ABSTRACT

From Subject to Citizen is a one-year course on America's beginnings for secondary students. The concept of power and the political interrelationships between government and citizens are examined. Each action-oriented module contains a variety of simulation and role-playing activities, as well as student booklets, records, newspapers, a Teacher's Explanation and Guide, a Component Use Guide, and an Evaluation Handbook. *The Game of Empire* deals with the conflicting economic interests of the British and the American colonies which led the Revolution. *The Invincible Armada* is based on the attempted invasion by the Spanish Armada in 1588 which was thwarted by the British. The 7th- to 8th-grade reading level, short lessons, colorful illustrations and graphics, and the questions appeal to under-achievers. The case studies and adapted primary sources raise issues relevant to the past and the present. Objectives, teaching suggestions, suggested resources, teacher and student bibliographies, and tests are included in the teacher's guide.

Based on the economic and trading conditions in the American colonies between 1763 and 1775, *Colony* divides the class into colonial merchants, officials of the British government, and bankers. Students are involved in making decisions that could have altered the course of history. The activity takes five class periods to complete.

Students find themselves in the year 2087 and on a new planet facing the same problems Americans faced in establishing sovereignty in the years 1781-1789. The simulation covers the problems encountered by seven (up to 13) states and leads up to a constitutional convention. If and when the convention is successful, the students write a new Constitution, based on the Constitution of 1787. A three-week period is sufficient to complete the activity.

In this activity, students simulate the conflict between those early Americans who favored strong ties with the British and those who favored independence. Half of the students take the position of either a Radical or a Tory, while the other half are undecided. During the course of the activity, which takes approximately three class periods, it is up to the Radicals and Tories to win the moderates over to their way of thinking. Investigating the causes of the Revolution, understanding the different points of view, and becoming involved in the decision-making process will help the participants realize how hard it is not to take sides and that the movement for independence was not unanimous. From 24 to 100 students may participate.

In this simulation students are delegates at a mock Constitutional Convention. The political interests of each delegate reflect the conflicting interests of delegates involved in the actual writing of the United States Constitution. From suggested alternatives, students must come up with and ratify a new constitution. Their document is then compared to the actual Constitution. The game can be completed in three days, but it may take as long as two weeks of class time. A record, delegate profile cards, delegate handbooks, a wall chart, and duplicating masters are provided. A teacher's guide is also included.

The highlight of this activity is the actual trial. This is proceeded by group work, research, and the exchange of ideas and interpretations dealing with the concepts of revolution, treason, and allegiance. Suggestions for follow-up discussion are provided. The entire activity can be completed in four or five class periods.

One of the main objectives of *Reliving the American Revolution* is to promote lively, in-depth, classroom discussions on events leading up to the Revolution and on the conflict itself. The filmstrips combine famous paintings and music of the time, colorful drawings, and an interesting narrative, each lasting approximately half an hour. Short and pertinent excerpts from primary sources, each with a brief introduction, are the major focus of the student book. A chronology and a "Who's Who in the Revolution" are also included. Colorful pictures with captions arranged along a time line make up the four wall panels. The Teacher's Guide suggests 14 "Discussion Projects" and also includes the filmstrip narration.

The staff from the Children's Book Section of the Library of Congress has compiled this bibliography as a guide for background reading on the Bicentennial. Criteria for selection included factual accuracy, logical organization, and clear succinct writing. Sixty-nine references are listed including historical novels. No textbooks are included.

Social Studies: Forging a Nation, by Paul Hanson. Miami, Florida: Dade County Public Schools. 1971. 35 pp. ED 061 142. EDRS price: microfiche - \$.75, hardcopy - \$1.85. Grades 7-9.

Forging a Nation is a curriculum guide for teachers of grades 7 through 9 who are planning instructional programs in American studies. It is designed to fit quinmester school schedules. Primary emphasis is upon using the topic of the American Revolution as a basis for studying conflict and change. Course content includes outlined units on the colonies, French and English cavalry, change in British colonial policy, reasons for declaring independence, factors which contributed to the winning of the war and establishing a new nation.

United States History: From Community to Society. Unit Four: Revolutionary America. Grade Six. Project Social Studies. Minnesota University, Project Social Studies Curriculum Center. 1968. 65 pp. ED 068 387. EDRS price: microfiche - \$.75, hardcopy - \$3.15. Grade 6.

Revolution is the theme for this resource unit which is the fourth in a social studies series designed for sixth-grade students. Emphasis is upon examining the causes of the Revolution, the revolutionary war itself, and strategies of the war through the inquiry process. Detailed information on course objectives, teaching strategies, and program descriptions are provided in the teacher's guide, ERIC document SO 003 146.

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JOURNAL ARTICLES

If, after reading the following summaries of journal articles, you want to read the entire article, check your local library or instructional media center to see if they subscribe to the journal.

"Bicentennial Era: Three Years to Go," by James F. Parsley and Henry D. Olsen. *Social Studies*, vol. 64, no. 7, pp. 332-339. December 1973. Grades 9-12.

A "time capsule" sketching events that occurred during the Pre-Revolutionary War period and list of leading characters provide the basis for a re-enactment and role playing of the events leading up to the Revolution. A selected bibliography of books, films, filmstrips, and games and simulations on the Revolution are included.

"A Conversation in a Philadelphia Inn, 1775," by John L. Betts. *History Teacher*, vol. 5, no. 3, pp. 9-20. March 1972. Grades 9-12.

Based upon primary sources, this reconstruction of a hypothetical conversation between a business man and a farmer in a Philadelphia Inn in 1775 will give students additional insight into the cause of the American Revolution. The article includes a student guide and a suggested quiz.

"Create a Classroom Revolution," by Jonnie L. Cowan. *Teacher*, vol. 91, no. 3, pp. 52-56. November 1973. Grades 1-6.

A teacher describes a social studies unit on the Revolutionary War for elementary students. In a simulated situation the students react to unreasonable governmental demands given by the teacher. The unit allows the student to relate Revolutionary War issues to situations we all face everyday.

"Has the Discovery of America Been Useful or Hurtful to Mankind? Yesterday's Questions and Today's Students," by Gerald A. Danzer. *History Teacher*, vol. 7, no. 2, pp. 192-206. February 1974. Grades 9-12.

In 1780, a prize was established in France for the best answer to the question: "Was the discovery of America a blessing or curse to mankind?" This question and its only response from an American provide the basis of a high school history class unit.

"Some Patriots Got their Feet Wet: The Revolution at Sea," by Ralph Adams Brown. *The Social Studies*, vol. 63, no. 5, pp. 195-198. October 1972.

As we approach the Bicentennial, teachers will find more and

more interest in the Revolutionary War and especially the war at sea. Since textbooks seldom have much information on the Continental Navy, the author provides a list of references, materials to help teachers and librarians locate the abundant sources on the revolutionary navy.

"Teaching about the American Revolution." *Social Education*, vol. 38, no. 2, pp. 102-184. February 1974. Grades K-12.

The entire edition of this special Bicentennial issue is devoted to teaching about the American Revolution. Student materials and exercises on topics of local history, conflict resolution, and values clarification are included.

"Teaching about the American Revolution through Its Folk Songs," by Lawrence I. Seidman. *Social Education*, vol. 37, no. 7, pp. 652-664. November 1973. Grades 4-6.

This article highlights the American Revolution through folk songs that Loyalists and Whigs, British and American soldiers sang during the years 1763-1783. An annotated bibliography of books and records on American folksongs is included.
