational education in over 300 occupational fields.
- Basic Education:** Courses in basic knowledge or skill areas as needed to prepare for college level courses, complete eighth grade (ABE), or complete high school.
- Home & Family Life:** Courses providing basic parenting and home living skills. (Examples: "Parent Education"; "General Nutrition"; and "Financial Planning.")
- General Education:** Courses that deal with psychological, social, political and economic subjects intended to provide for an informed citizenry. (Examples: "Metric Systems"; "First Aid and Safety"; "Career/Life Planning"; "Interpersonal Relationships"; and "Communication Skills/Seniors.")
- Student Funded Community Service Avocational:** Courses or activities established for the purpose of meeting community, cultural, recreational, and personal skill needs. These courses are typically not applicable to degrees, diplomas, or certificates.

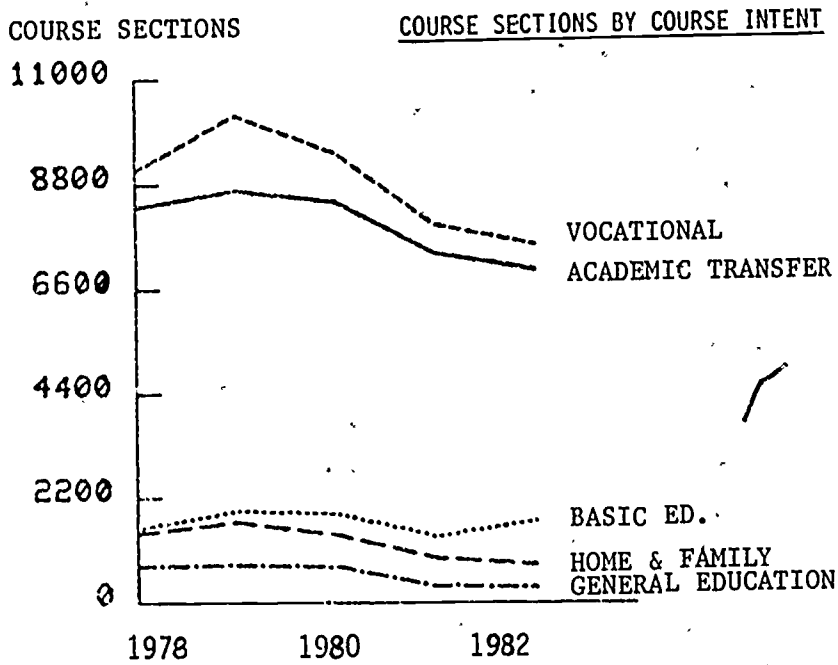

Even though course sections have been reduced at approximately the same rate, FTE-Student enrollment has been sustained in the academic area through larger class sizes.

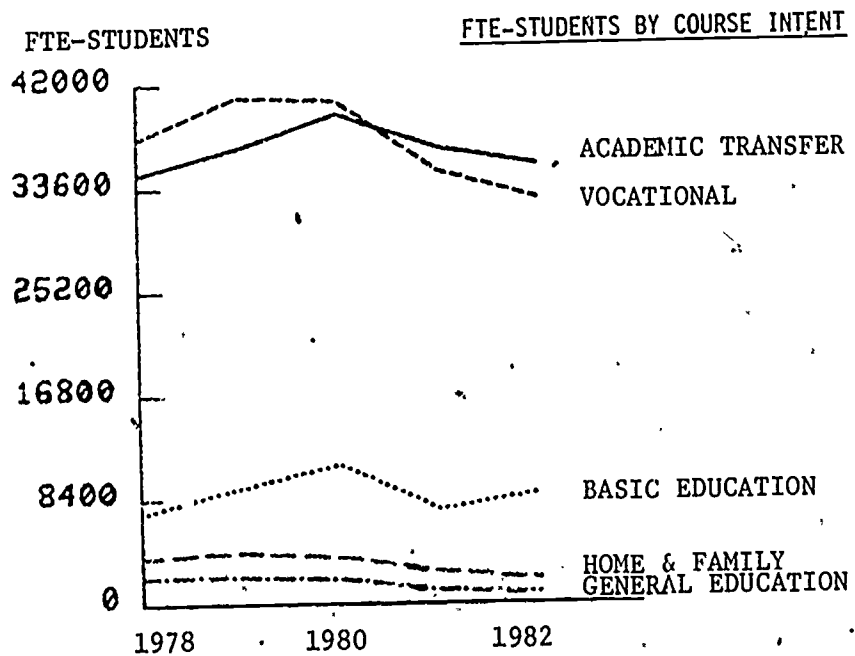

WASHINGTON COMMUNITY COLLEGES
ACADEMIC YEAR 1981-82

ACADEMIC Courses taught primarily for students whose goal is general education or transfer to a four year institution.

Business Administration: Courses related to the organization, operation, administration, and control of private and public business organizations.

Science: Courses relating to agriculture and natural resources, architecture and environmental design, biological sciences, computer and information sciences, engineering, military sciences, and physical sciences.

Mathematics: Courses relating to the science of numbers and space and configuration and their measurement, relationships and abstractions.

Social Sciences: Courses related to all aspects of human culture -- the behavior, interaction, organization and history of mankind; psychology; public affairs; and the theory and practice of home care including foods, home decoration, home management and child care.

Humanities: Courses relating to communications -- mass media, fine and applied arts, foreign languages, literature, philosophy, library science and interdisciplinary studies in the general liberal arts and sciences.

Health Education and Physical Education: Courses related to the safety and preservation of human life through knowledge and application of principles of health, physical activity and recreation.

Basic Skills: Courses related to elementary and secondary school subjects, English as a second language, and the development of special skills prerequisite to some college level courses.

VOCATIONAL Technical and occupational curricula leading to associate degrees and certificates below the baccalaureate level. Courses provide training to prepare persons for their first job or to provide upgrading skills for those presently employed.

Business & Commerce Technologies: Includes courses associated with the development of skills required for commercial, business or secretarial occupations at the semi-professional level.

Data Processing Technologies: Courses relating to the development of skills required for data processing occupations at the semi-professional level.

Health Services & Paramedical Technologies: Courses associated with the development of skills required for health service occupations.

Mechanical & Engineering Technologies: Courses relating to the development of skills required for mechanical and engineering-related occupations such as engineering graphics, architectural drafting, welding, nuclear technologies, etc.

Home and Natural Science Technologies: Courses associated with the development of skills required for natural science-related occupations such as agriculture, food service, marine and oceanographic technologies, etc., and home-centered occupations such as parenting.

Public Service Technologies: Includes courses relating to law enforcement, recreation and social work, fire control, public administration, public service, etc.

Occupational Support: Courses that serve more than one occupational program such as industrial first aid, mathematics and science, business & management, occupational teacher education/curriculum development, etc.

COMMUNITY SERVICE (STUDENT-FUNDED) Courses or activities established for the purpose of meeting community, cultural, recreational, and personal skills needs. These courses are typically not applicable to degrees, diplomas, or certificates.

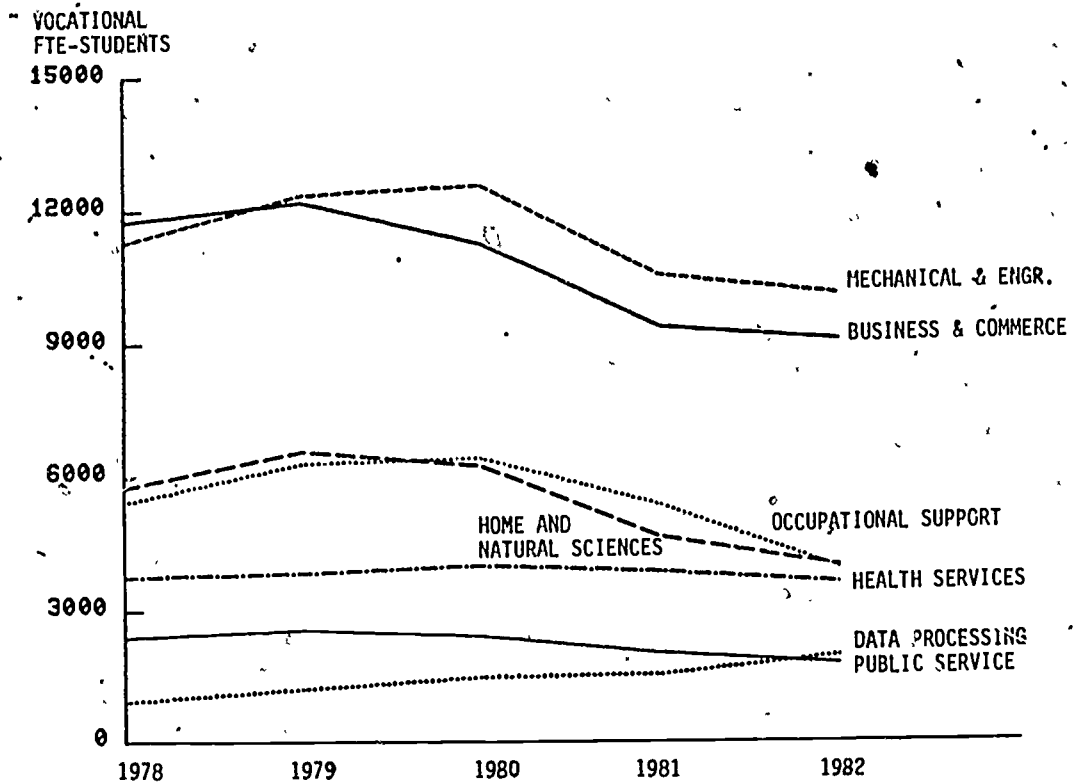

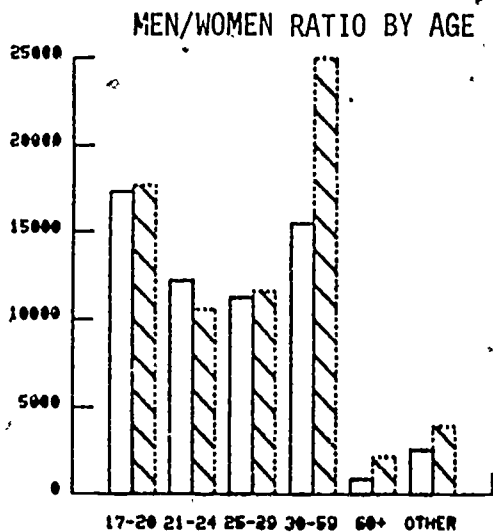

▨ = WOMEN

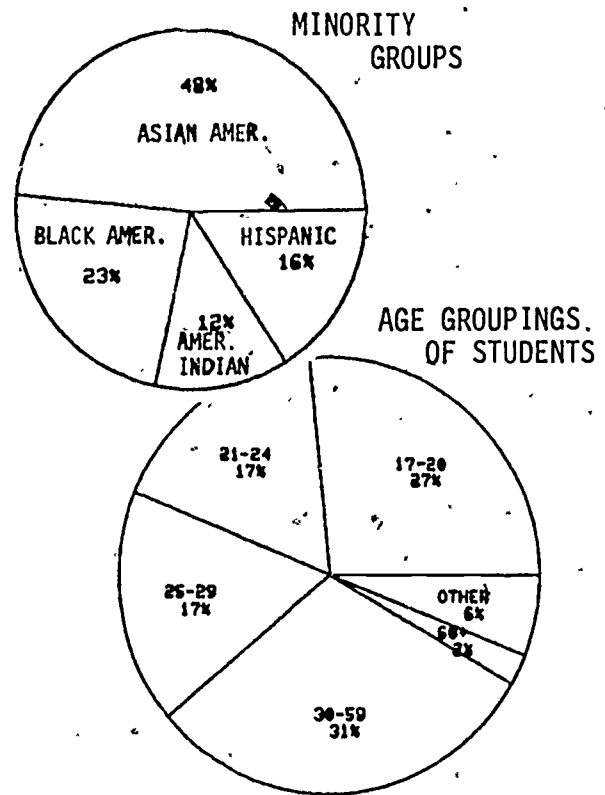

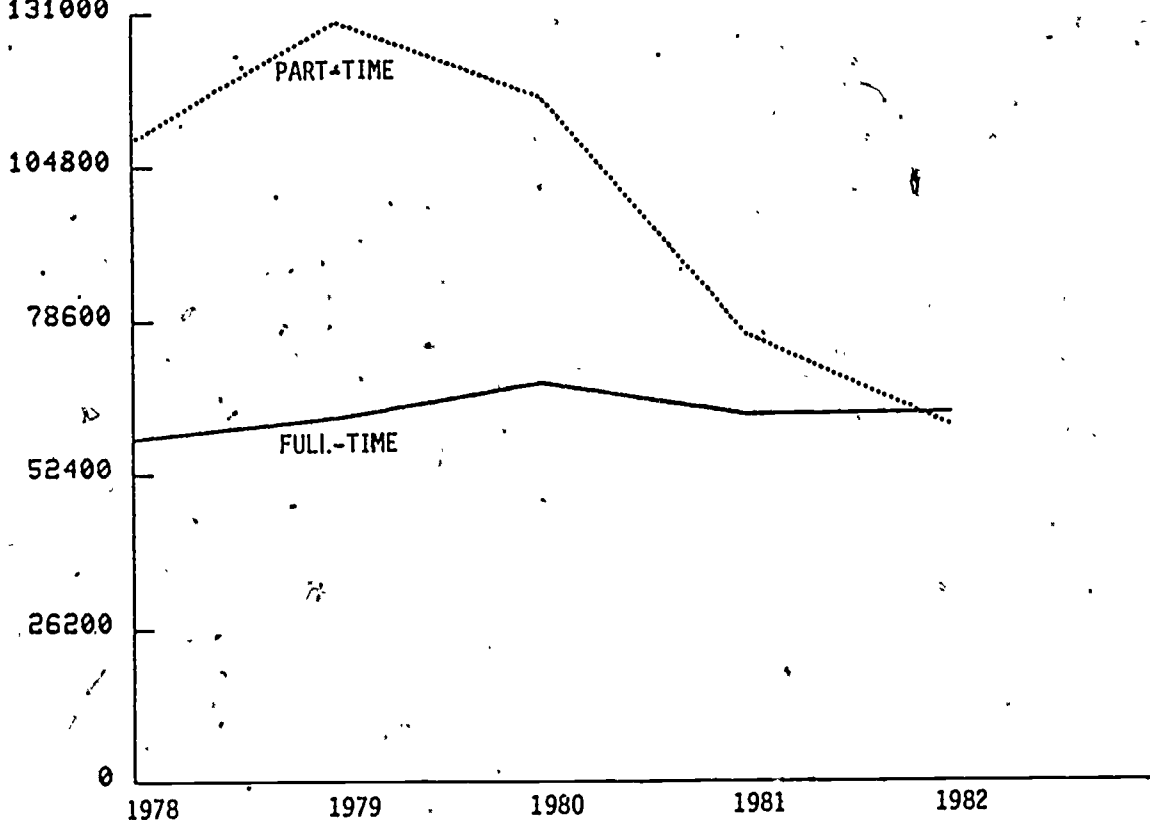

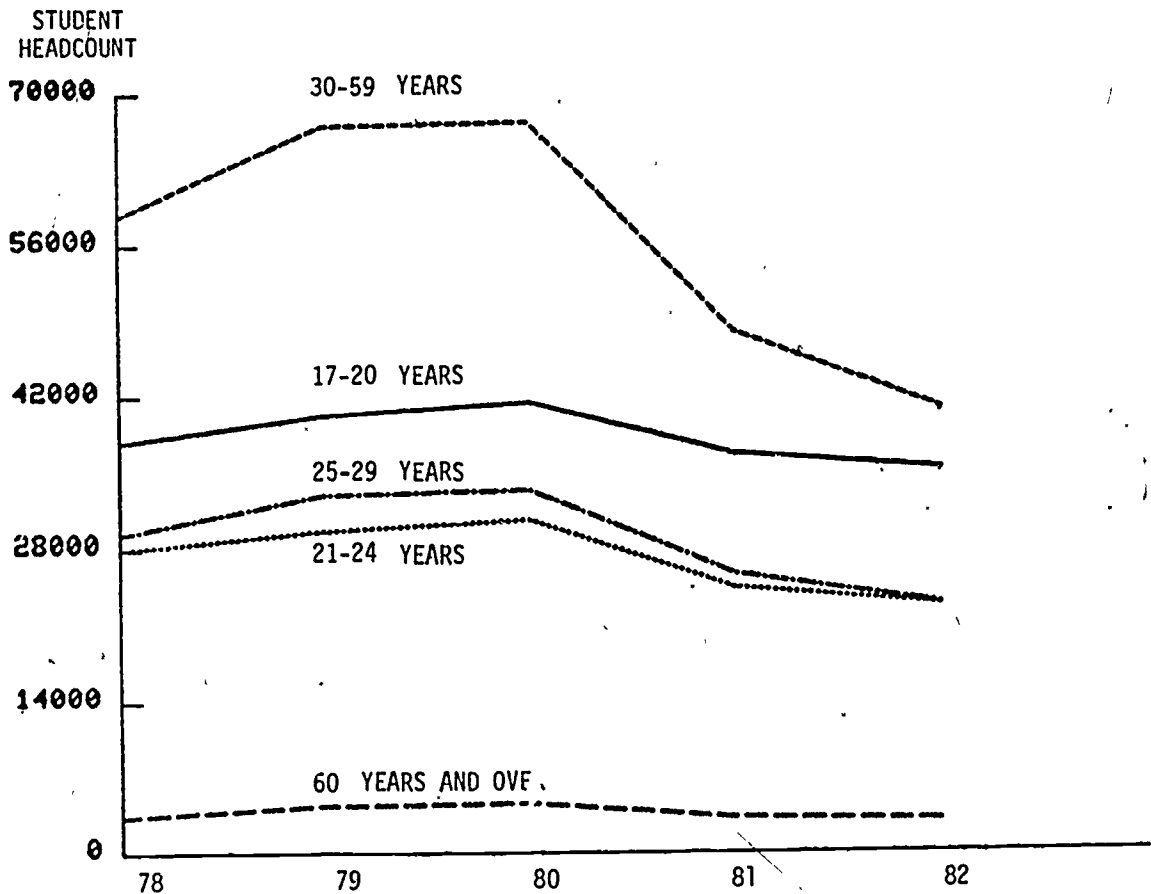

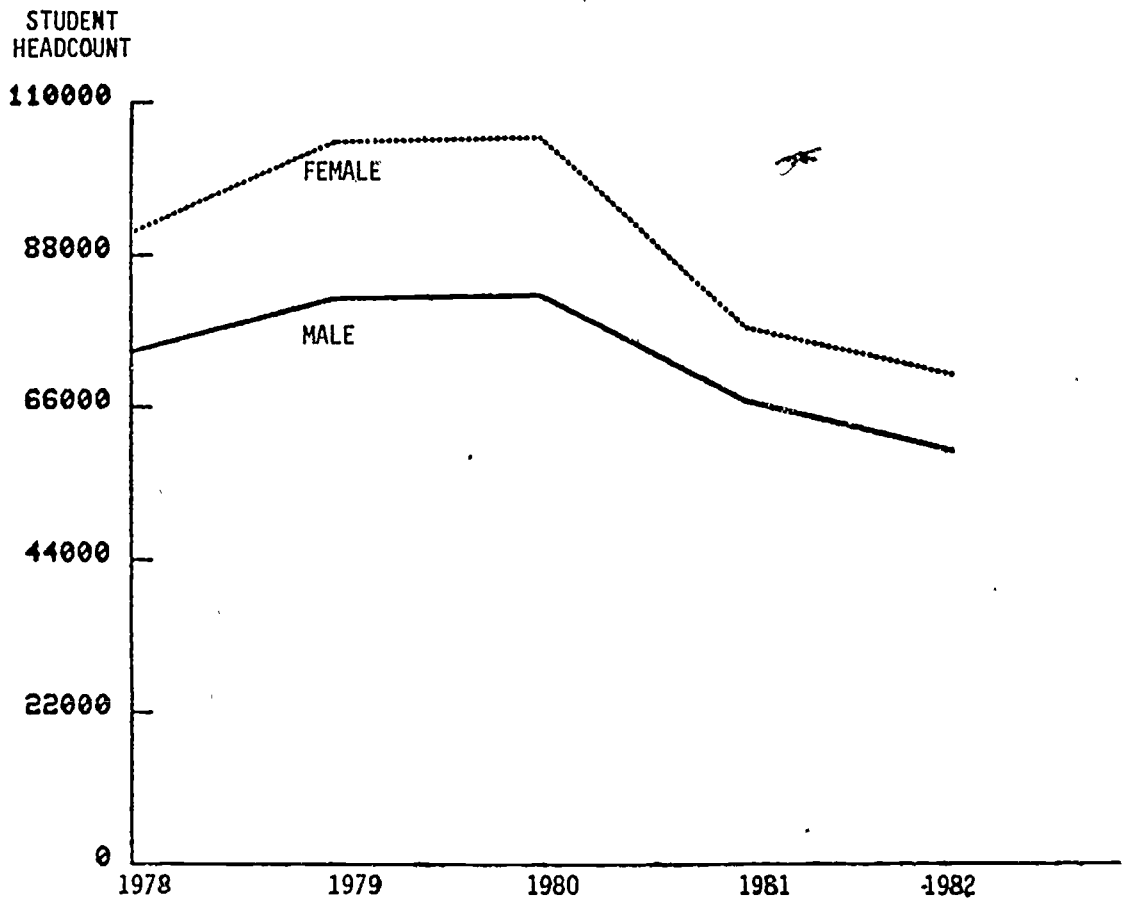

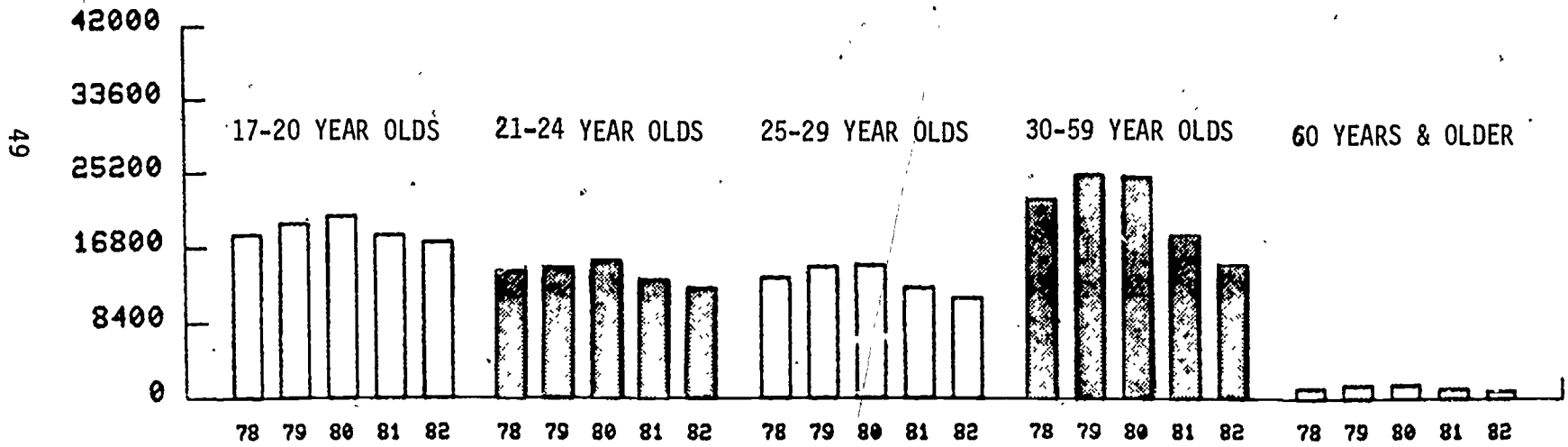

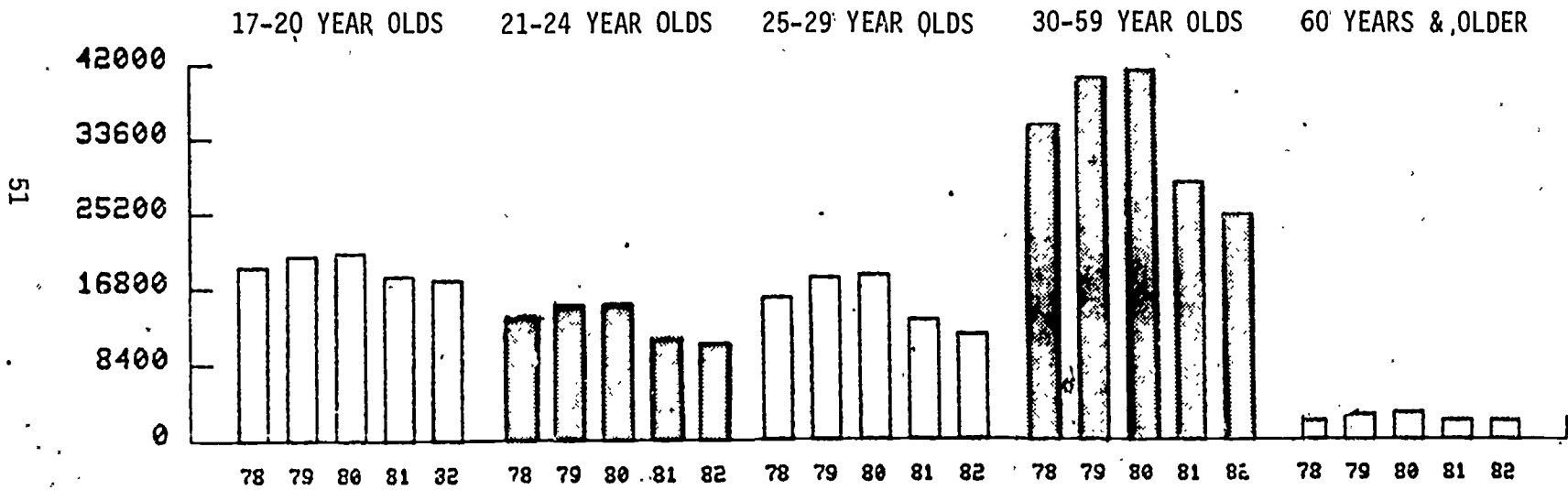

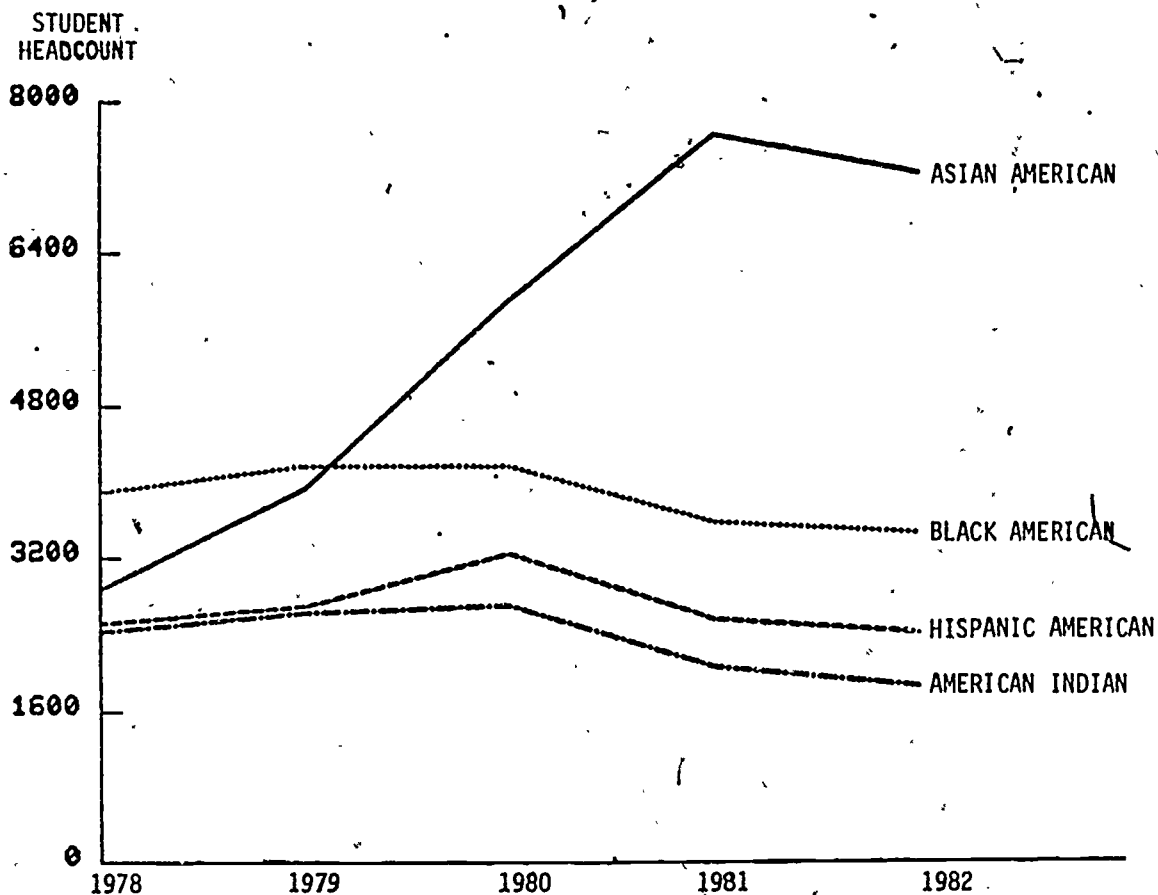
